## What Would Be Different About My Life If I Were a Christian?

Rowan Williams, the former archbishop of Canterbury, once told a story about an encounter with a particularly brilliant professor at Oxford or Cambridge or one of those impossibly prestigious academies. The professor was nonchalant about Christianity – not hostile towards it, but certainly not brought up in the faith and pretty unimpressed with what he had seen, if not of Christianity, at least of Christians. He was a smart and sincere and curious person, and he asked Rowan Williams what would be different about his life if he were a Christian.

The question took Rowan Williams aback – what WOULD be different, if he were Christian. Of course, the Archbishop could have told him the party line – that if he were Christian, he would be saved. His life would be wholly dedicated to Christ, and he would, in the fullness of time, rejoice and glory in the presence of God for all eternity.

But this seemed like an unhelpful response to this person asking the question, because this was not really what he was asking. He wasn't asking about the great by and by – and he certainly wasn't looking for a sermon.

What he was asking was: what would be different about my life NOW if I were a Christian. What would being a Christian require me to do NOW? How would being a Christian impel me to act toward other people NOW? Would I be in a different relationship with the people I encounter in my life? Would my behavior and my habits be altered? Could someone tell that I was a Christian by observing me NOW, by seeing the way I act, the choices I make NOW.

Over the last several weeks, our Lectionary has taken us on a brief walk through the Letter to the Hebrews – one of my favorites. The letter is different than Paul's letters – it's probably more of a sermon than a letter – and goes deeply into who Jesus is and how the beleaguered community of his followers should respond. It deals with the question the professor asked the archbishop, at least indirectly. To be a Christian is to live in the world in a certain way, not carried away by all sorts of strange teachings, with hearts strengthened by grace, not by meaningless performance or ceremonies. Crucially, it is to be a people who have no place at the center of power or authority within the city gates – because the one we follow, Jesus Christ, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, died outside the city gates – and it is there that he waits for us, still. **That** is what is different about our lives because we are Christian. We are discerning, careful, reflective, not swept up by cleverness or gossip or slander – we look for the grace of God, not for the latest shiny thing – and we know, deep in our bones, that we are estranged from the world as it is – that we are waiting for the world that is to come.

This does not absolve us of our responsibility to each other and to the world. Two of the five vows in our baptismal covenant require us to be robustly engaged in the world – 'inside the city gates'. But we do this in the light of Christ's death and resurrection, in the 'conviction of things not seen'. This faith keeps us connected to the ground of all being, to the source of all love. And we gather – week in and week out – to pray, to confess, to be fed... to be reminded of who we are and whose we are.

Following the 10 a.m. service Holmes Foster Park, Pavilion 2


Make plans to join us on Sunday, September 7, following the 10 a.m. service for a picnic at Holmes Foster Park.

## **DAUGHTERS OF THE KING**

## Why am I a Daughter of the King?

"Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." (NIV, Luke 10:41-42).



We are all well acquainted with the story of Mary and Martha. Martha is the sister who, when hearing that the Lord is coming, runs around like the proverbial chicken sans head. And her own efforts are not lost on her, as she remarks to anyone that could hear that her sister Mary was not helping to serve the Lord. But the Lord sees all and reminds Martha that Mary has chosen the better path. I have often thought of Mary and Martha as two halves of one whole; I have some of each in me. Prior to 2000, I cultivated the 'Martha' within me, serving on altar guild, organizing parish life activities, serving as a Lay Eucharistic Visitor, serving on vestry – the list went on and on. And I lamented that I could not find the time to have a 'Mary side', to just sit and be with the Lord, be in God's presence, experience the Holy Spirit personally. Then, in the year 2000 I took vows to become a Daughter of the King, and I began focusing on the 'Mary' within me.

Daughters take vows of prayer and service, and as a 'Martha' I could easily fulfill the vow of service just by the many things I did for our parish and our clergy. I firmly cemented myself into the 'Martha' role. Service vow accomplished! Check. But what about my 'Mary' role? Daughters taught me how to become a 'Mary', while not forsaking the 'Martha' in me, and taught me how to settle firmly into my faith, not just on Sunday mornings, but every day of the week.

I often remind others that "Daughters are not called to do; Daughters are called to be". What does that mean? It means that I find time each day to thank God for just being a part of my life. I do spend time each day in prayer and I listen for the still, small voice of God. However, as Daughters in a chapter we spend quiet time together in worship and prayer and study. We work together to explore and strengthen our individual relationships with God, so that when troubles present themselves, as they often do, we know that we will turn with confidence to God and lay those troubles on Him. When I do turn to God in quiet or in prayer, I find that peace that passes all understanding. And I know that Mary made the better choice. This is why I am a Daughter of the King.

"Two are better than one . . . For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help." (NRSV, Ecclesiastes 4:9-10) Daughters are a sisterhood who support me in good times and in challenging days. Daughters lift me up when I am down. Daughters are always ready with a prayer. That is why I'm a Daughter.






#### PRAYER QUILT MINISTRY

Twelve years ago, a small group of Saint Andrews parishioners organized fabric, cut strips and took over a small closet in Room 119 because prayer quilters need a place to store their stash. Prayer quilts are created to bring comfort and a sense of community to shut-ins from our parish. Simple, colorful blocks of fabric create warm lap quilts, and instead of quilting the sandwiched fabric layers, yarn is used to anchor the blocks. When the quilt is completed, parishioners tie knots with the yarn to secure the layers, and they can say a prayer for the intended recipient of the prayer quilt as they tie the



knot. Prayer quilters will gather on the second Thursday of each month at 10 a.m. in Room 119 in the Trost Wing. Minimal sewing experience is helpful but not required.

The Book Group is open to all. Newcomers and guests are always welcome.




#### **PARISH LIFE COMMITTEE**


