God's Glory in Flesh and Blood

In the fifteenth chapter of his first letter to the Corinthians Paul writes, "What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable. (1 Cor. 15:50) Paul talks about the resurrection of Christ and our participation in it. His overall point is that the body we are—that of flesh and blood, made from the dust of the earth—must somehow be transformed into our heavenly body, a spiritual body. He doesn't explain exactly how this occurs. In fact, he tells us that wondering what this new body will look like is asking the wrong question. The point is: "this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality." (1Cor. 15:53) For Saint Paul this new body is the consequence of Jesus' resurrection, it is our participation in the new life of the new kingdom made possible by his sacrifice, and it is the hope of Christian faith and a life of following Christ.

That there will be a transformation is attested to by the gospel accounts of Jesus' resurrection. When he appears, Jesus is often not recognized at first. There seems to be something different about him. The difference, however, is not so great, for at some point each witness realizes who it is they are meeting. Mary Magdalene knows it is Jesus when he speaks her name in the garden outside his tomb (John 20:16); Peter recognizes him when the beloved disciple proclaims, "It is the Lord!" (John 21:7); Cleopas and his companion have their eyes opened when Jesus breaks the bread (Luke 24:31). So, Jesus is still recognizable, if not at first glance. Furthermore, Jesus' resurrected body still bears the marks of the wounds he received in his passion and crucifixion. He displays them as a means of proving it is indeed him. Something is different, yet there is continuity between the Jesus whom the disciples knew in life and the resurrected Lord.

Transformation is a theme in the Christian life. We present the elements for Communion each week and perceive their transformation only by faith. Bread becomes body and wine becomes blood. As the hymn puts it, "Word made flesh, the bread he taketh, by his word his Flesh to be; wine his sacred Blood he maketh, though the senses fail to see; faith alone the true heart waketh to behold the mystery." (Hymnal 1986 #329) These humble gifts humbly offered on the altar become for us the very presence of God with us and a blessing. What else may be so transformed by God's power and grace?

If the sacrament of Holy Communion is about the transformation of bread and wine into the manifestation of divine presence, the sacrament of Holy Baptism is about the transformation of a human life into the potential for God's love to be demonstrated to the world. We offer ourselves to God's service (or the one we present for baptism) and God's grace not only forgives our sins putting a new and pure heart within us, but also blesses our hands to do ministry in God's holy name. We become the incarnation of God's love in as much as we follow the call to ministry. Not that we are in any way perfect or worthy of God's love and mercy. Through the cross of Christ our humble and imperfect offerings are accepted and perfected. His faith picks up where ours fails. His love fills in where ours is lacking. His righteousness covers our sinfulness.

Flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, but God is able to take our bodies—made of dust and destined for a dusty future—and transform them into something beautiful, good and holy that is capable of showing the world the depth of God's love. We may not look any different as baptized people, but the grace of God shines through our lives lived in faith and service.

VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry



March 2022


The vestry met on Tuesday, March 8, remotely, using Zoom. The annual vestry retreat was also held on February 26 using Zoom as well.

After extensive examination of the process by which Parishioners' Ministry issues checks to people in need, the vestry voted to require only one signature of a duly appointed steward on the ministry's checks. A countersignature had previously been required, and the vestry decided this was unnecessary. In addition, changes to the bylaws concerning Parishioners' Ministry were proposed, to allow stewards to name their own chief steward, while reserving the appointment of a treasurer to the vestry. These proposed bylaw amendments have been publicized in the weekly parish email and will be voted on at the next vestry meeting.

Vestry also approved the parish's sponsorship of the 2022 State College Pride event, to be held this June, and efforts to organize our participation in the parade and the gathering in Sidney Friedman Park will begin soon. The vestry also voted unanimously to endorse Ted Christopher for ordination to the transitional diaconate, as well as to endorse me for candidacy to Holy Orders. I know Ted and I are both deeply grateful for the support of the St. Andrew's community!

Vestry meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month and are always open to all parishioners. Please contact me (kevinlowe33@gmail.com) for the Zoom link prior to the meeting if you would like to attend. Please note there will be **no vestry meeting in April due to Holy Week**. Choral Evensong

On Sunday, April 3, the Adult Choir will present a service of choral evensong. Music will include the *Evening Canticles in D* by Herbert Brewer, *Preces and Responses* by Richard Shephard, and the anthems *Teach Me Thy Way, O Lord* by William Fox, and *Peace I Leave You* by Amy Beach. Gwen Catchen will play works by Johann Pachelbel and John Eggert.

As part of our continuing safeguards during the pandemic, the choir will sing wearing masks. Masks are now optional at St. Andrew's. A reception will be held in Room 325 after the service.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

The next evensong will be May 1 at 5 p.m.





BOOK CLUB


Tuesday, April 26 7 p.m., Room 324 (Library)
