LETTER FROM THE WARDENS



Dear Friends in Christ at St. Andrews,

During this time of transition, communication is so very important. Just as we communicated with you on a regular basis during the interim search, you will now be hearing from us regularly again in order to update you on where we are in the process of calling our next settled rector.

When the call for the interim was made to Father Doug in October, 2015, the Vestry asked him for a $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2-year commitment. This still seems to be fairly accurate. We envisioned that his tenure and the call process would take us through the summer and possibly into the fall of 2017.

The first two steps that must take place in the process are the creation of our parish profile and the formation of a search committee. We are glad to report that these two things will take place simultaneously and the initial stages for both have begun.

We are working with the diocesan Transition Officer, Rev. Lauren Schoeck to identify a consultant that will help us through the "listening" process. The listening process will guide us in developing our parish profile. The profile, based on the views and opinions shared through the listening process, will detail how we see our parish now and our hopes for the future, while also giving insight into the gifts we seek in our next rector. The profile is shared with prospective candidates once the position is advertised. The listening process will begin as soon as a consultant is in place.

The preliminary discussion has begun in the formation of the search committee. This committee is appointed by the vestry and will be representative of the entire parish with approximately 10 members. Once the church profile is complete, the search committee will advertise the position using this profile. Interested candidates will be vetted and a short list of two or three candidates will be presented to the vestry.

We are excited that the work has been started but know it will take at least a year to complete. We ask for your patience during this journey. Our communication together must be a two-way street. Therefore, we also ask for and seek your input. Please do not hesitate to talk to either of us or any vestry member with thoughts, concerns, or needs.

Please keep the vestry, Rev. Schoeck, and Father Doug in your prayers as we seek to do God's will.

FROM THE CLERK OF THE VESTRY: April 2016



Vestry met on Monday, April 18. The financial picture was still positive, but it was noted that special offerings for Holy Week and Easter were noticeably less than last year. At the end of the first quarter, March 31, income was on track at 25% of the annual budget. On a bright note, the various bequests placed in the Centre Foundation continue to generate funds for their intended purposes. Such bequests are much appreciated and provide valuable support for specific needs in the parish.

The recent Town Meeting about formation programs at St. Andrew's prompted lively discussion among the vestry members. Discussion of the proposed changes in service times as well as changes in the young adult program curriculum served to liven up the meeting. As a result of the Town Meeting, committees have been formed to make recommendations for programs for children, young adults, and adults.

Spring Clean-Up Day is scheduled for May 7, with a rain date of May 14, and ALL in the parish are invited and encouraged to participate in the clean-up projects and in sprucing up St. Andrew's.

New banners for the outside of the front of the church are being developed, and a rainbow banner will be in place for National Gay Pride Month in June.

The wardens are moving forward with preparations for a parish listening event to collect information for an updated parish profile. After completion of the profile, the search for a new rector will begin.

You all contributed \$1,052.23, which will pay for 70 people at health clinics to receive critical care near their homes. Our children and youth heard several options for almsgiving at the beginning of Lent, but were most concerned about the problem of people needing a

doctor's care living far away from a health clinic. They voted for St. Andrew's to collect during Lent for these folks, and now our gift will provide essential health services down the road for seventy people! That's about three elementary school classrooms of kids, or 10 full pews at St. Andrew's Sunday morning, or nine tables of people in Canterbury Hall! Thank you again to everyone.

CHOIR: A SERVICE OF EVENSONG



On Sunday, May 1, at 5 PM, the Adult Choir offered a service of choral evensong according to the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. This book is still the official prayer book of the Church of England. Music in the service included a Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis by Alec Wyton, and the anthem LAUDATE NOMEN DOMINO by Christopher Tye. Thomas Tallis provided us with a setting of the Preces and Responses for the service. Organ music included music by Pachelbel and Andrew Clarke. Rev. Gene Tucker, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church in Huntingdon, Pennsylvania was the officiant.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to soothe us and to draw us closer to the presence of God. The congregation also joins in the spoken parts of the liturgy: the reciting of the Confession and the Creed, as well as singing the hymns.

Thank you to those who joined us at this service, and for those unable to attend, we look forward to seeing you at the next Evensong.

LESSONS FROM LECTIO



Last month we sat with Philippians 2:5-11 13:1-9.

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Through this passage we glimpsed the relationship between God and Jesus, where each person of the God-head acts humbly and makes space for the other. In this mutual deference to the other, they are both exalted. This idea, that the glory of God is evident through our mutual humility in respect for each other, is beautiful but can be difficult for us to live out.

Sitting with this passage we noticed some of our individual broken places. Places where our relationships to each other do not mirror the relationship between God and Jesus. Places where our self-made plans can make it difficult to make space for God. Places where we find it difficult to confess what Jesus means to us. We also noticed some broken places in our national community – most notably the violent tone of the current political climate.

