Ramblings at the One-Year Mark



October 16 will mark one year since I began as the rector of St. Andrew's. It seems natural to pause to take stock of where we've come in the past year together. I feel like it has been a whirlwind year, though it is difficult to name particular major accomplishments. There are a lot of things in the works. The campus ministry effort is taking off, though we are having trouble getting students involved. We continue to work and pray for this ministry of outreach to college students to be fruitful. Our new Newcomers' Committee is moving forward with some greeters at the 10:00 service but could use more people willing to enter into this ministry of hospitality and welcoming.

Outreach ministries are going great. We will be the first church to host the Out of the Cold (OOTC) cold-weather shelter this fall. The Community Café is working to institutionalize its operations with a new board of directors that was recently appointed by the vestry and is in the process of organizing itself for its ministry of oversight. The property committee, under the new leadership of Sarah Klinetob-Lowe, is assessing our aging buildings for any major repairs or maintenance issues, as well as contracting for an engineering study to look at air conditioning the church. The vestry has appointed a Safety Committee to create emergency plans and make recommendations to better avoid or be prepared for various emergencies.

These are a few of the ongoing projects that occupy my time and my mental capacity. I share them all as works in progress. So much of ministry, and indeed life, is like that. We work on projects, with some success and some failure, but the work never seems to be complete. Even when we can declare a project over and done, we find ourselves picking it apart and finding fault, things we could have done better or differently. Part of being a Christian is realizing that our life's work will always be incomplete. We will always depend on our savior to bring our meager efforts to any meaningful end. We also realize that we must not sit back and wait for God to do all the work. In fact, God has recruited us to be co-creators and partners in bringing his kingdom into this world. More than that, God has gifted each one of us with personal talents as well as real resources in order to carry out the ministry to which we are called in Christ's name. St. Andrew's, or any church, is just a collection of individuals who are called to be the Body of Christ in the world. We strive together to be faithful to that calling even as we realize that without God's help we can accomplish nothing.

Pardon my ramblings as I look back on a year at St. Andrew's. In addition to looking back over the past year I find myself looking forward with great excitement about where we are going together as a parish. One of the more exciting celebrations we are planning is a special celebration of our patronal feast. St. Andrew's Day is on November 30. That is a problematical date to have a special celebration due to Thanksgiving, Christ the King Sunday and the First Sunday of Advent all happening around that time each year. This year, however, it falls on a Friday the week after Thanksgiving. We plan to have a service on November 30 at 6:00 p.m. with a potluck meal following. It will be a good time to get together and have fun as we remember the apostle in whose honor our parish is named. Celebrating is a big part of the Christian life as well. We celebrate the gifts we have received at God's hand. We celebrate our community in Christ. We celebrate the call to ministry. Most of all we celebrate the gift of eternal life we have been given through the sacrifice of Jesus, our Lord.

I look forward to many more years of celebrations with you!

VESTRY UPDATE, Rick Hoover, Clerk of the Vestry September 2018



The September vestry meeting was held on Tuesday, September 11. Once again, income for the month was light, and again expenses exceeded income. For the first time this year, the net operating income for the year, that is the total left over when operating expenses are subtracted from income, went negative. While this situation is certainly less than desirable, it is not yet cause for serious alarm. Consider it a wake-up call. As stated many times in this regular update, vestry urges everyone to meet pledge commitments even if not able to attend regular services. St. Andrew's diligently and faithfully continues to provide its many ministries through rain, snow, sleet, hail, and hot or cold weather. Your regular financial support is necessary in order to sustain the many active ministries of the church. If you cannot participate in the services in person, your contributions may be sent to the church office care of Mary Andrew. To make the contribution process even easier through online giving, the REALM system is up and available for members of St. Andrew's. You should have received an email from Allison Shea in the church office with details for setting up your own account. Online contributions can be easily made on a one-time basis or set up as a regular deduction from one of your accounts. The regular meeting of your pledge commitment will greatly help the church's financial picture and allow it to continue doing God's work through regular worship, education, and outreach to the community.

After reviewing the discernment committee report and having a very positive interview with Kevin Barron, vestry unanimously moved to recommend him for postulancy for the priesthood. Having passed through this stage of his journey to the priesthood, Kevin still has a long road ahead of him. Please support Kevin in his journey with your prayers and encouragement.

The stewardship committee has been active in planning for the upcoming stewardship program to be launched this fall. Now is a good time to begin thinking about your role in supporting St. Andrew's in 2019. Watch for more information in the *Net* as well as in the regular weekly emails.

Efforts to revive the campus ministry are continuing with services in the activities room of the Pasquerilla Center scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on September 16, 23, and 30. All members of the St. Andrew's parish family are invited to support these services on campus.



ONLINE GIVING UPDATE

Online giving has launched and can now be used to make contributions to the church in several ways.

Gifts can be made with or without an account, through the [church webpage](#)



Our new secure online giving platform, Realm, will give every parishioner, including those who choose to give in person, access to their own giving history and other features through a personalized online account. You should have received an invitation to join Realm last month allowing you to create your Realm account, login and password.



Once you have created your account, click on "Giving" and you will be able to make a gift, set up a recurring gift, view your pledge history, and coming soon: make a pledge for 2019. Personal giving records will remain accessible only by the parishioner and the Financial Secretary. Credit card and banking details are securely encrypted.



Text offerings can be made by texting StAndrewSC, followed by the dollar amount, (StAndrewSC \$100) to 73256. Follow the prompts to complete the giving process. You will receive a receipt via text and email.

Online and text gifts can be made by credit card, or through an ACH automatic withdrawal from a bank account. We encourage those making a gift online to consider helping us cover the fees involved in processing these transactions by checking the box to pitch in a few cents or dollars to help cover processing costs (2.5% for credit cards and 1% for ACH).


BOOK GROUP
