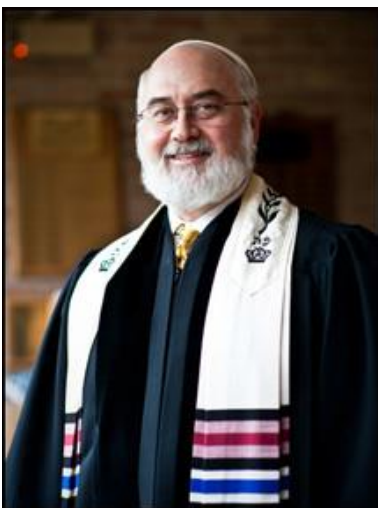

A Program for Children and Middle School Youth

On March 22, the children and a few teens brainstormed and created a word building chart from the word Lent. We then experienced the story of *Jesus in the Wilderness*. After the presentation, Nolan Markowski retold what he had heard, with the help of his brother Shane. Children and youth then used LEGOs to represent one of their favorite stories of Jesus or a present-day scene of God working in and amongst us. PJ McCloskey and Nolan created the Garden of Gethsemane; Eva Ellis made a home that included a telescope so we could see the stars God made and flower boxes with flowers God made; Marlee made the cross with the tomb; Shane made a jeep so Jesus could take the wheel and take his disciples on their missions! Many, many purple paper crosses were made to post around the Lenten bulletin board across from Room 324. On March 29, we created an opening prayer together and experienced the story of Jesus Welcoming the Children. The children continued to work with LEGOs, but also began work on a Holy Week banner and Easter banner. Thank you to Madeline Johnson for sewing both banners! Making shapes out of handprints for the Holy Week banner were Marlee Kwasnica (green paint for the palms), Abbey Humphreys (grey paint for the donkey), Shane Markowski (gold and black/grey paint for the betrayal and coins), and PJ McCloskey and Eva Ellis with painted feet for the foot washing! We will continue making the banners on April 5 and 12.

For over 75 years, Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) has served as the compassionate response of The Episcopal Church to human suffering in the world. ERD works closely with Anglican Communion and ecumenical partners helping communities in need of assistance after disasters and creating long-term development strategies. ERD serves more than 3 million people in some 40 countries every year, through programs that fight poverty, hunger and disease. FROM THE INTERIM



Friends,

When we gathered to begin Lent on Ash Wednesday, we were invited by the Church and its liturgy “to the observance of a Holy Lent.” It seems to me that we’ve done this in ways mostly big over the past month, as a community and family of faith. The acts of goodness, mercy and love, and the offerings of prayer and worship seen in our midst this Lent truly have made it a holy time and season. In a world where prayerfulness, service and self-denial are not always the norm, this has been beautiful to behold.

Of course, one of the “big” things I’m speaking of is our hosting of the Out of the Cold (OOTC) program for two weeks in March. This is the second year that our hosting has occurred during Lent and this is more than just a happy coincidence, providing as it does the opportunity to put faith into action. Like our weekly Community Café, hosting OOTC is work, hard work. It’s a challenge not only to our routines and calendars, but also to our comfort and preferences. Yet, if you don’t know, then please do know that a goodly number of our parishioners faced and met these challenges to serve our neighbors in the program this winter, and some of these parishioners spent days, not just hours doing so. By their service and witness, we all have gained and so too the ways of God.

Another “big” thing that comes to mind as I review our observance of this Lent is Bishop Audrey’s recent visitation to St. Andrew’s. Not only were we blessed by her presence and gifts among us, but we were blessed too by the presence and gifts of the Holy Spirit, who, as promised, alighted on all of us fortunate enough to be present for the occasion. On the day, I wondered if I was alone in feeling just how special the Baptism, Confirmations, Receptions and Reaffirmation were at the 10:30 a.m. service. Since, and without solicitation, many have told me that they too knew at the time that something special was happening, and so it was. It’s nice when God comes to church, and the Bishop too!

I hope the details just rehearsed leave you wanting more, for the more is here. Holy Week begins in less than a week, followed immediately by the Sunday of the Resurrection: Easter Day. Did you know that when we gather for worship each Sunday, the perspective and teaching of the Church is that we simply are repeating what we commemorate and celebrate on Easter Day each year? This is why every Sunday is called a “Little Easter.” It’s also why Easter Day is called the “Feast of Feasts.” So, yes, the “more” is here. Don’t miss it, for it’s nice when God comes to church, and you too!

