Parish Survey: We had outstanding participation from the congregation in completing the parish survey. The invitation to participate went out to slightly more than 300 St. Andrew's attendees. We received 214 completed surveys. This information will be gathered and collated into a report that we will share with the congregation and the search committee.

Listening Events: Thank you to everyone who participated in the first two listening events on Sunday, September 25.

We had 80 to 90 congregants who participated in these two events. We gathered a lot of wonderful information that upon analysis, will assist our search committee. We have heard a lot of comments from the parishioners that they appreciated the opportunity to be heard and that everyone had the same chance to speak.

The second set of events will be **October at 12:15 PM (with lunch at 11:45 PM) and 6:30 PM (with dinner at 6:00 PM)**. Listening events are your chances to be heard. You will be able to tell us the direction you would like St. Andrew's to take and to voice any concerns you may have. We found that to allow everyone the opportunity to express their views, the events have been running longer than the hour advertised. Please plan to attend if you have not already.

BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS



In October, people all over the world will be celebrating the feast day of the Patron Saint of Animals, Saint Francis of Assisi. It is customary that in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures, animals are led to churches for a special ceremony. Our annual Blessing of the Animals will take place during the 10:30 AM service on Sunday, October 9. All animals, including photos and stuffed animals, are welcome. Pets should be leashed or caged as appropriate. Bring your pet to church and invite a friend! EVENING PRAYER



Evening Prayer has been a major component in the prayer life of Anglicans since the 1552 revision of the Book of Common Prayer. It's a simple service that allows us to decompress from the busyness and stress of the day. Reminiscent of the Eucharist, Evening Prayer incorporates prayer, scripture, and the profession of our faith through the Apostle's Creed. EVENSONG



On Sunday, October 2 at 5 PM, the Adult Choir of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church will offer a service of choral evensong according to the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. This book is still the official prayer book of the Church of England. Music in the service will include the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in D by Herbert Brewer, the anthem ABIDE WITH ME by Malcolm Archer and a setting of the Preces and Responses by Thomas Tallis. The Rev. Douglas Daily, interim rector at St. Andrew's, will be the officiant.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and

Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.


After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to soothe us and to draw us closer to the presence of God. The congregation also joins in the spoken parts of the liturgy: the reciting of the Confession and the Creed, as well as singing the hymns.

Please join us for this service. A reception will follow in Room 325.



CROP HUNGER WALK - October 16



Parishioners of all ages are encouraged to join the State College CROP Hunger Walk on October 16! The easy 5K walk will begin and end at St. Paul's United Methodist Church. Registration begins at 1:30; the walk begins at 2:00. Over the next few weeks, the St. Andrew's Purple People Feeders will be collecting pledges from family and friends, and we will join together wearing purple on October 16 to walk as a team. We hope to be a very visible part of the walk through downtown State College. Family members, friends, and pets are encouraged to put on some purple and join us!

Twenty-five percent of the funds raised in the State College CROP Hunger Walk goes directly to the State College Food Bank. The rest is used by Church World Service globally to provide food and water, as well as resources that empower people to meet their own needs, such as seeds and tools, wells and water systems, technical training and micro-enterprise loans.

It is really easy to join the team and help us fight hunger; just visit the <u>St. Andrew's Purple People Feeders</u> team page. Once a member, you can send out emails and post on social media to ask for donations from family and friends that live far and near. All walkers who raise at least \$150 online by October 2 will receive a free CROP Hunger Walk t-shirt.

PARISHIONERS' MINISTRY



The Parishioners' Ministry of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church has been an ongoing active outreach program since 1958. It provides modest assistance to people in the community facing unexpected financial emergencies. Parishioners' Ministry stewards work closely with social agencies in town to make sure the people we help have realistic plans to manage their own resources over the long term.

Supported by contributing parishioners, St. Andrew's sets aside a certain amount for Parishioners' Ministry in the general operating budget every year, to be paid out in monthly installments. Other sources of PM funds are memorial gifts, contributions from individual parishioners and occasional special gifts. We are most grateful to the parish for its continued support.

However, our resources, and those of the agencies that call on us for help, are stretched thin. It is more and more difficult to make funds available for the entire month. This past month we had to turn people away by the 16th of September.

As the cold weather approaches, we could use some extra help. All contributions are greatly appreciated and we try to be good stewards of our funds. Please make checks payable to St. Andrew's with Parishioners' Ministry on the memo line. Thank you for helping to keep this ministry ongoing.

FRIDAY NIGHT FILMS





Mother Teresa (1986) October 21

Father Doug will introduce this powerful and inspiring film that is considered the definitive portrait of the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize winner, Mother Teresa. Shot 'on the run' over a period of 5 years in 10 countries on 4 continents, the award winning film follows Mother Teresa into the world's most troubled spots. From the war in Beirut to Guatemala under seige, from the devastated streets of Calcutta to the ghettoes of the South Bronx, the film is an experience of the way Mother Teresa transcends all political, religious and social barriers with her works of love.



