The Heart of Our Faith

I have a friend in Virginia, a Methodist pastor, who is the chaplain for the local fire department. He has been a volunteer firefighter since his teens. His firefighting days are behind him now, but he loves staying involved as chaplain. He was telling me about a funeral he was preparing for the other day for a fire chief who'd recently died from COVID. The logistics for the funeral were overwhelming. He attended a meeting with representatives from several fire jurisdictions as far away as 60 miles. They were providing equipment and personnel to cover the various firehouses in the local area so all the local firefighters could attend the funeral. The funeral activities themselves were to span two full days. If you've ever seen a procession for the funeral of a firefighter, you know how impressive it is; engines and other trucks lined up and decorated, people often lining the route. My friend commented, "I have never been a part of a community of people like the firefighting community who are so committed, even devoted to one another." He said that he'd been a member of the church his entire life but had never seen a church that was so able to pull together and support one another the way firefighters and their families do.

We then talked for several minutes about how to build such a powerful community in our churches.

One obvious difference between members of the firefighting community and members of a church is that church members do not engage in dangerous activities, such as rushing into burning buildings, routinely placing our lives in one another's hands. It seems a powerful bond develops between people who have shared such intense, and yes, life-threatening experiences. At one time in the church's history, professing a faith in Jesus Christ was a dangerous, even life-threatening action. In parts of the world, it still is. I can imagine being part of a small, persecuted faith community and the kind of bond that would develop with the other Christians. I can imagine the mutual support we would give each other in difficult times, the shared sense of loss if something happened to one of our members, the strength I would derive from my fellow Christians, and the primacy of my sense of identity associated with membership in the church. I can imagine all that, but I do not know how to create it.

Membership at St. Andrew's may not require us to put our lives on the line, but being a Christian is no less demanding in the twenty-first century than it was in the second century. In our baptisms we commit ourselves to follow Christ who told us that in order to save our lives we must be willing to lose them. How deeply have you reflected on that? Short of actually losing our lives, we can find an intense bond with others as we gather around a common purpose and work towards common goals. Being committed to a common purpose along with others creates both a sense of identity for us as members of the group and a sense of purpose and meaning for us as individuals. At its best, that's what being a member of a Christian community is all about.

In practice, we need to have a place for people at all levels of commitment in our parish, constantly inviting folks to move deeper into their relationship with Christ and with his church. But we also need to be clear in our own minds about what it is we are inviting people to move deeper into. What is the fire at the heart of our faith that draws us inward?

December 2021

The vestry met on Tuesday, January 11, remotely, using Zoom. This was the final meeting for outgoing vestry members Andrea deCarle, Jason McCloskey, Connie Puckett, and Scott Strouse. In addition, Paul Humphreys stepped down from vestry. Many thanks to Andrea, Jason, Connie, Scott, and Paul for their service to the parish! Sandy Schwartz was appointed to a one-year term on the vestry to complete Paul's term. Financially the church finished 2021 with an approximately \$20,000 deficit as expected; however, the final deficit was only around \$1500 more than we had budgeted for. The vestry continues to invite all parishioners to prayerfully discern their financial stewardship for the coming year and return their 2022 pledge if they have not done so already.

The vestry discussed a variety of financial matters and voted to withdraw some funds from the Altar Guild endowment to replenish the guild's savings account line. Much of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of the pandemic's effect on parish life and lessons that we have learned (or are in the process of learning). Questions were raised about how best to serve the community in this time, both within the parish and outside in the larger community. We continue to hold space for grief and loss in how things have changed at St. Andrew's, even as we look toward the future.

At the Annual Parish Meeting on January 30, Julie Brueninger, Carolyn Donaldson, Sharon Rovanseck, and Fran Stevenson were elected to the vestry and will begin their service at the February meeting.

Vestry meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month and are always open to all parishioners. VIII. Budget Report 2022 (Linda Mace)

- Financial reports for the end of 2021: finished with a loss for year of a little over 20K; budget expected a 19K shortfall
- Current pledge status: \$404,445; 125 pledges; current status is above where we were last year; we still anticipate getting to \$425,000 in pledges
- Our diocesan Fair Share dropped significantly this year (around \$25K) because of the new diocesan formula; this helped our budget tremendously
- Boosted utility cost budget slightly for 2022, other things have stayed relatively constant
- 2022 budget is again not balanced; we are expecting another shortfall this year
- Parishioners' Ministry is receiving contributions from community members outside of the parish as well and has been well funded since removing it from the line item budget
- Altar Guild endowment (Chelius) has traditionally been mixed with other operating endowment funds; the AG endowment has now been moved out of operating into a separate savings line, so that AG accounting can be more directly tracked to ensure that Chelius endowment funds are used specifically for AG purposes

IX. Rector's Address

- 2021 has been a continuing struggle with the pandemic; COVID continues to affect every aspect of parish life
 - Slow reintroduction of in-person services in the spring and summer; wine was reintroduced in the fall
- Pandemic conditions continue to make planning very difficult; we are trying to remain as agile as possible moving forward
- Thanks to Scott Strouse (senior warden) and Michele Marini (junior warden) who have been extraordinarily active at St. Andrew's helping keep things running
- First poetry contest this year, in conjunction with Arts Fest, was extremely successful with submissions from all over
 - There was a reading and panel discussion, even though Arts Fest did not happen
 - There will be a second contest this year, theme TBA
 - Fr Jeff has been asked to serve on the board of the Arts Festival
- 2022: Flexibility is going to be key this year
 - We will continue to try to rebuild community in the parish
 - Strategic planning process was derailed by the pandemic in 2020 but will need to be reintroduced eventually; the challenge is to do what we can to keep moving forward
 - When we do move into congregational strategic planning, we will need to pay attention to the pandemic's effects
 - What has changed? What will go back? What will be completely different now?






