St. Andrew's Day Service and Potluck



On November 30 we will celebrate our patronal feast: St. Andrew's Day. We will have a service in the church at 6:00 p.m. followed by a potluck dinner.

It is customary for parishes to make a big celebration on the feast day of the saint to whom they are dedicated. St. Andrew's Day, however, has proven a difficult day to keep for our parish. Coming as it does at the end of November, it is always close to Thanksgiving. Obviously, people travel and have plans with their families that time of year. We are allowed to celebrate our patronal feast on a convenient close Sunday, but the definition of the First Sunday in Advent is the Sunday closest to St. Andrew's Day. We don't want to coopt the First Sunday in Advent. What about the Sunday before that? Well, that is always the Last Sunday after Pentecost, also known as 'Christ the King' Sunday, another special Sunday we don't want to lose in our calendar. This year, we hit it just right. St. Andrew's Day falls on a Friday. It will be fun to get together and remember this Apostle and our heritage.

Andrew was the brother of Peter. They were both fishermen. Jesus called them to follow him and the two brothers dropped everything and followed Jesus. In John's Gospel, it is Andrew who meets Jesus first and then brings his brother along, telling him, "Come and see!" Andrew is also the patron saint of Scotland. The Episcopal Church has a historic connection to Scotland because when England - still obviously holding a grudge after the Revolutionary War - refused to ordain a bishop for our new country's new Church, the Scottish Episcopal Church did so, thereby giving us the ability to sustain our ordained ministry and giving us our name. The "X" shaped Cross of St. Andrew in the Episcopal shield, made up of nine small white crosses on a field of blue, is a nod to our Church's Scottish heritage. To honor our church's historic connection to Scotland, I am hiring a bagpiper to come and play as part of our service. You are encouraged to bring Scottish foods to share at the potluck

I hope you can join us for this special celebration in our parish life. And let's hope this becomes an annual tradition.

The October vestry meeting was held on Tuesday, October 9. Income for the month of September was helped greatly by the fifth Sunday of the month, and the year-to-date operating income moved out of the red. In addition to providing for the parish spiritual needs through regular services, pastoral care, and Christian education, St. Andrew's supports the community by hosting two weeks of the Out of the Cold program, by providing meeting space for weekly AA meetings, and through the Community Café. Your regular financial support is necessary in order to sustain the many active ministries of the church. By regularly meeting your pledge commitment, you will greatly help the church's financial picture and allow it to continue doing God's work through regular worship, education, and outreach to the community.

If you are reading this, you have probably received this year's Stewardship mailing which included Time and Talent and Pledge cards as well as a brochure with information about online giving. This year we have designated All Saints Sunday (November 4) as Commitment Sunday, when all pledges for the upcoming year should be brought to church and placed in the offering plate. This is a custom in many churches and helps us all to remember that the bounty we enjoy is rightly understood as the bounty and blessings of God. Whether you make your pledge online or on paper, we encourage you to bring your cards to church on November 4 to include with the offering. ONLINE GIVING

Online giving has launched and can now be used to make contributions to the church in several ways.

Gifts can be made with or without an account, through the [church webpage](#)



Our new secure online giving platform, Realm, will give every parishioner, including those who choose to give in person, access to their own giving history and other features through a personalized online account. You should have received an invitation to join Realm last month allowing you to create your Realm account, login and password. **We will be sending a second invitation the first week of November to those who have not replied.** If you have misplaced the original or decided you would like to set up online giving in connection with your 2019 pledge, you will have the information at hand.



Once you have created your account, click on "Giving" and you will be able to make a gift, set up a recurring gift, view your pledge history, and coming soon: make a pledge for 2019. Personal giving records will remain accessible only by the parishioner and the Financial Secretary. Credit card and banking details are securely encrypted.



Text offerings can be made by texting StAndrewSC, followed by the dollar amount, (StAndrewSC \$100) to 73256. Follow the prompts to complete the giving process. You will receive a receipt via text and email.

Online and text gifts can be made by credit card, or through an ACH automatic withdrawal from a bank account. We encourage those making a gift online to consider helping us cover the fees involved in processing these transactions by checking the box to pitch in a few cents or dollars to help cover processing costs (2.5% for credit cards and 1% for ACH).

Halloween Beyond Monsters!



One interesting way to extend the meaning of Halloween past the scare and sweet factors, is to incorporate All Souls Day into your home. Find a little space somewhere to lay down a special tablecloth, put out some flowers, and set up pictures of loved ones and other people important to you who have died, along with objects connected with their history, habits and personalities.