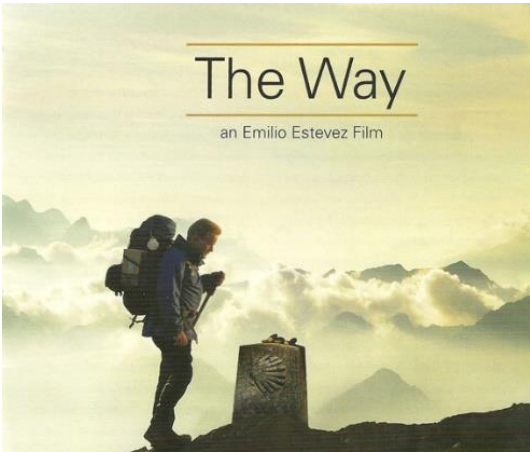

ST. ANDREW'S BOOK GROUP



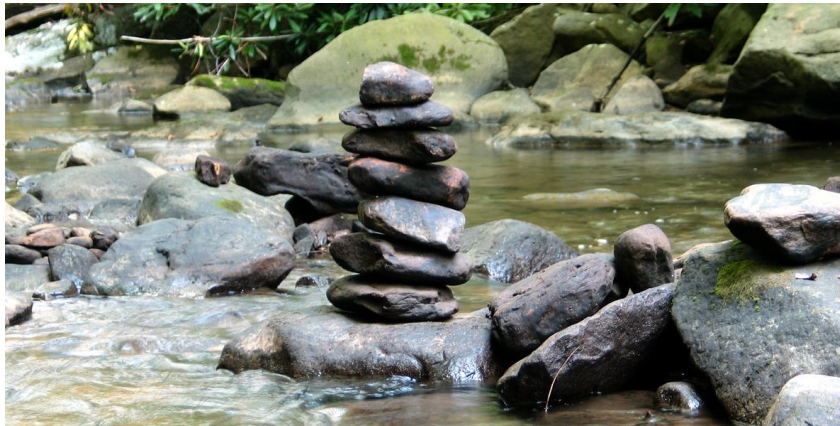
Thanks to everyone who participated in the good discussion of *Anne Frank Remembered* at the St. Andrew's Book Group meeting last month.

FIELD TRIP TO ANTIETAM



Last August's bus trip to Gettysburg was so successful that we have decided to schedule a trip to the Antietam National Battlefield Park this year. The date will be Saturday, May 20. We will meet at the church parking lot at 8 AM for an 8:30 AM departure. Our battlefield tour will be from 1:00 PM- 4:00 PM, led by one of the superb licensed battlefield guides who work there. Our bus, which is limited to 33 people, will be able to negotiate all the park roads. (If we have more people interested, a waiting list will be established after we reach 33.) We will stop for an early lunch, 11:15 AM-11:30 AM, at a restaurant to be determined. Our estimated time of return will be 8 PM. The cost for the trip will be \$30 person and you will be responsible also for paying for your lunch. We will provide bottled water and snacks for the trip.

Antietam is the site of the bloodiest one-day battle in American history. Twenty-three thousand soldiers were killed, wounded or missing after twelve hours of savage combat on September 17, 1862. (For perspective, the total American casualties for June 6, 1944, were 10,000.) The Battle of Antietam ended the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia's first invasion into the North and led to Abraham Lincoln's issuance of the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation. I do hope you will join us on the journey to an important and tragic day in our history. It promises to be a special event.

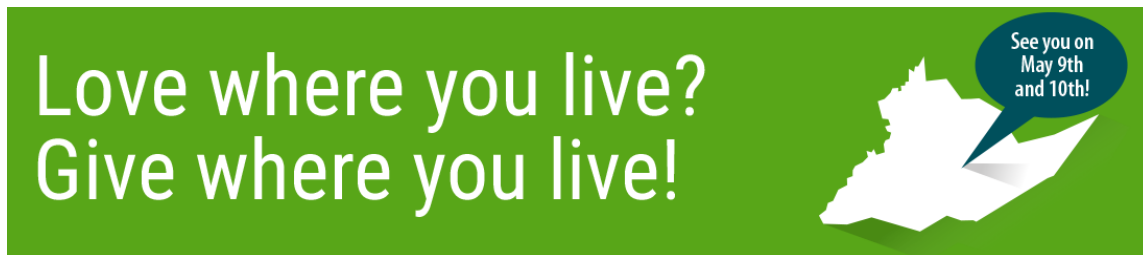
COMMUNITY CAFE

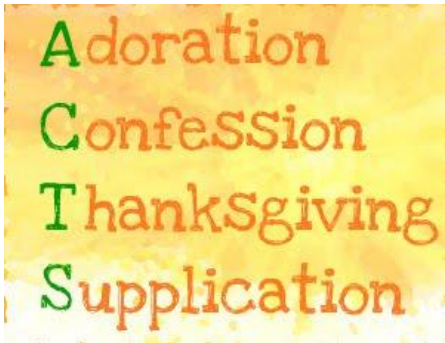

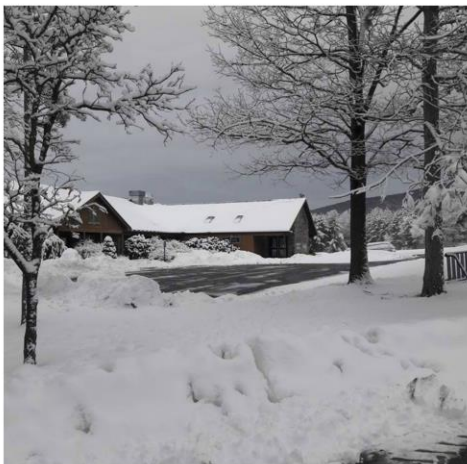

For the Parish

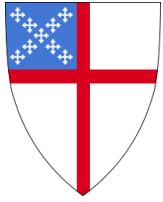
