ALTAR NATIVITY SET




When I lived in England, I was introduced to the custom of using the altar as the stable for the Christmas "crib," as the nativity scene or creche is called there. The stone altars were removed from the churches in England at the time of Reformation and replaced by wooden tables. These altar tables, with their frontals or hangings removed, make a good stand-in for the stable and enable prayerful contemplation of the nativity scene when kneeling to receive Communion.

When I shared the idea of doing this at St. Andrew's this year, there was unanimous support for it among those responsible for decorating the church for Christmas. So I called a friend in the church supply business to see if his firm had an appropriate set he could loan us. Obviously, a set with larger figures is needed, if the altar is used as the stable. My friend had just what we needed, a cast resin and hand-painted set made by the Demetz Ecclesiastical Art Studio in Italy, with characters 30" tall.

It was decided to say little before Christmas about the use of the altar as a stable for the Demetz set, so that our embrace of this English custom might be received as a gift and surprise by parishioners and visitors alike participating in our Christmas worship. The simple objective was to add something new and beautiful to our Christmas decorations and celebrations, and we (those responsible for the decorations) hope you enjoyed it!

VESTRY ELECTIONS

We will follow the guidelines for vestry election as noted in the church by-laws. Voting will take place on the morning of January 15, 2017, before and after the 8 AM and 10:30 AM services, from 7:30 AM to 12 PM. Ballots will note the names of all nominees and electors will be asked to indicate their four top selections. Electors are all adult members of the parish. Adult members of the parish must be over 16 year old, have been baptized, confirmed and/or received by a Bishop of the Episcopal Church, and have had their membership officially transferred to St. Andrew's (if previously a member of another parish). If you are uncertain you are an eligible elector, please contact the St. Andrew's office. They can then verify your eligibility. If you cannot be present to vote when the polls are open on January 15, you may obtain an absentee ballot by contacting the Clerk of the Vestry, Rick Hoover, at 814-238-4888 or rickhoover@aol.com. He is empowered to issue and collect absentee ballots. All completed absentee ballots must be returned to him at the following address no later than 5:00 PM, Friday, January 13, 2017.

CANDIDATES FOR VESTRY



Rose Bohn: I have been attending St. Andrews since a snowy Sunday in February 2003 when the beauty of the church called to me and the Anglican prayers sealed the deal. I have taught Sunday school for various ages, including confirmation candidates; led lectio divina and quiet evenings; delivered Good Friday sermons; participated in Simpler Living; served as Lay reader, LEM and Subdeacon at the altar; cooked, served, and cleaned up meals for community cafe and served on Vestry during the transition when Fr. Hofer retired and Fr. Richard was hired as rector. Outside of church, I teach writing at PSU and am raising two nearly-adult children. I love to be active and garden.

I feel called to serve on vestry again and would like to support the church in this time of transition.



Peter Chamberlain: I'm a cradle Episcopalian, having been baptized and confirmed at St. Luke's in Bartlesville, Oklahoma. My connection with St. Andrew's runs nearly as long as I attended services when visiting my grandparents in State College. Growing up, I was active in St. Luke's youth group and served as an acolyte.

I went to college at the University of Oklahoma, where I interned at St. Anselm of Canterbury. During this time, I experienced the arrival of a new rector and a diocesan convention held in my backyard.

The bulk of my professional life has been in the Austin, Texas area. I was a member of St. David's there and participated in ministry at Trinity Center. I was also part of a Mobile Loaves and Fishes team that delivered food, clothing, and personal items to the homeless and housing insecure in Austin.

After nearly six years in Austin, I made the decision to head back to school and earn an MBA from Penn State. During this time I was able to reconnect with St. Andrew's through regular services and work with the Community Café.

I'm now happily working as a Market Research Specialist for Penn State. In my free time, you'll find me out for a run or drinking coffee with a book.



Tom Dauler: I moved with my wife Cathy from Boston to State College in 1982, just before our daughter Alexandra was born, and have been a member here ever since. I joined the choir a few years later, and have enjoyed singing with them for over 30 years.

I was raised a Presbyterian but began attending Trinity Episcopal Church, near my apartment in downtown Boston, where I met and eventually married Cathy. We grew to love the church, its theology, and its beautiful liturgy.

After ten years or so of city life, we were ready to move to a town like State College which promised to be a wonderful place to raise our child.

I've worked as a psychiatrist here and Cathy has become involved in local government and in teaching. Alexandra, baptized and confirmed at St. Andrew's, has gone on to become an editor with Oxford University Press in New York City where she attends a nearby Episcopal church.

The choir has been my principle activity here, though Cathy and I worked together on the Easter Vigil celebration for many years until recently when her mother's illness and death in 2014 made it difficult to commit to some of our activities here.

I find I have a greater interest, now, in the workings of the church and in joining with others on vestry to help St. Andrew's continue to be the wonderful spiritual resource it has been for me.



Michele Hamilton: I am Michele Hamilton and am honored to be nominated to run for vestry. I have been a church member for seven years. I am an Education for Ministry graduate, part of Daughters' of the King, Out of the Cold Centre County and co-teaching 4th and 5th grade.

I would like to use my abilities to further help the church as we go through the transition of finding a new rector and beyond. We have such a prayerful and talented community here and our church is a treasure to the community and I want to help us welcome new members while supporting existing ones in spiritual growth. No one knows exactly what the future holds but "we walk in by faith, not by sight" (2 Corinthians 5:7).



