Prayer, the Breath of our Spiritual Life

Don't forget to breathe!

Have you ever been doing something physical and someone told you that? It always makes me chuckle a bit. How could we forget to breathe? Doesn't our body just do it naturally without us thinking about it? Well, sort of. As we bend over to pick something up or reach to grab ahold of something, we often unconsciously hold our breath. The effect on us is to hold onto tension, to tense our muscles when we should try to relax them. Our bodies are strange things. Take sleep apnea. We can actually stop breathing while we sleep! How does a species survive if they are prone to just stop breathing? Of course, our bodies take over at some point and we start breathing again. But it wakes us up, at least a little bit, and that disturbs our rest with all kinds of negative consequences. If you know someone who sleeps with a CPAP, machine, it is remarkable that they prefer to sleep with such a loud, uncomfortable, and restrictive device rather than suffer the consequences of apnea. Turns out, breathing is pretty important.

Yoga and other forms of meditative movement have us focus on our breath. Inhale as you move one way; exhale as you move the other. This attention to breathing accomplishes two things. It ensures that we are not holding our breath but keeping the flow of oxygen constant. It also helps us to anchor our thoughts and attention in our physical bodies. That kind of grounding is powerful. It promotes relaxation, but it also opens our minds. We experience less distraction in our thoughts and feelings, things that can create tension physically and mentally. This is the phenomenon that the Lamaze technique of natural childbirth exploits. Focusing on your breath keeps you in the present moment. It prevents you from borrowing anxiety from the future, which is what worry is. It is a very effective technique. If only there was some part of the Christian tradition that utilized this power of breath.

Well, there is. Sometimes called *Breathing Prayer*, it is most commonly known as Centering Prayer. This isn't some new, or new age, kind of prayer. It is based on ancient contemplative practices. I will try to summarize it here. You sit in a comfortable, relaxed position and begin simply by focusing on your breath. Not trying to control your breath but paying attention to it. With each breath you utter in your mind a short word or phrase, usually from Scripture or other holy source. This word or phrase, for example, *Maranatha*, keeps the mind focused and opens one's heart to God's presence. This is not a prayer of words, as in us talking to God. It is rather a practice of the presence of God, a contemplative practice.

In both Hebrew and Greek, the languages of the Old and New Testaments, the word for breath also means spirit—*ruach*, in Hebrew, and *pneuma* in Greek. This linguistic coincidence makes the association in our consciousness between the air we breathe and our spiritual life. If prayer is the breath of spiritual life, then it should be as integral to our existence as breathing. Lent is a good time of year to work on one's spiritual practices or prayer life. Whether we undertake Centering Prayer or some other discipline, we strive for our prayer to be as natural and automatic as inhaling and exhaling, something we do all day, every day. Through these disciplines we seek to fulfill St. Paul's ideal to "pray without ceasing." (1 Thess. 5:17) In order to accomplish this, we need to remember, and from time to time be reminded, "Don't forget to breathe!"

Confirmations at St. Andrew's

Ted and adults who have participated a in class at St. Andrew's with Fr. Jeff. There will be a potluck meal following the service. It will be a great opportunity to welcome the new members of the church, our bishop, and visitors from other parishes in our diocese. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend.



Evensong Sunday, April 6 5 p.m. in the church 6 p.m. reception in Room 325



On Sunday, April 6, the Adult Choir will present a service of choral evensong. Music will include the evening canticles by Mchael Praetorius, Preces and Responses by Richard Shephard, and the anthems ABIDE WITH ME by Malcolm Archer, and TEACH ME, O LORD by William Fox . The Rev. Jeffrey Packard will be the officiant. Organist Gwen Catchen will play music by Johann Pachelbel and John Eggert.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the Office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy. Old English speakers translated the Latin word vesperas as æfensang, which became 'evensong' in modern English.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture, and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

A reception will follow in Room 325. **The next evensong** will be May 4, at 5 p.m. Music by women composers will be featured.

The vestry met on March 11, 2025. Fr. Jeff reviewed a request by a member of Agudath Achim, a synagogue located in Huntingdon. Most of the members live in State College and they would like to use Room 325 once a month for their worship service. The vestry has no objections to this.

With the reunification of our diocese with the Diocese of Bethlehem, it has been suggested that parishes partner with a parish in the other diocese to build relations as we go through this year of transition. Vestry gave full support to engage in a Sibling Parish Relationship with an expressed preference for a college town parish, if possible.

A draft of proposed revisions to parish bylaws will be distributed soon. This will be for discussion and action at a later meeting.

Taizé Prayer Wednesdays in Lent * April 2, April 9 5:15 p.m. in the church



Tenebrae

Wednesday, April 16 7 p.m. in the church

The name Tenebrae is the Latin word for "darkness" or "shadows." This service is marked by a reading from the book of Lamentations and the gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights until a single candle, considered a symbol of the Lord, remains. Towards the end of the service, this candle is hidden, typifying the apparent victory of the forces of evil. At the very end, a loud noise is made, symbolizing the earthquake at the time of the resurrection (Matthew 28:2), the hidden candle is restored to its place and by its light all depart in silence. Our service of Tenebrae will be led by the Rev. Ted Christopher with the Choral Scholars.

This year, Grace Lutheran will host the ecumenical Stations of the Cross. Grace does not have a tradition of this service and has taken that opportunity to approach the planning with freedom and creativity. We will use a special liturgy from the Scottish island of Iona. In preparation, Grace has gathered 14 paintings by English artist Chris Gollon who was commissioned in 2000 by the Church of England to paint them for the Church of St. John in East London. Gollon used friends and family members as inspiration for the people in the painting including his son as the model for Jesus. Gollon died in 2017, but Grace received permission from his estate to reproduce the paintings for this worship service. State College Framing Company reproduced high resolution images of the artwork on canvas and framed them in a distressed wood style. Pastor Shul describes them as "edgy and provocative."

The liturgy and artwork will be accompanied by choral anthems from members of Laurel Sanders' ecumenical choir and from St. Andrew's choir. "It will be an unforgettable afternoon marking a day that quite literally changed the world and, indeed, all of eternity."






Good Friday Film: The Last Temptation of Christ (1988) Friday, April 18

Directed by Martin Scorsese and based on a book by Nikos Kazantzakis, the film stars Willem Dafoe the carpenter, Jesus of Nazareth. Tormented by the temptations of demons, the guilt of making crosses for the Romans, pity for men and the world, and the constant call of God, Jesus sets out to find what God wills for Him. But as His mission nears fulfillment, He must face the greatest temptation; the normal life of a good man. Based, not on the Gospels, but on Nikos Kazantzakis' novel of the same name.
