INTEGRITY OF CENTRAL PENNSYLVANIA



Here is a description of the book: This 2011 memoir tells of Ackerman's marriage to novelist Paul West, a long-time Penn State faculty member, who suffered a stroke that left him without language. Ackerman, herself a Penn State alumna and author of *The Zookeeper's Wife*, recounts her husband's recovery. One critic described the story as "A gorgeously engrossing, affecting, sweetly funny, and mind-opening love story of crisis, determination, creativity, and repair."

Women of all ages from the parish (friends are welcome, too!) are invited to join a wonderful group of caring and compassionate Christian women from St. Andrew's every first and third Thursday of each month. We share in conversation and community, study, and reflection, prayer, and... coffee! We also put our compassion into action as the "hands and feet of Christ" when an opportunity arises to serve our brothers and sisters near and far.

As I think about planning for our upcoming time together in Compassionate Life, I remember an email I received recently from Mavis Stapleford, a faithful servant of Christ and member of St. Andrew's and Daughters of the King: Yesterday as I was praying for those touched by Hurricane Harvey, I seemed to suffer from

"compassion fatigue" -- something from which we all suffer when we feel overwhelmed by the needs of others (and we know we're supposed to give those worries to Jesus). I hunted for some words that would help and found them - guess where - in the words of St. Julian of Norwich. She wrote: "The best prayer is to rest in the goodness of God, knowing that goodness can reach right down to our lowest depths of need."

When I think about compassion fatigue, I think about the Women of Compassionate Life and how over the years, in their desire and commitment to follow the will of God, they have helped so many in need, seemingly tirelessly and joyfully. I wonder how many feel overwhelmed by recent world events? To me, resting in the goodness of God does not mean inaction or complacency, but trusting in the goodness of God to point us in the right direction at the right time to best offer our gifts. We can't do it all; but bit by bit, woman by woman, our individual offerings of light to each other and to the world can create a huge beacon of light in the darkness which surrounds us, providing hope, direction, and gladness and singleness of heart.

I hope you can join us on Thursday, September 7. As part of our first 'compassion in action,' please bring new, still-in-the-package underwear, all sizes, (for men, women, boys and girls) for the victims of Hurricane Harvey. YOUTH CHOIR AT ST. ANDREW'S



September is almost upon us and it will soon be time to resume Youth Choir activities. The Youth Choir is open to all children ages 7-14, boys and girls. Children participating in worship is a tradition that dates back to at least the 4th Century, where we discover the earliest records of children singing during worship. Young people leading in worship serves as an important reminder that we are all children of God and that God has blessed the youngest among us with gifts for ministry. The Youth Choir is the earliest opportunity for

the young people of St. Andrew's to become involved in a worship leadership ministry. Singing in the Youth Choir gives our children a gift that keeps on giving. Singing helps us to connect with our faith, and with a community of singers that forms strong bonds both with each other and with the church. The objectives of our Youth Choir include teaching sound musical skills including note and rhythm skills and singing techniques while singing music in a variety of musical styles, but also include developing leadership skills through training children to lead our congregation in our worship services. These are skills that pay huge lifetime dividends, and help our children find their place in our world. Singing helps children be a part of a group and helps make new friends. Singing in the choir also gives the children a well-balanced experience and education in the church. Aaaaaaaand...... singing in the Youth Choir is fun!

Rehearsals are held from 4:15 PM-5:15 PM on Thursday afternoons. The first rehearsal is September 7. The children may come at 4:00 PM for a snack beforehand. The choir sings for the first Sunday of each month, October through May. Other services include Lessons and Carols in December and the early service on Christmas Eve, plus the middle service on Easter Day. The Youth Choir has been a vital part of St. Andrew's for years and years. Please come help us continue to make that happen.

Why come sing? Well.....

- 1. You never have to worry about what to wear.
- 2. You have excellent seats and a reserved seat on all major holidays–including Christmas Eve and Easter!
- 3. Offering plate is never passed to the choir.
- 4. It's exactly like singing in the shower, except you¹re wearing a robe and people are actually listening.
- 5. Sitting with a group in the chancel every Sunday is excellent practice in case you're ever called for jury duty.
- 6. Serving others--you are leaders in the worship services of the parish.
- 7. Singing is therapeutic. It is a time to put aside the pressures and concerns of the day.
- 8. Intellectual Stimulation—when you make music, you are using both sides of your brain simultaneously.
- 9. Singing in choir allows us to participate in something that is so much bigger than our selves.
- 10. Serving the Lord—considering all God does for us, it's a way to give something back in service.

Perhaps numbers 9 and 10 are the most important from that list. Ponder what St. Andrew's means to you, all the joy it has given you and what you can give back. If you are interested or have question, please feel free to contact the music staff:

As of the end of July, the church has a sizable surplus due in part to reduced expenses from operating costs and certain staff salaries in the summer. Income from July was quite a bit above normal when we received a gift from the estate of former parishioner Jane Danz. She very kindly remembered St. Andrew's in her will, and this has been deposited into the General Endowment Fund which is held in the Episcopal Church Foundation investment fund. Most bequests to the church go into this fund unless specified for other purposes by the donor.

The Community Café pie sale fundraiser during the Arts Festival was quite a success, not only for providing a welcome oasis from the activities in the streets, but also in raising over \$2200. This was used to purchase two commercial quality chest freezers for the use of the Community Café. Many thanks to those who joined in the effort to make this happen.

Vestry met on Monday evening, August 21. The Finance Committee reported that July was a good month, and the overall year-to-date operating income continues to be positive. As we move past the end of summer and into a new academic year, please continue to meet your pledge commitments by either placing them in the collection plates, or if out of town, by sending them directly to the church office. Your continued support is needed and much appreciated.

Vestry officially accepted the Rector Employment Agreement with Fr. Jeff Packard. Fr. Packard's first official day at St. Andrew's will be on Monday, October 16. Please warmly welcome him when you meet him. Linda Mace, Senior Warden, has been very busy with arranging supply clergy for the services during the period between Fr. Doug's departure and Fr. Jeff's arrival. She has done a great job of helping to ensure a smooth transition period.

The next stewardship program to officially begin on September 17, was briefly discussed. Watch for more information about much-needed pledges to support St. Andrew's and all of its ministries. Remember that nearly all of the funds supporting the St. Andrew's budget come from pledge commitments.