Mildred Meder: I became a member of St. Andrew's in 1971 when I moved to State College with my daughter. I worked at Penn State while I finished my undergraduate degree and then my Master of Education in 1974. I began working for Centre County Government in 1975 as a caseworker with Mental Health /Mental Retardation. I retired in 1995 as Director of the Human Serving Planning Office which coordinated adult services for county residents. Services such as housing, food and case management were provided directly out of my office. Many of these services have now been spun off or reorganized and it is satisfying to see how they have grown and changed.

Since joining St. Andrew's, I have served on the Altar Guild for ten years, served two terms on the Vestry and served as Stewardship chair. Then I decided to rest. Now, again I would like to be involved. I feel that I can bring three things to the Vestry: a representation of those in their golden years, a representation of those attend the 8 AM service, as well as a historical perspective of our church.

The most important qualification I have is being a mother to two daughters, grandmother to three, and great grandmother to three more.




Kelley Paulsen: I am a southern girl, born and raised in South Carolina. I majored in English at the College of Charleston, where I met my husband Greg. He was a Navy boy. We lived in Italy for several years, followed by a couple of years in California and some more time in South Carolina. In 1999, we moved to State College when my husband took a job with Corning. Three jobs and 17 years later, we are still here!

I was born into the Episcopal Church. As a teenager, I was active with our parish and Diocesan youth program and served on the Diocesan Youth Council for two years. Happily, I still maintain many of my friendships from that time. After 9/11, I found myself in Saint Andrew's, terrified, carrying my one-year-old son. When I walked into the church, I felt such a calmness come over me and was so aware of God's healing presence. Fifteen years later, we still call Saint Andrew's home.

After attending Saint Andrew's for a couple of years, I asked Robin Bagby why I didn't ever see anything in the messenger about a youth group. She said there wasn't one at the time...but there was a committee. Since then, I served on that committee for several years, have been a J2A leader for Rite-13 and YAC, taught confirmation, served as the youth coordinator, run many fund raisers, and gone on 6 mission trips. I also have been involved with young people on the Diocesan, Provincial and National level. I was the Diocesan Youth Coordinator for several years and have remained involved ever since. I have also been also a proud member of Daughters of the King since the Saint Andrew's Chapter was started. I attended Simpler Living for several years, spent a year or so with Prayer Shawl Ministry, was a delegate to convention several times, and am currently a nursery volunteer.

My husband, Greg, travels with his job. A lot. At times, it feels like I am a single mom! We have 3 children. Emily: 21, who is living in Colorado and working for AmeriCorps; Zachary, who is 16, a student at State High, and a soccer and LAX player; and Ainsley, 12, also a soccer and LAX player, who keeps us all hopping and makes sure we are never bored.

The workings of the Church have always fascinated me and I try to keep fairly current with Diocesan and National Church news. I would be sincerely honored to serve as a member of the vestry.



Steven Smith: Steven Smith is a pianist and retired piano professor (1972-2014) at Penn State. He and his wife Teri joined Saint Andrew's in 1978. Their children Andrew and Louisa were born and baptized soon after that. Steven became a lay Eucharistic minister (at that time, called lay reader and chalice bearer) about 1984, and he has served continuously as LEM since that time. He served on the Vestry about 1996-99, during the rectorate of Father Larry Hofer. He served at that time on the social ministry committee, and recently was pleased to take part in the 2015 Out Of The Cold Centre County program. He hopes to serve in that capacity again this winter.


EVENING PRAYER


COMPASSIONATE LIFE



ST. ANDREW VESTRY UPDATE:

December 2016



The final vestry meeting of 2016 was held on Monday, December 19. The monthly deficit and annual deficit continued through the end of November. Expectations and hopes are that the receipt of a planned withdrawal of funds from diocesan investments coupled with year-end contributions will provide for a balanced financial picture for the year. Looking ahead to 2017, the vestry urges everyone in the St. Andrew's Parish family to make their pledge contributions in a timely manner. The Finance Committee finished an internal audit of the 2015 finances and found no problems or discrepancies. The vestry received and approved the 2015 audit report for submission to the diocese as required. An independent external audit is planned for the future.

Vestry approved the parish profile to be submitted to the Office of Transitional Ministry website. This profile will be an integral part of the job listing for our next seated rector. A draft of the full parish profile was also distributed for review and comment. The full profile will be available in early January.

The slate of candidates for the 2017 vestry election was announced: Rose Bohn, Peter Chamberlain, Tom Dauler, Michele Hamilton, Mildred Meder, Kelley Paulsen, Steven Smith, and Scott Strouse. Vestry elections will be held on Sunday, January 15. For those who cannot vote in person, absentee ballots are available from the clerk of the vestry (Rick Hoover) upon request. The vestry urges all eligible electors in the parish to cast their votes for new members of the vestry. All St. Andrew's parishioners are encouraged to confirm their voting eligibility by checking the eligible elector list available in the office and on church bulletin boards during service times. The vestry meets on the third Monday of the month, and in general, vestry meetings are open to all members of the St. Andrew's family. No advanced notice is necessary to attend a vestry meeting, but advanced notice and a place on the agenda is required to make a presentation to vestry.

UPDATE FROM THE PROFILE & SEARCH COMMITTEES



The Profile and Search Committees have been working very hard the last 6 weeks to put together the Office for Transition Ministry (OTM) Document and Parish Profile. The finishing touches are expected to be completed by early January. The Vestry approved the OTM Document at its December meeting and the Rev. Canon Dan Morrow will post it on the National Church's news feeds and job sites.

In conjunction with the posting of the OTM Document, the Parish Profile will be posted on St. Andrew's Website and you will be able to view it at that time.

St. Andrew's will accept applications for the rector through the end of February at which point the Search Committee will work with the diocese to review the initial applications. As the February deadline approaches we will provide further updates and future timelines to the parish.

Everyone on both committees has spent a great deal of time getting us to this point. 
