Evensong at St. Andrew's

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to soothe us and to draw us closer to the presence of God. The congregation also joins in the spoken parts of the liturgy: the reciting of the Confession and the Creed, as well as singing the hymns.


On Sunday, February 3, at 5:00 p.m.,

The net operating income for the month of December was again positive, but the yearend net operating income remained in the red. Fortunately, the yearend deficit could be covered by funds carried over from 2017. Vestry sincerely thanks everyone who supported St. Andrew’s financially throughout 2018. The many ministries of our parish can continue to serve our community only through your regular and generous financial support. Thanks to those who have pledged their support for 2019, and a reminder to those who may not have yet committed their pledges, please consider making a pledge for 2019. Pledges can be made online through the church website or by completing and returning a pledge card. Each and every contribution, no matter the amount, helps St. Andrew’s minister to those in the parish as well as to the community at large. The Property Committee reported that a general power failure on New Year’s Day resulted in major damage to electronics in the elevator. The estimated cost of repair is \$11,500, and the church insurance company as well as West Penn Power are being contacted regarding possible coverage of this large expense.

December ended as usual with a positive balance. Over \$6,200 was given as Christmas offerings and the generosity of the parish is greatly appreciated. We came pretty close to receiving all the pledges, and typically we only receive about 96% by the end of the year due to those leaving the parish in one way or another. We did have an overall deficit for the year, which is covered by the surplus from the year before held in savings. Our budget will again be as pared down as possible for 2019 and since our operations are entirely funded by donations, we do hope that you will support our church by pledging if you have not already done so.

February 3: Dr. Julia Kasdorf

Shale Play

Poet and Professor of English at Penn State, Dr. Julia Spicher Kasdorf will share her 2018 book, *Shale Play*, a collaboration with award-winning documentary photographer Steven Rubin. Their words and images explore the small towns, farms, and forests of Appalachian Pennsylvania to highlight the stories of these places and the working people who inhabit them. Dr. Kasdorf grew up in Westmoreland, Pennsylvania, and she is a Professor of English and Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies at Penn State University. Dr. Kasdorf received her B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. from New York University.

The PA IPL Pennsylvania-to-DC Bike Ride

Ted Jaenicke, Alison Condie Jaenicke, and Andrea DeCarle will share their experiences from the 2017 and 2018 Pennsylvania Interfaith Power & Light bicycle rides from State College to Washington D.C. During the 200+ mile journey, cyclists were hosted by supporters and faith communities, and once in Washington, they joined PA IPL staff for conversation about climate change and clean energy and to share faith-rooted perspectives with elected officials. Both faculty at Penn State, Ted Jaenicke is a Professor of Agricultural Economics and Alison Condie Jaenicke teaches writing, writes her own fiction, non-fiction, and poetry, and is also an accomplished photographer. Ms. Andrea DeCarle is a second grade teacher with the State College Area School District.

Feb 17: Dr. Wakar Uddin

The Rohingya Crisis in Burma/Myanmar and Bangladesh

Dr. Wakar Uddin serves as the director general of the Arakan Rohingya Union, an international coalition of 61 Rohingya organizations around the world. He is also the founder and chairman of the Burmese Rohingya Association of North America. Uddin is a professor of Plant Pathology and Environmental Microbiology at Penn State University, where his research focuses on turfgrass. He received his B.S. and M.S. from the University of Nevada and his Ph.D. from the University of Georgia.

Feb 24: Dr. Ray Najjar

Carbon and Climate in the Chesapeake

Ray Najjar will discuss how climate is impacting the Chesapeake Bay, which illustrates the role of estuaries as a place that can hold carbon but is also vulnerable to changing sea level. Dr. Najjar is a Professor of Oceanography in the Department of Meteorology and Atmospheric Science at Penn State. He is a leading expert

of carbon, climate, and sea level impacts in estuarine systems. Dr. Najjar is the Co-Chair of the Science Steering Group of North American Carbon Program and a Member of the Science and Technical Advisory Committee of the Chesapeake Bay Program. Dr. Najjar received his B.E. from Cooper Union, and his Ph.D. from Princeton University.

Dr. Alley, the Evan Pugh Professor of Geosciences at Penn State University, will speak on "Climate Change, Energy and You: Latest Developments."

"Richard Alley is at the forefront of climate change science and no one is better at communicating it," says Sylvia Neely, group leader of the local CCL chapter. "His presentation will bring us all up to date on advances in this rapidly progressing field so that our quest for solutions is informed by the very best science."