Use it as a prompt to tell the family stories! We've done to have conversations about why we like to celebrate scary things at Halloween. When my kids were younger, I especially liked to have Day of the Dead skeletons (*calacas*) around the house - I made a connection between their absurd and almost cheerful presentation of death and the confidence in new and greater life we have from Jesus!

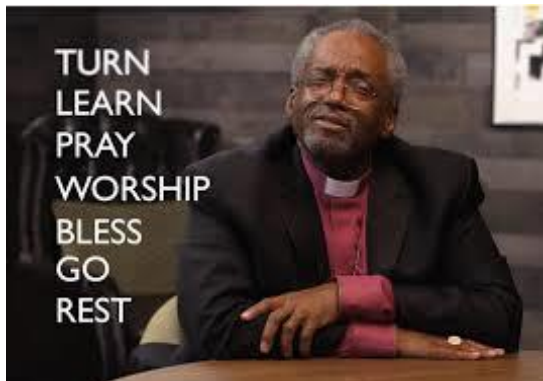

IT. WAS. EPIC.

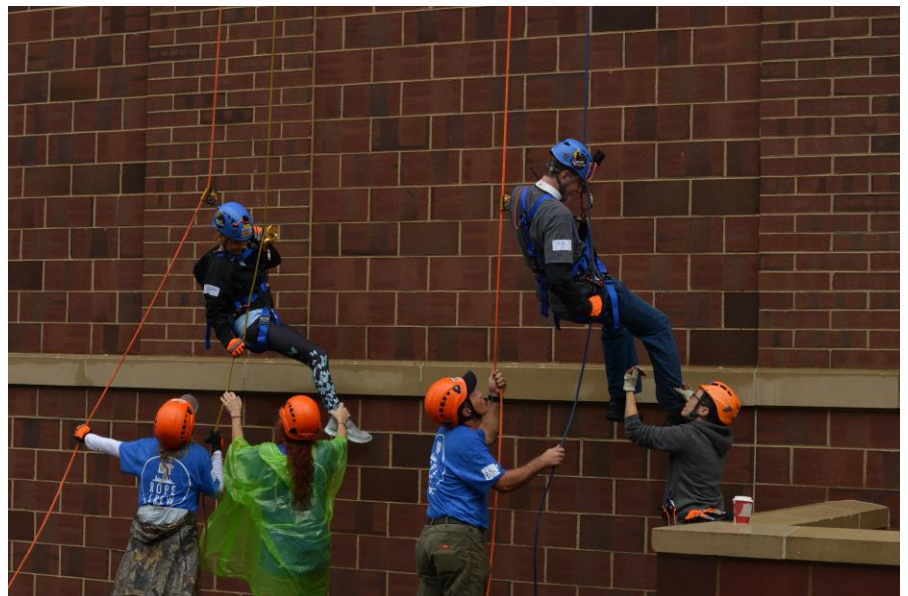
Crowds gathered, people cheered. Radio and TV stations came to do stories; so did newspapers and magazines.

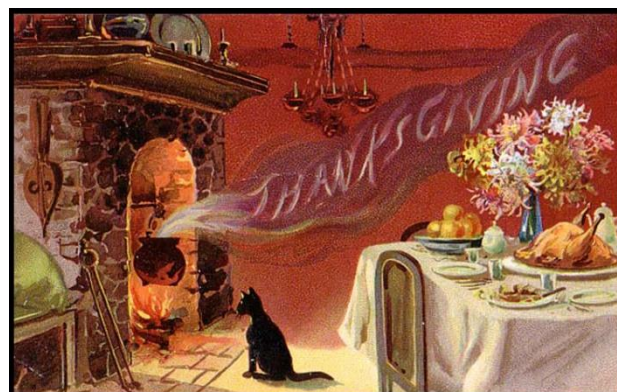
COMMUNITY CAFÉ

Choral Evensong

Sunday, November 4

5:00 p.m. – Church

This Sunday the Adult Choir of St. Andrew's will sing the service of choral evensong. Music will include the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in C by Charles Villers Stanford, anthems by Christopher Tye and Simon Lole, Preces and Responses by Richard Shephard and organ music by David Lasky and Johann Pachelbel. The Rev. Gene Tucker, rector of St. John's, Huntington, will be the officiant.



Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to soothe us and to draw us closer to the presence of God. The congregation joins in the spoken parts of the liturgy: the reciting of the Confession and the Creed, as well as singing the hymns.

Please join us for this service. A reception will follow in Room 325. The next evensong will be Sunday, February 3, 2019

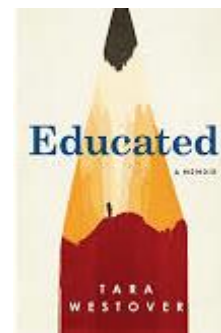
