

It's All About the Story

Years ago, I was watching the Antiques Roadshow and there was a man who brought an old musket to be appraised. The appraiser told a fascinating story. During the Revolutionary War, the alarm came to a small town that the English troops were approaching. All the men of the town were already serving in the Continental Army with George Washington. So, a handful of teenage boys in the local schoolhouse got ahold of their father's muskets and managed to hold off the British at a bridge outside of town, at least until troops arrived. After the war, General Washington wanted to recognize the courage and resourcefulness of those few farm boys, so he commissioned special muskets to be made and presented to each of them. The man who had brought his old musket to the Roadshow had no idea how special and rare this item was. He had one of those limited edition, custom muskets, only one of two or three known to still exist. As you can imagine, the musket was worth a fortune.

Anyone who deals with antiques knows that provenance is everything. Provenance is the story of the item, and hopefully documentation or some other proof of that story. The more special the story, the more valuable the item. It's all about the story. Elie Wiesel, the writer and holocaust survivor, famously said, "God created man because he loves stories." We all have a story to tell. In a very real way, we are our story, the collection of events that make up our lives. As we meet people and get to know them, and as we allow others to get to know us, we share our stories, at first selectively, then as

we get to know someone better, more openly. There are stories that we share only with the closest few people in our lives.



Something about sharing our stories with one another acts as an invitation, an invitation to the other to participate in our story. As we interact with one another, we write a new story together. We become a part of each other's story. We come to know the value of each other as we get to know each other's story. As Christians, there is a story we share in common, the story of God's interactions with his people in the Bible, especially through the person of Jesus in the New Testament. That larger story provides the background for our life stories and helps to give meaning and purpose to them. Our life of faith is essentially our ongoing attempt to fit our personal story into the grander, ongoing narrative.

In the recent Sunday adult forum series, we discovered the value of telling our stories. The first value is in claiming and understanding our own journey by putting it into words. The second value is in building community as we share those stories with each other and add to our common story. The third value is in sharing our stories beyond our established parish community as an invitation to others to come and see what they might discover as part of our faith community. This all takes work, and it involves risk—the risk of rejection or judgment. I believe we found that the risk is rewarded with great blessing. A common thread among the stories shared was how people discovered God through their weakness, their imperfection, their brokenness. That is precisely the story we have been entrusted to tell the world: The Good News. God loves stories, and therefore God loves us, no matter what our story is, no matter how confused we may be, no matter how unsure. Our value is in our story. The more we share it, the more valuable it grows.



EVENSONG

On Sunday, October 6, at 5 p.m. , the Adult Choir will sing the service of choral evensong. Music will include the MAGNIFICAT & NUNC DIMITTIS IN C by C. V. Stanford, ADORAMUS TE, CHRISTE by Palestrina, ABIDE WITH ME by Richard Webster and PRECES AND RESPONSES by Richard Shephard. Organist Gwen Catchen will play music by Johann Pachelbel and others.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the Office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy. After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

Please join us for this service. Bring some friends! Come and be refreshed and renewed for the days ahead. A reception will follow in Room 325. The next evensong will be Sunday, November 3, 2019, at 5 p.m.

GODLY PLAY



Transforming Questions

This fall the Adult Forum tackles some of our faith's most central (and difficult) questions. Kevin Lowe and Ted Christopher will co-facilitate this series of workshops from Forward Movement. Each week, through both listening and sharing, we will work together to wrestle with foundational questions in the context of faith, in order to learn more about ourselves, one another, and the Jesus we are seeking. We invite you to come share in this process of discovery. These sessions are appropriate for questioning teenagers and adults alike!

October 6: Can We Question Our Faith?

Is doubt really the opposite of faith? Or are faith and doubt linked? What do we do with the doubts we have? We will look for the doubters and questioners in the Bible and explore the place of doubt in our own lives.

October 13: Who is Jesus?

People of all faiths and none often seem to have opinions about Jesus. But who was he really? What can we confidently say about him? And how do we experience Jesus in our own lives?

October 20: Why Did Jesus Have to Die?

Most of the stories we hear about Jesus are about his life, but his death and resurrection are central to the Christian faith. But if Jesus was God incarnate, why did Jesus have to die? Did God demand his Son's death? We will look into multiple ways of answering this question, and explore our own impressions of Jesus's death.

October 27: What Do We Have to Do?

What does it mean to choose to follow Christ? Are there things we have to do to be a Christian? Is religion just a list of rules? We will explore our baptismal promises and see what a life of Christian faith might look like.