In the midst of the brokenness we were reminded to invite God into the mess. We are neither alone in our human condition nor does the brokenness have the final word. Jesus emptied himself and was born in human likeness. Through this action, God has issued us an invitation to empty ourselves and be born in the likeness of Jesus – showing us a new way of relating to each other and giving us hope for transformation.

Dear God, thank you for gifting the world with your son, Jesus Christ, and allowing us to witness a relationship of mutual glory through humility. We pray for your guidance in our lives so that we might reflect this mutuality in our relationships with others. We also pray for our nation, that those in authority may demonstrate loving kindness toward those whom they govern. Please remind us to look to you in times of distress and show us what it means to empty ourselves so that our minds might be one with the mind of Christ. All this we ask in the name of your Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

J2A

Thank you to Rite-13 leader Christina Ford for leading the J2A youth and leaders in an experience of Lectio Divina on April 3. On April 17 and 24, leaders Sharon Rovansek, Amy Allison and Paul Humphreys led the group in meditation and discussions about pilgrimage, Earth Day and caring for God's creation. In May, most of the class discussions will focus on preparing for pilgrimage.

As part of preparation for Youth Sunday, Anna Kwasnica, Patrick Osborne, and Katrina Wanner met with leaders Frank Barksdale, Paul Humphreys and Darlene Nordoff, after a kick start from Amy Allison, to create and practice a talk about their J2A program and experiences. Their talk follows:

Good morning, my name is Patrick Osborne, and I am a member of St. Andrew's J2A Journey to Adulthood program, a two-year program, which this year consists of grade 9 and 10 youths. We meet each Sunday after church for class, often beginning with a candle-lit meditation in the chapel. In our program we do a mix of Christian education, faith development, group activities and community building, service to our church and community... and you see us as we worship together in the front pews.

Our class is a safe place to share. Everybody is listening and no one is judging. Sometimes we talk about Bible stories and sometimes we talk about what is going on in our lives. Our lessons are from units about Society, Prayer, the Self, Spirituality, and a book called

<u>Pilgrimage – the sacred art – Journey to the Center of the Heart</u>. Our leaders prepare lessons and share insights that show us how we could see the world through a framework of Christian faith.

Hello my name is Katrina Wanner! I am also a member of J2A. Over the past two years, we've grown very close to each other. Our group activities have included: laser tag; Bunco; the barbecue and boat rides at Bald Eagle, and the corn maze and bonfire. Retreats and lock-ins have helped our group build trust and friendships. Our faith has grown as we served our church and the community by polishing the pews, stuffing Easter eggs, cleaning the Sidney Friedman parklet, walking in the CROP Walk, writing Christmas cards for prison inmates and military members, and making snowflakes and singing Christmas carols to nursing home residents. We opened and closed our activities in prayer, either ones that we created or prayers from the Book of Common Prayer. I also participated in Happening, a diocesan retreat. All of these opportunities helped me to find God in everyone!

It's honestly hard to put into words how these experiences have changed my view on life, community, my understanding of God, and the people around me. In J2A we have practiced compassion, celebration, and growing in the love and mystery of God. We will be going on a Holy Pilgrimage to Oregon this summer and will be staying at the Fr. Barnard Youth Retreat Center which is part of Mount Angel Abbey. This experience of unfamiliar travel, and new feelings and friends will hopefully help us further define ourselves as Christ's own.

Hello, my name is Anna Kwasnica. Over the past two years, our J2A group has done A LOT of fundraising to earn enough money to support our leaders and ourselves to go on our pilgrimage, a spiritual journey. Some of this fundraising has helped our local and St. Andrew's communities; for example, we hosted the Shrove Tuesday pancake supper, a rummage sale and a book sale. We have also made and sold pies in the summer and fall, chili and Christmas cookies in the winter, and sold Christmas greenery. Thank you for supporting our fundraisers, especially the EpiscoPAWlian calendar contest!

Pilgrimage is not a vacation. Sure, we will do fun activities, but we will be searching for God in places not familiar to us. We will be doing service work along the coast. We will be praying together and journaling our experiences and insights. We are taking this pilgrimage to become spiritually connected with God and the people we have grown to trust, while having fun at the same time! Also, some of this journey is a surprise; we have to trust while not knowing.

We'd like to thank our five leaders: Amy Allison, Frank Barksdale, Paul Humphreys, Sharon Rovansek and Ted Jaenicke. We appreciate their hard work and Christian love for us as they lead us through our journey to adulthood. We'd also like to thank everyone from the parish, especially our families, who supported our fundraisers and are making this pilgrimage possible. We'd also like to thank Fr.
