

## A RETIREMENT NOTE FROM ROBIN



Upon first arrival in State College in 1984, one step into St. Andrew's Nave, and John and I knew we had found our new church home. We sang in the choir, served on vestry, volunteered as youth leaders, and I taught in Church School. Then in 1999, the Director of Christian Education position opened, and I felt called to this ministry. Our son Jack was eight years old at the time; he was surprised that I would work at the church and asked, "What are you going to do all day?" Maybe he thought I would sit in the Nave and pray all week! Well, I have prayed; but no two days have been the same, and each day has brought new challenges and joys. St. Andrew's has an abundance of hard-working parishioners; and I am thankful for the times of worship, prayer, laughter, tears and planning that we shared.

Since announcing my retirement, I have worshiped in the Nave, walked the parish halls, worked in the classrooms, retrieved materials from the Undercroft--all the while wondering: 'how will I find the words to fully express what this ministry has meant to me?' To help me focus, I dove into my file folder, which holds all the thank-you notes you have sent to me over the past fifteen years. You have been generous with kind words and support. Your notes are loving expressions, which reflect the relationships built upon Baptisms, Children's Sermons, Church School and Adult Formation, Christmas/Epiphany Pageants, Communion classes, Confirmations/Receptions, Lenten/Holy Week and Easter programs, Outreach ministry, Simpler Living/Compassionate Life, Stations of the Cross for children, Taizè, and VBS here and at Good Shepherd.

Now it is my time to say thank you for the memories. Thank you for bringing your children, grandchildren and neighbors to hear the stories of our faith and share in our traditions. Thank you for your trust and confidence in me. With God's help, my work was accomplished by your willingness to volunteer and support our programs. It has been my honor and privilege to serve as a Lay Eucharistic Minister and as a Resurrection Acolyte. St. Andrew's has meant the world to me! ## **EVENSONG FROM THE 1662 BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER**

Sunday, April 3 5:00 PM Reception follows in Room 325



On Sunday, April 3 at 5:00 PM, there will be a service of choral evensong according to the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. This book is still the official prayer book of the Church of England. Music in the service will include a Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis by George Dyson, and the anthem IF YE LOVE ME by Thomas Tallis. Tallis also provides us with a setting of the Preces and Responses for the service. The Reverend Doug Dailey will be the officiant.

Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the office of Vespers, one of the eight

Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to soothe us and to draw us closer to the presence of God. The congregation also joins in the spoken parts of the liturgy: the reciting of the Confession and the Creed, as well as singing the hymns.

## LESSONS FROM LECTIO

In February we sat with a passage from Luke (Luke 13:1-9):

At that very time there were some present who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them--do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.'"

For many of us the passage was a bit jarring; the first paragraph contained some violent imagery and the two sections seemed disconnected from each other. Even so, as we sat with the passage, we could hear God asking us to trust him, to turn to him, and to grow in him.

It is easy for us to turn our focus outwards; we might nurture others and forget about ourselves or we might judge others as being worse sinners than ourselves. In both cases we are paying more attention to the fruits of others than to our own. God will come to collect our fruit as well, so it is important for us to look at ourselves and allow ourselves to be tended by God.

Being tended – repenting and turning towards God – is not always pleasant. Sitting in manure can be distasteful and having our roots disrupted can be disorienting. Additionally, in order to encourage new growth, the branches might be cut back until it looks like there is nothing there.

This passage also brought with it a sense of hopefulness and promise. Just because a relationship or endeavor has not born fruit in the past, this does not prevent the fruits of our labor from blossoming in the future. With careful tending there is hope for new growth. At the same time, we were reminded that we do not need to stay with a struggling endeavor forever. Sometimes, we bear the most fruit by clearing away the old in order to make space for the new.

We left this passage without easy answers. Sometimes we need to press forward, sometimes we need to pull back. But always, we need to trust in God.

Dear God, thank you for reminding us to put our trust in you. Thank you for always being there, for calling us to yourself and encouraging us to grow in you. We ask for discerning hearts, so that we may know when to prune and when to harvest. We also ask that we may be open and willing to receive your care. All this we ask in the name of your Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

## PRAYER QUILT MINISTRY



The Prayer Quilt Ministry group is made up of members of St. Andrew's, though we are open to all. If you like to work with fabric or sew, we are the group for you. We have recently undertaken creating baptismal quilts for the newly baptized children in our parish and are working to complete some so that we have a 'stock' supply. We are also working on prayer quilts for those parishioners who may be ill or facing other life challenges and find themselves in need of warmth and comfort. As many of you are aware, we complete the quilts with ties, rather than actually stitched quilting. As members of the parish tie a knot, they say a short prayer for the person for whom the quilt is intended. It is a powerful symbol of the love and faith of our parish family for those who receive the quilts.

Vestry met on Monday of Holy Week and shared many positive comments about the Lenten program and its good attendance. The financial report for February was positive showing a good start for the year. An audit committee was appointed by the Finance Committee and approved unanimously by the vestry. A report from the Property Committee included an ambitious list of projects for 2016 with the goal of providing and maintaining a comfortable and safe environment at St. Andrew's.

The arts and literature are alive and well at St. Andrews with the new St. Andrew's arts blog going live and the formation of the St. Andrew's book club. The arts blog can be found through links in the *Messenger* and on the church website. The book club has selected its first book, Zealot: The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth, by Reza Aslan, and will be meeting on Tuesday evenings.

The process for searching for a new rector will get under way in earnest after Easter beginning with the preparation of a parish profile. A series of listening events to gather information about the parish will be scheduled.
