As I write this, Sian and I are planning to close on the purchase of our new home in Warrior's Mark in just a few days. For most of us our home will be the largest investment we ever make. Speaking as one who is about to sign all the papers that will bind me to a piece of property for the next 30 years, it is rather daunting to see the numbers involved. I must say, it helps to think of it as an investment. As an investment, however, a house is a unique thing. Most investments involve some short-term sacrifice (the money invested now) to enable a long-term pay off (the appreciated asset in the future). For most investments it's all about the future. A house is different because, while it is certainly an asset that you expect to appreciate over time, it is also the place where you live every day. So, it is about the future, but it is just as much about the here and now. Some day we hope to recoup all the money that we've put into our homes when we sell it for a big, fat profit. In the meantime, we try to make it a comfortable and practical place for our daily life.

In the gospels we here Jesus talk about the kingdom of God more than any other subject (Matthew prefers kingdom of heaven). I think that when most of us think about the kingdom of God, or heaven, we think about a future reality, someplace we will go when we die. More than that, we tend to think about this kingdom as separate from our current reality. As a child we may have pictured heaven as a place in the clouds where angels with wings strummed golden harps. However you picture it, you likely think of heaven as a place quite different from this world. But does this idea of a kingdom of God as a separate and future reality agree with the kingdom that Jesus is always talking about?

Granted, this is an arguable point, but I would assert that the real Good News that Jesus proclaimed is that citizenship in the kingdom of God is open to us now, and in a more full and complete way in the future. When Jesus proclaimed, "The kingdom of God has come near," (Mark 1:15) he was telling us that he himself is the point of entry into this kingdom, and that it is not separated from us in time or space. The "I am" statements of John's gospel function in the same way, for instance, "I am the gate" (John 10:9) We see how Jesus is the way by, or through, which one is to enter into the kingdom of God. There is a kind of climax in chapter 11 when Jesus is confronted by a distraught Martha. She accuses Jesus of being responsible for her brother Lazarus' death by his absence. When Jesus tells her that Lazarus will rise again, she is not very comforted, as she thinks he is talking about some general resurrection in the future on, "the last day." To which Jesus responds, "I am the resurrection and the life." In other words, "resurrection is now, not later, and here, not somewhere else." Of course, Jesus goes on to raise Lazarus from the dead. (John 11:17-44)

If we see Jesus' ministry as a way of making real and visible in this world and in this time the longed-for kingdom of God, we begin to think differently about our faith in him. We believe and practice our faith not just for some future reward but for the chance to be part of that kingdom now. We choose to live in the kingdom of God every day. By contrast, we can choose to reject living in that kingdom by choosing to live without faith and hope. The *already* aspect of God's kingdom is not to negate the *not yet* aspect. Clearly, God's kingdom is not established fully in this sinful and broken world. Someday Jesus will return to establish that kingdom in its completeness. Until then, we continuously choose where we will live now and in the future. For the present time we work as partners with

God in establishing his kingdom in this world, building it up in as much as we live the Good News of love, life, and hope.

VESTRY UPDATE, Rick Hoover, Clerk of the Vestry

April 2018



The May vestry meeting was held on Tuesday, May 8. Treasurer, Sue Stephenson, reported that April was a good month financially. Although maintenance expenses were a bit higher than usual, they were offset by increased contributions helping to strengthen the overall financial picture as we move into the summer months. With the coming of summer vacations, the vestry urges everyone to regularly meet their pledge commitments. Meeting the expenses of the continuing ministry of the parish depends on regular and steady monthly income. Please remember that your contributions may be sent to the church office care of Mary Andrew.

Senior Warden, Ted Christopher, noted that St. Andrew's has joined the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes (CEEP) and vestry is looking to take advantage of the organization's benefits for parish leadership and good stewardship. As noted previously, CEEP is a "mission focused community of leaders, stewards, collaborators, and Christ followers ... devoted to helping the local church have greater relevance and impact."

Marisa Ferger, chair of the Children and Youth Education Committee, provided feedback from the listening sessions focused on the Sunday morning education programs. She noted concerns about the overall structure and timing of events on Sunday morning. More consideration will be given to the timing and nature of the education programs, children, youth, and adult, provided between Sunday morning services as well as the timing of the two services themselves.

Administration and governance of the Community Café was a topic of some discussion, and vestry decided to create a board of directors to oversee its overall operation. Ron Rovanseck will serve as the executive director reporting to the board.

This report shows the income and expenses for March and April. What a difference Easter makes! We generally see increases in contributions in the month when Easter occurs. Also there was a significant increase in pledging in response to Sr. Warden Ted Christopher's request to the congregation to consider increasing their pledges to avoid the year-end withdrawal from endowment funds to cover the expected deficit. At this time, we have reduced the expected deficit to just under \$15,000 from the original amount of \$36,630. Many thanks to those who helped to reduce the financial burden this would cause the church. We would be grateful for any further pledge increases from the parish as well.

There is good news as well. The church received our annual distribution from the Kathy Palmer Outreach Fund. For many years, Kathy was dedicated to charitable works and her husband, Howard, set up a fund in her memory held at the Centre Foundation to enable the church to continue the kinds of activities that Kathy did. From the \$5300 received this year, we have given \$1500 to Interfaith Human Services, and \$1000 to Parishioners' Ministry so far. In addition, we received \$604 from the Stump Family Music fund, also held at the Centre Foundation. Many thanks to the Rev. Derald Stump and family for promoting the music ministry here at St. Andrew's.

