The Community Café Starts a New Phase

The Community Café is in its eleventh year of operations. It serves on average 120 people every Thursday of the year (including Thanksgiving). It has five teams of volunteers who rotate through to serve the meals. And it provides a happy place for people who may have nowhere else to go to have a delicious meal in the company of other people. I see in the Community Café a model for the Kingdom of God, where all kinds of people come together, are fed, and find community and acceptance.

Last year the vestry recognized that the Community Café is such a vital ministry in our parish and that there are so many people who depend on it that we needed to add some more structure and oversight to ensure it continues for a long time to come. From that thought was born a plan to create a board of directors to oversee the operations of the Community Café, supervise and support the executive director, and provide structure to make its continued existence a more formal reality. Ron Rovansek, who has been the executive director of the Café for many years and has made it what it is today, was already thinking that this level of structure was needed. He worked with me and five others, under the vestry's authority, to create the brand-new board of directors we now have. The first task was to create a set of bylaws to govern the operation of the Café and the function of the board. Those bylaws were approved by the vestry in December.

The board has already met with all volunteers to celebrate their work and to receive their feedback on how things are going in the Café. Then, on January 6 the board had its first official annual meeting at which officers were elected. The board consists of Dennis Shea as the chair, Daniel Foster as the secretary, Amy Allison, Melanie Foster (serving along with Daniel, the two of them occupying one seat on the board with one vote, based on their availability), Ted Jaenecke, and Julie Kwasnica, with *ex officio* members Ron Rovansek as the executive director, and me as the rector.

The board is already working on developing a mission statement, some written policies, and an operation manual. They are also working to ensure that there is sufficient supervision by personnel who are trained in ServSafe qualifications. They are supporting Ron as he implements a new team structure that will empower captains on each team of volunteers. This should help with volunteer management and solve some scheduling issues. And for the first time, the Community Café will have a financial plan - budget, annual fund-raising plan, and a plan to develop a reserve to replace major appliances and equipment.

I celebrate the creation of the board of directors for the Community Café because it involved the hard work and time of several very dedicated and talented people and it is already bearing fruit. I celebrate the creation of the board also because I think it will regularize operations in the Café and keep it operating beyond the involvement of the individuals currently involved with it. But more importantly, I celebrate the fact that this "soup kitchen," that is so much more than a soup kitchen, has grown to the point that it made sense to create a more institutional structure. There are several key volunteers, whom I will not attempt to name, who have put so much of themselves into this ministry. In addition, there are countless volunteers, from within and without the parish, who continue to keep this vital ministry fulfilling its mission week after week. There are those who pick up the food, those who sort the food, those who prepare the food, those who serve the food, and those who clean up at the end of the evening. So many people have worked to bring this ministry from its humble beginnings to the point it is now. I thank God that this ministry is here at St. Andrew's and for all those who have made it possible.

ANNUAL MEETING, POTLUCK DINNER, AND ELECTIONS Sunday, January 27 6:00 p.m. in Canterbury Hall

The parish meeting is a time for all to gather together to recognize outgoing and elect incoming vestry members and convention delegates, to present and discuss the budget for the new year, and to receive reports from committees, ministries and commissions. As usual, we will begin the evening at 6:00 p.m. with a potluck dinner and then proceed to the business portion of the evening.

Vestry and Convention Delegate Elections

For the potluck, if your last name begins with

A through G, please bring a dessert; H through M, please bring a salad; and N through Z, please bring a casserole.

Most years, four vestry members complete their term and we elect four new vestry members to serve a threeyear term. This year, in addition, there is a one-year, unexpired term that needs to be filled due to the resignation of vestry member Rose Bohn. Regarding the convention delegates, based on the size of our parish we have six delegates to the annual diocesan convention. We can designate two alternate delegates as well, in case any of the delegates is unable to fulfill his/her duties.

You will notice that there are exactly the number of candidates, both for vestry and for convention delegates and alternates, as the number of openings. This is true despite the best efforts of our nominating committee to get enough candidates to run so we can have an election. However, there was a mistake made, for which our rector takes full responsibility. That is that we should have opened the nominations process to the whole congregation. We failed to do that and apologize. We promise that next fall we will follow the procedure of opening nominations to the congregation in addition to having a nominating committee tasked with recruitment of appropriate candidates.

This slate of candidates is presented for your consideration. Election will take place on Sunday, January 27, the day of our annual parish meeting. More information will follow about the election process.

January 13: Dr. Sylvia NeelyCarbon Pricing and Solutions for the Climate Crisis

Dr. Sylvia Neely is the Chair of the Board of Directors at Pennsylvania Interfaith Human Services (PA IPL). PA-IPL is part of a national movement that is a religious response to climate change. This state-wide network of congregations, individuals, and faith-based organizations helps congregations become more energy efficient. Dr. Neely also works with Citizens Climate Lobby, a non-partisan organization working to create the political will to solve the climate change crisis (CitizensClimateLobby.org). Dr. Neely is retired from Penn State where she was an Associate Professor of History at Penn State and scholar of Lafayette and French revolutionary history. She received her B.A. from Duke University, her M.S. from NYU, and her Ph.D. From the University of Notre Dame.

January 20: Dr. Julia Kasdorf Shale Play

Poet and Professor of English at Penn State, Dr. Julia Spicher Kasdorf will share her 2018 book, *Shale Play*, a collaboration with award-winning documentary photographer Steven Rubin. Their words and images explore the small towns, farms, and forests of Appalachian Pennsylvania to highlight the stories of these places and the working people who inhabit them. Dr. Kasdorf grew up in Westmoreland, Pennsylvania, and she is a Professor of English and Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies at Penn State University. 
Tickets are \$10.00 per person and will be available in the office or at Coffee Hours/Breakfasts in January.
