It's Not Just For Groundhogs



On Sunday, February 2, we will celebrate one of the feasts of our Lord's life. It is the last of the incidents in Luke's infancy narratives in chapter 2. In accordance with the Law, Jesus is presented in the Temple in Jerusalem on the fortieth day after his birth, and redeemed, since he was the firstborn son, with the sacrifice of two turtledoves or two young pigeons (Ex. 13:12-15). And Mary completes her time of purification after having given birth (Lev. 12). On our calendar this is known as The Presentation of Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple, but it is also called Candlemas, since there was a tradition of priests blessing beeswax candles on this day for use in the church or the home throughout the year. We will have a special procession with candles at the 10:00 service that day. Since it is a Feast of Jesus, it takes precedence over the Sunday which would have been the fourth Sunday after the Epiphany. And no, there is no mention in Scripture of whether the infant Jesus saw his shadow or not...

When Joseph and Mary went to the Temple to do what was required according to the Law, Simeon was led by the Spirit to meet them there. He had been told by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before seeing the Lord's Messiah. Upon taking Jesus into his arms, Simeon sings his song, known as the *Nunc dimittis:* (Lk. 2:29-32)

Lord, you now have set your servant free
to go in peace as you have promised;
For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior,
whom you have prepared for all the world
to see:

A Light to enlighten the nations, and the glory of your people Israel.

Simeon ends by informing Mary, "And a sword will pierce your own soul too." Then the aged prophet Anna, also in the Temple that day, "began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem." (Lk 2:38)

This event furthers Jesus' mission of fulfilling the Law, and in some liturgical churches it has been seen as the end of the season of Epiphany. In England, many keep their Christmas trees up until the second of February.

For us it is a reminder that Jesus' mission was complex. His parents did the things prescribed in the Law for him and raised him in a faithful Jewish home. Quickly, though, his ministry went beyond just the House of Israel, and he became a light to enlighten all nations. This savior was for all of God's people, all those who would accept his gift of salvation.

EVENSONG

Organist Gwen Catchen will play music by Johann Pachelbel and David Lasky. The officiant will be the Rev. Jeffrey A. Packard, rector of St. Andrew's.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the Office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy. After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

Please join us for this service. Bring some friends! Come and be refreshed and renewed for the days ahead. A reception will follow in Room 325.

The next Evensong will be Sunday, March 1, 2020, at 5 p.m.

VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry



January 2020

The January vestry meeting was held in conjunction with the vestry's retreat on Saturday, January 11. The vestry met at the Nature Inn at Bald Eagle State Park. The day was devoted to producing the outline of a process for spending 2020 developing a strategic plan for the parish's future. The vestry analyzed our positive resources as well as challenges that we expect to face. A three-phase process was designed: the first phase (educate/inform) will run from now through Lent; the second phase (dream/discern) will run from Easter into the early fall; and the third phase (finalize the plan) will take place in the middle of the fall, with the intention of presenting a detailed strategic plan to the parish at the 2021 annual meeting. Fr. Jeff introduced the strategic planning process in his rector's address at the annual meeting, held on Sunday, January 26.

In regular business, the vestry voted to allow our 2019 budget deficit to stand as is for accounting purposes. The retreat was also the final meeting for the outgoing vestry members: Steven Smith (senior warden), Bruce Cramer, Tom Dauler, and Michele Hamilton. Many thanks again to Steven, Bruce, Tom, and Michele for their dedicated service!



GIVING

Canterbury Society

The name "Canterbury Society" may evoke images of an exclusive or privileged group within our parish. However, it is nothing of the kind. The Canterbury Society is simply made up of those who have included St. Andrew's in their estate plans. This could be a specific bequest in your will, a percentage of your estate, the transfer of a particular asset, or any number of other ways to ensure a legacy of support for your parish. The amount is going to be different for everyone, but the important thing is to consider how you might be a blessing for years beyond your lifetime.



Here's a little history of the Canterbury Society. Back in 1996, Mason Walsh made a \$100,000 contribution to St. Andrew's to establish the Breneman Fund, in memory of his mother and maternal grandparents. Mason Walsh, now deceased, was an attorney; he grew up in St. Andrew's. When we conducted the Capital Campaign in 1996, Mr. Walsh offered another gift of \$100,000 if we could match that sum in deferred giving. The principal sum of the campaign was \$300,000 for current needs.

Many of us wrote our wills to include the church, sometimes simply adding a codicil to an existing will. We more than matched Mr. Walsh's \$100,000 during the campaign: we added \$232,955 in deferred giving, in addition to the \$351,313 in actual funds received for the campaign.

After the very successful campaign, we decided to create The Canterbury Society, to recognize all those people who named our church in their wills. The hope is that we continue to add parishioners to the Society every year, for the long-term financial health of our parish.

We were thrilled when Mr. Walsh added another donation of \$200,000 to the Breneman Fund in December of 2011. There have been many others who have contributed to our endowments over the years, either through their estate or through a direct gift. As you know, the income from these funds has been helping us with our current budget deficit. The funds have proven to be even more important than we realized at the time.

In the past, we hosted dinners to thank people for including the church in their estate plans. We have not held a dinner in the recent past. This year we want to host another thank-you for all those people who have included





Tender Mercies (1983) Rated: PG


A simple story simply told, Tender Mercies is a warm, persuasive tale of hope, with Academy Award winner
