In Praise of Humble February

"Thirty days has September..." so the rhyme goes detailing the wealth of days that almost all the months enjoy. Tucked in at the end of this familiar mnemonic verse is lowly February, the least of all the months. Even in leap year it only gets to twenty-nine, thus never achieving the diurnal dimensions of its eleven siblings. As far as special days go, it only boasts St. Valentine's Day and occasionally the beginning of Lent, while other months (who shall remain nameless) bask in the glory of Independence Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and the like. The twenty-eight short, cold, gray days of February may not amount to much, but don't overlook it or take it for granted. Even though it goes by in a quick four weeks, I say we should celebrate this depleted page of our calendars, enjoy it, make the most out of it!

I'm being a little silly about February, but it does bring up a powerful theme we see in Scripture, God's preference for the smallest, the youngest, the least significant. We see that pattern from the very beginning when Abel, the younger brother's sacrifice is acceptable to God while Cain's sacrifice is substandard. Jacob, whose name means "supplanter," is the second of twin boys born to the patriarch Isaac. Even though the first born is to be favored and to inherit, Jacob manages to con his older brother Esau out of his birthright and even gets the older brother's blessing from their father by trickery. Jacob earns the name Israel by wrestling with God all night, is reunited with his estranged brother, and goes on to enjoy his prosperity while fathering twelve sons, each the father of a tribe.

We see the pattern in the life of King David as well. Recall that the prophet Samuel went to Bethlehem because God told him to anoint one of Jesse's sons as king. Upon seeing Jesse's oldest, Eliab, Samuel exclaims, "Surely the Lord's anointed is now before the Lord." (1 Sam. 16:6) But he is told that God does not look on people the way humans do. Despite being the oldest and tall and handsome, God does not choose Eliab, to be king of Israel. Jesse has seven of his son's pass before Samuel and none of them is chosen by God. It is David, the youngest, who wasn't even invited to the feast but was watching the sheep in the field, who is called by God to be king.

Jesus continues this emphasis on the youngest and the least. In his parable of the Prodigal Son, it is the younger son who demands an advance on his inheritance and squanders it away only to return in disgrace asking his father for a job. In the end of the story, the younger son is celebrated because he was lost and is found, while the older son's anger and resentment towards his father and his good-for-nothing brother keeps him in the outer darkness outside the party gnashing his teeth. And think about how many times Jesus talks about the poor, the lowly, the least of these as being favored by God. We recently read the Beatitudes on Sunday in church, a perfect example of how, in God's kingdom, those who are weak and powerless will be exalted. Even Jesus' mother Mary is called out of insignificance to become the mother of the Son of God.

St. Paul does not drop this ball. He writes in 1 Corinthians, "God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; Go chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God." (1 Cor. 1:27-29) Paul is talking about the cross and how our crucified Lord was exalted in the resurrection so that we too will be exalted in Christ. Paul's emphasis on the cross reminds us that it is God's power, not our own, that accomplishes God's will. God's power is known to us in weakness unlike the power of the world that distracts us from following and depending on God. The weak, the small, the insignificant, even the shameful, these are the tools with which God builds God's kingdom.

So, don't overlook the small month of February. Embrace it and expect great things.

EVENSONG

Sunday, February 5 5 p.m., church 6 p.m. Reception, Room 325



On Sunday, February 5, the choir of St. Andrew's will present the service of choral evensong. Music will include the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis by Sarah McDonald, Preces and Responses by Thomas Tallis, and anthems by Henry Purcell and Cecilia MacDowell. Organist Gwen Catchen will play music by Pachelbel and others. The Rev. Ted Christopher will be the officiant.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the Office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture, and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

Please join us for this service. Bring some friends! A reception will follow in Room 325. The next evensong will be at 5 p.m. on Sunday, March 5.

A MESSAGE FROM PARISHIONERS' MINISTRY (PM)


As faithful stewards of one of St. Andrew's longest running outreach Ministries, the Parishioners' Ministry stewards will be providing the congregation with periodic newsletter updates about this Ministry's ongoing community impact. February 2023 PM Update: 2022 Impact Overview

What impact does the Parishioners' Ministry make? Annually, over the past few years, the PM helps ~110 households with ~\$11,000 in unexpected expenses. Many that we serve are one-time clients. With a majority of PM funds going to unexpected housing expenses (primarily rent and utilities), this Ministry helps make it possible for individuals and families to remain in their homes during times of financial turmoil.

How did the PM help in 2022?

In 2022, the PM assisted 93 households with \$9,458 in unexpected expenses, with 76% of the funds helping with household expenses. The graph below shows the full distribution of funds for 2022.



How is the PM funded?

Since the 2020 austerity budget, Parishioners' Ministry has primarily been **independently funded by contributing parishioners**, rather than as a line item on the general budget. Fr. Jeff has also graciously supported the Parishioners' Ministry during these austerity budgets through the Kathy Palmer Fund. Please see the snapshot financial summary of the PM from 2019-2022 below.


