And You Will Be My Witnesses

So when they had come together, they asked him, “Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel? He replied, “It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.” Acts 1:6-8

These are Jesus' final words to his disciples. The resurrected Jesus spoke them immediately before ascending into heaven. The Church has been trying to figure out what exactly he meant by them ever since.

His reference to the disciples receiving the Holy Spirit seems clear enough. Only ten days later the Holy Spirit would be poured out upon them on the day of Pentecost, according to Acts. It is the part about being his witnesses that is open for interpretation. What does it mean to be a witness to Christ? What form should our personal Christian witness take? These questions should always be on our minds as followers of Jesus, but they take on more immediacy as we live through these turbulent times.

At its most basic meaning, bearing witness to Christ means proclaiming his Gospel. That can be a personal testimony of faith or a more general proclamation of the Good News. We do this as we practice our ministry, loving the world in Christ's name. We do this when we speak to someone about what we believe and why. We do this when we, in any quiet way, show ourselves to be Christian. Christians have born witness in many ways over the centuries. We tell stories of Saints who heroically bore witness at great personal expense. The Greek word martyr means 'witness,' after all.

In these days of ICE roving our city streets and the protests they provoke, we may feel a sense of urgency to witness to our Christian faith. Bishop A. Robert Hirschfeld of New Hampshire recently told his clergy to prepare for a "new era of martyrdom." That may sound a bit extreme, but his comments reflect a call to action that many of us are feeling. How we witness to our faith will not be the same for all of us. One may witness by caring for the persecuted. Another may witness by shooting video on their phone at a demonstration. Still another may witness by writing letters to people in power.

As we try to discern how we should bear witness to Christ as individuals and as a community of faith, let's gather to see how Christians have interpreted the call to witness in the past. Our Lenten program this year will explore biblical and historical moments of Christian witness. There will be a program for both adults and children on Wednesdays in Lent, except during Spring Break. Dinner will start in Canterbury Hall at 6:00 and the program will run from 6:45 to 8:00. The Rev. Kevin Barron and I will work with the adults while our new director of family ministry, Reed Dressler, will lead the children's program. I hope you will join us as we try to figure out together what it means to be Christ's witnesses to the ends of the earth.

VESTRY UPDATE, Beth Jones, Clerk of the Vestry



January 2026

The vestry met on January 13, 2026.

The vestry consented unanimously to approve this year's funding for the Altar Guild, to agree to the Community Cafe's participating in the Centre Gives fundraising tool, and to approve moving funds to support the Canterbury Society (St. Andrew's planned giving effort).

Fr. Jeff appointed Owen Jacobson as a Special Youth Representative to the vestry. Owen will attend and participate in vestry meetings, but will not have a vote.

There was a motion to approve a proposal to hire Envinity, a solar energy company, to install solar panels on the new roof to the Parish Life Center. The vestry unanimously passed the proposal. An anonymous member of St. Andrew's, gave a donation of \$35,000 to serve as a down payment on these costs.

Fr. Jeff and the vestry thanked the outgoing members of the vestry, Rich Marini, Sandy Schwartz, Daniel Foster and Kathy Dittmann, for their leadership and hard work.

The meeting ended at 8:30 p.m. with a benediction from Fr. Jeff.

The next vestry meeting is on February 10, 2026, in room 324 at 7 p.m. All are invited.


Bishops in Residence




Poetry Open Mic