The Innocents (2016) November 11


Set in the aftermath of World War II, the quietly powerful drama "The Innocents" shows women of faith working side by side with nonbelievers to bring light to a dark, horrifying world. Based on the experience of Red Cross doctor Madeleine Pauliac, the movie opens in December 1945, as a Benedictine nun desperately seeks help from a French Red Cross dispensary in Warsaw. A young doctor named Mathilde is soon drawn into a tragic situation at a Polish convent: Months after a brutal sexual assault by Russian soldiers, one of the sisters is about to give birth. Six others are also with child. Yet who are the film's innocents? Are they the nuns, who have been assaulted, or

their infant children? Or are they the viewers who are unaware of this slice of brutal history?



Entertaining Angels: The Dorothy Day Story (1996) December 9


Dorothy Day is no saint. She lives hard, makes mistakes, and endures the consequences, but the unquenchable fire burning within her cannot be contained. Dorothy wants to make a difference. During the Depression, she vows to house the homeless, feed the hungry and tend the sick. Easily said. Not easily done when her total finances amount to 97 cents in a battered canister. Yet Dorothy persists, walking on frequently stormy waters of faith. Popular stars and important themes combine in this compelling true story of the "American Mother Teresa".



The Song of Bernadette (1943) January 13


The Song of Bernadette is a reverent recounting of the life of St. Bernadette of Lourdes. As a teen-aged peasant girl growing up in the tiny French village of Lourdes in the 19th century, Bernadette experiences a vision of the Virgin Mary in a nearby grotto. At least, she believes that she did. The religious and political "experts" of the region cannot accept the word of a silly little girl, and do their best to get her to renounce her claims. The film was a critical great success. *The Song of Bernadette* won four Oscars in the 1943 Academy Awards: Best Actress in a Leading Role (Jennifer Jones), Best Art Direction, Best Cinematography and Best Score.



COMMUNITY CAFÉ



The Community Café could use a few good volunteers! Simply put, the Community Café serves a free meal every Thursday evening, to everyone who wants one, regardless of circumstances. Our policy is to be as generous as we can, in whatever way we can, to everyone we can.

Remember, the Café is not just about a free meal. Of course, that is our primary focus, but we also want to make the atmosphere warm, friendly and inviting. We have patrons who don't have anyone to share a meal with, who are lonely, or whose only time to be with anyone else is this particular Thursday. Imagine being in that situation and then walking into a room where someone has not only saved a seat for you, but has placed a loaf of cinnamon raisin bread on your table just because they know you like it.

The Café also does not just load up a plate and shove it at someone through a window. We are not a prison. We have a weekly menu, and people who may never have the opportunity to go to a restaurant and order their own food have that opportunity with us. And to that end, we strive to make it the best possible dining experience in town. Ron Rovansek, the Café coordinator, states with pride: 'There are many Thursdays when the best meal you can get in State College is at the Community Café."

The Café could use volunteers who can be placed on a regular team and serve about once a month. You can always trade with other volunteers if you cannot make your regularly scheduled time. We also need people who can come in during the day on Thursday to help prep food. Also, do not worry if you do not have kitchen experience. We can show you the ropes and soon you will be slicing and dicing with the best of them.

The Café is open every Thursday from 5PM-7PM. The meal is free and everyone is welcome. Donations are accepted but they are never expected.

ST. ANDREW'S VESTRY UPDATE: September 2016



Vestry met on Monday, September 19. Once again, monthly contributions continue to be down, and we continue to show a deficit for the month and for the year. Spending is on track with the 2016 budget, but income is behind budget expectations. Now that the new academic year has begun, vestry urges you to make contributions and pledge payments regularly, and if behind in your pledge commitment, make additional contributions to 'catch up' for the year. Over 80% of the St. Andrew's operating budget is based upon pledge support making each individual pledge important in the support of life at St. Andrew's. If you cannot regularly attend

services, contributions may be mailed directly to the church office c/o Mary Andrew.

Updates to the St. Andrew's website have been completed, and all are invited to explore features of the updated site. In addition, software used in the church office for day-to-day operations, as well as for church accounting, is moving to a cloud-based integrated system that will allow all staff to easily access software and parish data.

The parish profile and the rector search processes are moving forward. All members of St. Andrew's are urged to participate in the upcoming listening events. Responses from the parish survey will be analyzed and combined with data from the listening events and compiled into a parish profile that will be made available to prospective rector candidates.

Fr. Doug reviewed the active ending to the summer and announced a full slate of events to launch the parish into fall.

ST. ANDREW'S FINANCIAL REPORT AUGUST 2016

This is a summary of the church finances as of the end of August. As you can see, there is a deficit for August (the latest month that figures are complete) and a cumulative deficit for the year. The level of contributions to date is at 95% of the budgeted prediction, and expense is at 97% of the budgeted prediction. This explains the current deficit.

Please remember our church operates almost entirely on parishioner's contributions. With everyone's help in the remaining quarter of the year, we can meet our budget and end the year in the black.


We Thought of You Today