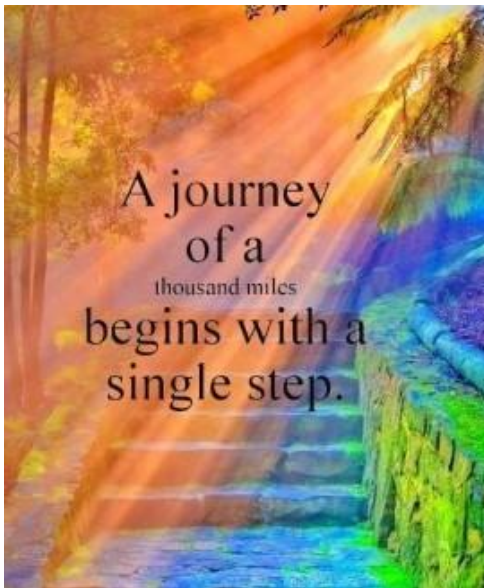

Listening through Lectio

In May we sat with the Gospel reading (John 15:26-27, 16:4b-15) where Jesus tells the disciples that he will leave them and will be sending the Advocate. During the first reading we are invited to let the words of the passage wash over us and listen as if the words are brand new. The phrases that stood out were “about righteousness, because I am going to the Father”, “the ruler of this world has been condemned” and “testify”. During the second reading we listen again, bringing with us the wisdom of the community. The phrases that stood out included “he will prove the world wrong about sin righteousness and judgement” and “he will take what is mine and declare it to you”.

During the third and fourth readings we are invited to notice connections to our everyday lives and enter into a conversation with God. This time group members consistently connected with the theme of confidence. In our everyday lives there was an acknowledgement of the times we lack confidence, maybe because we are feeling attacked or feeling unsure because we do not have enough information. At the same time there was a sense of hope because the Holy Spirit is advocating for us and we will not be judged by standards of this world. During the final time of contemplation there seemed to be an invitation to rely more fully on God and that true confidence is grounded in God and our relationship with the Holy Spirit. This can be frightening because it is easier to feel confident in something solid that we can see. Some of us might rely on a plan or rulebook, others might rely on knowledge, still others might rely on logic and reason. All of these are good gifts given to us by God, but when leaned on too heavily, they have the potential to interfere with noticing the meaning that God would have us see.

We thank you for allowing us to share our experience with you, and hope that these reflections may bear fruit in your contemplation as well. We are taking a break over the summer and will only be meeting once in July and will announce the date once it is set.

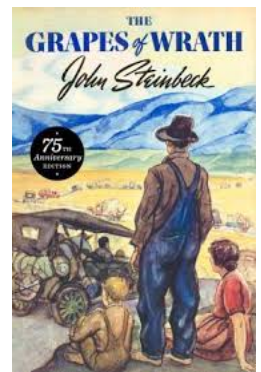

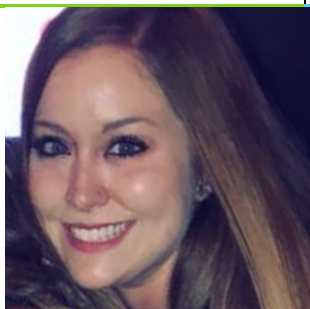

Alyson is the daughter of Greg and Tina Ruberto.



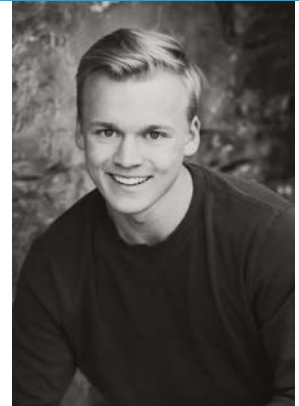

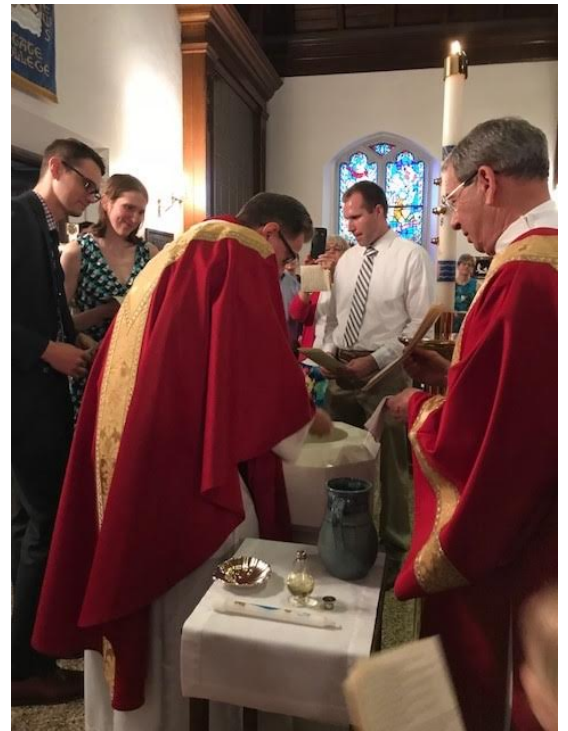
