Back to the Future

Our theme for this fall is "Back to the Future." No, there are no DeLoreans involved or time machines. No lightning bolt required to produce 1.21 gigawatts. All we are trying to accomplish is to get everyone to come back to church so we can move forward together into the future.

Our average Sunday attendance (ASA) in 2019—before the pandemic—was 184. Currently, our ASA is 114 for this year. That means we are missing an average of 70 people every week. Where did they go? The obvious answer is that some have died, moved away, or become unable to attend. This is certainly true and easy to account for. The other obvious answer is that people are still staying away out of concern over the coronavirus and COVID 19. This is much harder to account for but certainly also true. Offering the live stream as we do and the video link that can be viewed later, we are able to reach those who choose to stay home and to include them in the worship life of our parish. This is surely less than satisfying for those who would rather be here worshipping in community with everyone else, however we are grateful to have this option that didn't exist before the pandemic. We plan to continue live streaming because it has been such a positive, and relatively easy, way to extend our reach. We expect that these folks will return when the conditions improve to their comfort level.

Once we account for those who are gone and those who have health concerns about attending in person worship, we get into the unknown. Have people simply gotten out of the habit of getting up on Sunday mornings? Have people found other ways to spend their time? Have they created new habits that they do not wish to change? Inertia can be a powerful force. Or are there people who are unhappy with the parish? Have we disappointed people in some way? Are we missing something important? If there is something keeping you away, something that I or a member of the vestry can address or correct, please let us know.

COVID times have changed us all. I certainly understand anyone who continues to struggle with daily life after all the stress we have collectively been dealing with in the past two and a half years. It has affected me too. I continue to have less energy and ability to concentrate than before the pandemic. It's not preventing me from working, but if I'm honest my productivity has yet to return to its pre-pandemic level. Perhaps COVID-fatigue, in one form or another, is the major reason people have not come back to church.

I can spend all day guessing why our attendance has not returned to what it was, but the bottom line is this: We want you to come back! We miss you. The church feels empty without you, literally and figuratively. We have challenges and opportunities to face in the future. We'd rather do it together as a parish community that includes you and your family. Come back to church and together we can go back to the future.

EVENSONG IS NIGH!

Choral Evensong at St. Andrew's has been a staple for decades. The first Sundays of October, November, February, March, April, and May are our traditional days for the service. It always begins at 5 p.m. in the church, lasts approximately 40 minutes, and is followed by a reception in Room 325.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the Office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture, and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

Please make plans to join us in the coming months for this beautiful, contemplative service.

Sunday, September 11 9 a.m., Room 338





WHY THE IHS AUCTION?

When I H S held its first online action two years ago, one of the items we donated was a German cuckoo clock. It had sentimental



value—a wedding gift from a brother, carefully chosen on their trip to Germany—but over the years our family had grown and changed, and we were ready to send it to a new home. I knew that any cash it brought in to I H S would go to make another family's life easier.

But soon I found out that the clock itself made another family happier. Someone I knew recognized the clock as very like the ones she and her husband fell in love with on their delayed "honeymoon" to Germany. At that point it was too expensive for them to buy and ship it home to the U.S. So, they sadly let it go. Fast forward to 2020. My friend is looking over the IHS auction page and here is the clock in front of her eyes! She bids on it, wins the bidding, and then sneaks off secretly to pick it up when her husband is at an appointment. For their eleventh anniversary she presents him with the clock they were so sad to have missed years before. A clock expert in Stormstown tunes it up, and now it cuckoos cheerfully as the couple work at home.

You never know what you might find at the IHS auction! It might be something that warms your heart, something with a sharable history, something you always wanted. But you know for sure the money you pay for it will provide a sense of hope for a family in financial difficulty.

Caring for Creation Poetry Anthology


Available NOW in the Church Office


