On the twenty-third we will celebrate our new ministry together. Part of the service will be the institution and induction of me as the sixth rector of St. Andrew's. However, the service, and the ministry we are celebrating, is not all about me. Quite the contrary, I am blessed to be the rector of a parish with a very vibrant ministry. There are amazing outreach ministries happening at St. Andrew's. There is wonderful fellowship. There is strong Christian education and formation. I have no illusions that you've been waiting around for your new rector before doing any ministry in Christ's name. My ministry as your rector is new, and our ministry together is new. So, what we are celebrating is our new shared ministry—priest and people.

This is indeed something to celebrate. For my part, I couldn't be happier to be serving among you. As you know by now, coming to St. Andrew's is coming home for me. But it's more than that. Being in an exciting parish in a college town comes with so many opportunities. Since I've been here, I have encountered folks of good faith with a desire to serve God. It has been a joy being here since mid-October. Now that my family is here with me, I am ready to move forward in ministry with you.

We are all ministers by virtue of our baptisms. The ministry of a parish works because of the partnership between priest and parishioners. We all bring our gifts for ministry together, gifts of stewardship, gifts of prayer, gifts of work, gifts of discernment, gifts of teaching, gifts of hospitality, just to name a few. With the guidance and encouragement of the Holy Spirit, we move together into this new phase of ministry at St. Andrew's bringing our personal gifts and offering them in community.

The service of Celebration of New Ministry includes several symbolic presentations that highlight the ministry of the rector in a new parish. The thing to remember is that these presentations have two sides: those who present and he who receives. Those who present are representatives of the congregation. The presentations are symbolic of our shared ministry, in some cases my ministry to you as a priest, in other cases ministry that is done cooperatively, and even ministry of the people supported by the priest.

If the service were all about the new rector, and if the ministry of the church was all dependent on the clergy, there would not be much ministry happening at all. We all employ our gifts in the contexts of our lives. My job is to help build you up, so you can do your ministry, whether that ministry is part of a church ministry or not. So, I pray that you will be able to be present as we celebrate our new shared ministry on January 23 at 7:00 p.m. And I look forward to being part of that ministry with you as it unfolds over the years to come.

These are important dates in the governance of our parish and we encourage parish participation. Please watch for more information on these events.

We ended 2017 with pledge payments of more than \$407,000; thank you for these payments. We are still hoping for more 2018 pledges so that we can continue the programs of our parish at the current level. We have received 161 pledges for \$393,295, leaving us well short of our \$440,000 pledge goal. If you have not yet submitted your pledge for 2018, we hope you will provide it soon.

As January comes to an end, Sharon Rovansek and I will be ending our terms on Vestry and as Wardens. It has been our great pleasure to serve the parish in this way. Thank you to all for your help in meeting the needs of our parish.

Guidelines for vestry and delegate election are noted in the church by-laws. Voting will take place on the morning of January 28, 2017, before and after the 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services, from 7:30 a.m. to 12 a.m. Ballots will note the names of all nominees and electors will be asked to indicate their selections. Electors are all adult members of the parish. Adult members of the parish must be over 16 years old, have been baptized, confirmed and/or received by a Bishop of the Episcopal Church, and have had their membership officially transferred to St. Andrew's (if previously a member of another parish). If you have any questions about your eligibility to vote, please contact Allison Shea in the St. Andrew's office for verification.

Absentee Ballots

NOMINEES FOR VESTRY CLASS OF 2018

BRUCE CRAMER



I live with my wife Diane and daughter Lucy on a small produce farm in Nittany Valley. My first career as a commercial photographer, great fun for over 30 years, is winding down as we work to build up the vegetable patch.

We've attended St Andrews about five years, settled in as regulars at the 5:00 Sunday evening service. The informality and easy fellowship has helped us transition from a smaller parish to this larger one.

My parents raised their three boys as Methodists. After a typical college age rejection of my faith, I began to reexamine Christianity as a valid path for the spiritual seeker. For the past twenty years my nose has been stuck in one book or another trying to sort out the good from the bad in our Christian tradition. Of course, all theology is worthless if it doesn't impact the way we live our lives.

Anyway, I was confirmed in the Episcopal Church in September 1999 at Christ Church Williamsport, where the Rector had a penchant for high-church ceremony. My training to serve at the altar was in that tradition. Perhaps with the zeal typical of the convert, my family and I became involved in the life of that parish. By 2005 I was asked to chair the discernment committee that called the next Rector. Later I served two years as Senior Warden. My family has made two trips to South Sudan to support the children of St. Bartholomew's and Amazing Grace orphanages. I can never adequately express what that experience has meant to us. There Jesus' love is literally saving lives.


