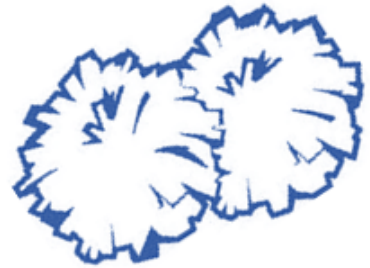

VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry

August 2019



The August vestry meeting was held on Tuesday, August 13. The parish's net operating income for July was dramatically lower than monthly expenses, and our year-to-date financial position is now in the red. This is not unusual for the summer, but we encourage all parishioners to remember that the church's financial needs remain constant year-round. We sincerely thank all parishioners for their monthly pledges and contributions to the stewardship of St. Andrew's.

At the August meeting the vestry was pleased to speak with Ted Christopher as part of his journey in the discernment process for priesthood in the diocese. The vestry unanimously endorsed Ted for postulancy to Holy Orders. Other matters were largely financial in nature; the vestry discussed the upcoming stewardship campaign, and also approved some proposals from the Finance Committee to improve the organization and accounting of our savings account, as well as to pay for maintenance and tuning of the organ.

As always, approved vestry minutes are available on our website ("Clergy, Staff & Vestry" under the "About Us" tab), and parishioners are always welcome to attend vestry meetings. Meetings are scheduled for the second Tuesday of the month at 7 p.m. in room 324.

Wardens have an ancient and honorable role in the Anglican Church, at least for the last few centuries. Personally I was surprised and humbled at the end of January when Fr. Jeff Packard asked me to be St. Andrew's senior warden for 2019. I told him, not entirely jokingly, that I would accept on condition that he remain both here and healthy. There's the rub; the warden position becomes a shocking responsibility only if the rector is incapacitated, resigns, or becomes otherwise unavailable. Perish the thought, but it happened to two very recent wardens (thank you, Linda Mace and Wendy Keeler!), who then had to step in and preside over the vestry and make administrative decisions on a weekly basis. So, Fr. Jeff's health would be in my prayers anyway, but all the more so this year! My warden-ship was announced in a 10 a.m. service in February, but surprisingly some missed the announcement and were asking fairly recently who answered that call. So this column seemed timely, even this late in the year.

To non-Episcopal people, or even to those who joined us after growing up in other faith traditions (as I did), the word *warden* commonly means the administrator of a prison, with all that implies. The word comes from the Old French *gardien*, and evidently churchwardens (according to my antique Funk & Wagnalls dictionary, a single word) became a part of Anglican tradition from "time out of mind," at least as early as there was any role at all for laity. Our supervisory board is called a "vestry" from the storage room where they usually met, and the wardens "guarded" it and them, I suppose.

Our senior warden is sometimes called the "rector's" warden while the junior warden is also known as the "people's" warden. This suggests that I be available especially as an advisor or sounding board to the Rector, while my colleague Kathryn Yahner has the portfolio of dealing with issues of concern to the parish's people as a whole; for example, stewardship.

In our case there's also a more literal meaning: I'm the old warden and she's the young one! In fact, we are both available to Fr. Jeff and to the congregation for any concern whatever. We have been helping to visualize the way forward to a new program of strategic planning and perhaps to a new capital campaign, coming to grips with the parish's continuing and growing material as well as spiritual needs. On the other hand, we are here and available to receive comments, concerns and if necessary, complaints from anyone who is uncomfortable taking those to even our very approachable and kind Rector. My motto for this is, "Gripes kindly received here," without argument, lectures, or judgmental behavior; I consider that a holy trust.



I would emphasize that our term ends in January and we'll need two new wardens. Now I also must emphasize, as I have joined Fr. Jeff going Over the Edge (rappelling down the 12-story Hyatt Hotel building October 17 for the benefit of Interfaith Human Services), that's not part of the warden job and the next incumbent is absolutely not required to sign up for it! The job of senior warden truly does not entail going Over the Edge either metaphorically or literally. Please do support us Episco-rappelians and Interfaith with your spare dollars, and please, if you receive a call to warden-ship, do regard it as a safe challenge, at least in the physical sense.

The Community Café has lots of exciting news to share this month:

Kitchen Changes. You may have noticed that the kitchen in Canterbury Hall is undergoing some changes. We have removed the electric ovens and their cabinet housing and donated them to Habitat for Humanity. This creates space for new racks that will hold hotel pans and sheet trays. We will install a small worktable next to the stove so there is a place to set utensils. Finally, we have donated the table with the cutting board top to Taproot Kitchen; our latest kitchen inspection revealed the top and the open shelving underneath no longer met code. These changes will be instrumental for the inspection of the kitchen in October.

New Donation Partner. We hope to be partnering soon with the new Giant store for weekly donations. Giant is working toward a zero waste policy, so we think the arrangement will be mutually beneficial. Our paperwork has been submitted and we are awaiting official word from their corporation.

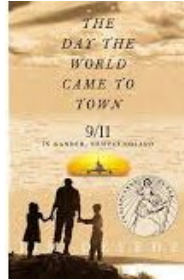
the realities of a new world that he knows nothing about.

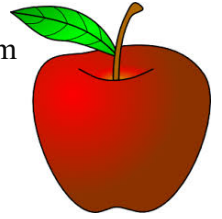
