## Season of Creation

*"In the face of the climate crisis, protecting God's Creation is a spiritual imperative for Christians throughout the global Church. The Season of Creation has inspired us to come together in prayer and action – to safeguard, sustain and renew the life of the Earth.*

*The Most Rev. Rt. Honorable Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury*

In 1989 the Eastern Orthodox Church proclaimed September 1 as a Day of Prayer for Creation. Other major Christian churches in Europe joined in 2001, and the Roman Catholic Church embraced it in 2015. The Episcopal Church now participates in this celebration that is recognized by 2.2 billion Christians of many different denominations and churches. What started as a day is now the Season of Creation. The season runs from September 1 to October 4, which is St. Francis Day, the patron saint of environmental concerns. The theme this year is: "To Hope and Act with Creation."

The scriptural source of this year's theme is Paul's letter to the Romans 8:19-25, which speaks about the whole creation groaning in labor pains as it waits to be set free from its bondage to decay. The passage also speaks of hope as we wait for what we do not yet see. That is, hope that is born of faith in God's promises and expressed by our actions. In other words, it is not a passive hope, not an inactive waiting for God to do something, but rather an active hope that seeks to work in conjunction with God's intentions. Hope encourages us to act to combat the climate crisis even as we may feel overwhelmed by the scale of it and the challenges we face. Hope keeps us moving forward. Hope does not allow us to give in to cynical fatalism or doomed defeatism. As Christians, we see it as a moral imperative to be good stewards of the creation God has entrusted to us.

This year we will mark the Season of Creation with special collects during our Prayers of the People. We are working on presenting some special sessions on the environment and the climate in our Sunday morning adult forum. We hope you will join us in praying and acting to work along with God in caring for creation and promoting equity and justice in the process.

### **Season of Creation Prayer**

Triune God, Creator of all, We praise you for your goodness, visible in all the diversity that you have created, making us a cosmic family living in a common home. Through the Earth you created, we experience love and nourishment, home, and protection. We confess that we do not relate to the Earth as a Mothering gift from you, our Creator. Our selfishness, greed, neglect, and abuse have caused the climate crisis, loss of biodiversity, human suffering as well as the suffering of all our fellow creatures. We confess that we have failed to listen to the groans of the Earth, the groans of all creatures, and the groans of the Spirit of hope and justice that lives within us. May your Creator Spirit help us in our weakness, so that we may know the redeeming power of Christ and the hope found in him. May the groans of the Spirit birth in us a willingness to serve you faithfully, so that we may hear and heal Creation, to hope and act together with her, so that the first fruits of hope may blossom. Loving and Creator God, we pray that you will make us sensitive to these groans and enable us to have the same compassion as that of Jesus, the redeeming Lord. Grant us a fresh vision of our relationship with Earth, and with one another, as creatures that are made in your image. In the name of the one who came to proclaim the good news to all Creation, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Our campus ministry is looking forward to a new year and new possibilities.

Please join me in welcoming Episcopal at Penn State's new president, Austin Norrid – no stranger to St. Andrew's, a member of the choir for the last few years. Austin is a PhD student in Music Education and is looking forward to completing his research projects and engaging with the group as it emerges this year. In addition to these two services, the schedule for the fall on campus will be:

Sept. 29 (Feast of St. Michael and all angels) – Choral Evensong; Eisenhower Chapel; 5 p.m.

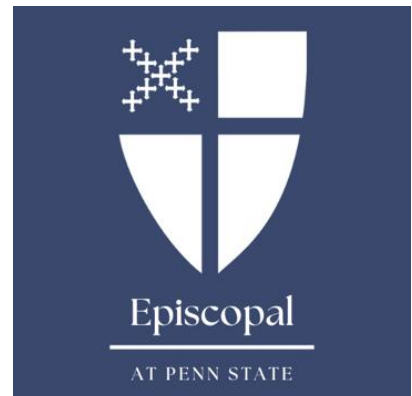
Oct. 31 (All Hallows Eve) – Sung Compline; Worship Hall, Pasquerilla; 9 p.m.

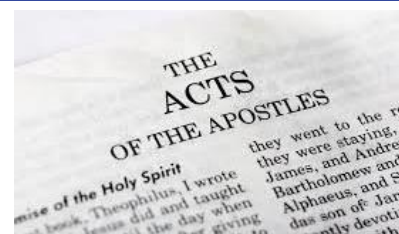

## A Word from Parishioners' Ministry of Saint Andrew's

In re. "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself:"

Summer often sees a lag in donations to churches, but it does not feature much relief for people in need, as evictions, power shutoffs, and job losses go on remorselessly. As many of you know but some do not, St. Andrew's has two main outreach programs that help local neighbors: a Community Café serving dinner to large numbers every Thursday evening, and Parishioners' Ministry, supplying direct financial aid to small numbers. Typically when people are in trouble, a social agency like Centre Helps, Strawberry Fields, Salvation Army, or Centre Volunteers in Medicine, tries to put together a "package" of help for those facing eviction or other family calamities (car repossession, repair bill, medical emergencies causing lack of pay, among many other circumstances) and we are normally able to help with a small part of the package, typically \$100, alongside other churches and agencies. Sometimes a person calls us directly and has an especially difficult emergency. If possible, we refer them to agencies like Centre Helps or Out of the Cold, etc.....but sometimes we have to give direct, in-person help.

One of our six Stewards is on duty every month, and particularly in the summer, we find our budget dipping perilously low. The calls can be harrowing. "Margie" is a mother of three children under ten, has left an abusive marriage, and has been evicted. "Bob" has lost a job and has fallen three months behind in utility payments. Out of the Cold's shelter is full one December day, the coldest day of 2022 by the way, and "Gordon" and "Jillian" have no place to sleep. As Steward on duty that month, I was able after several tries to find one motel, and only one, that would accept them for a night without a valid credit card, even with PM paying by check. "Gloria" needs gas to drive to a vital medical appointment at Geisinger, Danville. Social service agencies can do only so much, and their rules, intended to spread help to as many as possible, can unintentionally harm some of the neediest or most distressed individuals.

Until 2019, PM received a budgeted \$600 monthly. At that time, the "austerity budget" decision cut PM from this regular stream. With occasional appeals, we began to see an actual improvement in our funds, but on an irregular basis. Fr. Jeff has also directed \$300 monthly from the endowed Kathy Palmer fund to help PM. Sometimes donations have been generous and we can say "yes" to needs totaling a thousand dollars or more each month. In those months, our job is easier! But, in the late summer and earliest fall....not so much.

So, I ask you to consider a donation to this cause, not to take it away from your pledge to St Andrew's general budget, which is vital; but whatever extra you can spare for this ministry to our poor neighbors. An ideal scenario would be for a certain number of parishioners to pledge (again, without cutting their pledge to the general budget) \$50 or \$100 to PM. Six \$100 or ten \$50 monthly pledges would go a wonderfully long way!
