St. Andrew's Needs More Money

Dear fellow parishioners,

As we turn toward Advent, then Christmas, we also have to anticipate the looming New Year 2020 and the Church's budget for the coming year. I have to tell you that unless we turn a corner also in terms of money, our beloved St Andrew's will be faced with some unpleasant, not to say cruel, choices.

The Stewardship Committee has produced, over the last several weeks, an excellent series of talks and a beautiful mailing, and many of you have already responded with pledges both of money and time/talent for 2020. The evident trend is upward, and we on the Vestry are deeply grateful. At the same time, the Finance Committee has naturally been tasked with preparing the new budget. It's a simple fact that the numbers are more troubling than we anticipated.

St Andrew's has experienced a decline in numbers both of members and of pledges in the last few years. The number of pledging units for the last three years are 184 in 2017, 165 in 2018, and 159 this year. Pledge average amounts have gone up, but the total number of dollars has declined. Since 2015, we have been using some endowment money each year to balance the budget. With the use of endowment, we had a year-end surplus in 2015-16-17. In 2018, that dwindled to a deficit of about \$8000. This year the deficit is, to the end of October, \$46,000; that is, not quite 10 percent of a budget just over \$500,000. (It's reasonable to hope that some Christmas generosity will ameliorate that figure for 2019.) That number is disturbing, and Finance Committee has felt forced to propose an austerity budget for 2020, with cuts and "tiers" that would allow cuts to be restored if pledge income rises substantially. Their proposed total is based on pledge income of \$400,000, which is simply an extension of what has been received in recent years.

We are most unhappy to be considering cuts in our St Andrew's programs, personnel, or building maintenance. Our Church stands for some terrific things: help for the poor; pastoral care; maintaining a beautiful, welcoming, useful, but big and aging building; liturgy and a music program that we love; education of children and youth. We are actually a rather lean operation, presently at slightly more than a half-million dollars a year to support our buildings (\$74,000 in 2019), office expense (\$18,000), ministries (\$15,000), Diocesan fair share contribution (about \$75,000), and staff salaries and benefits (about \$329,000). That last figure is for all ten employees; there are only two full-time people, Fr. Packard and the sexton. The other eight people on the staff, including music, secretary, treasurer, Christian Education, nursery and so on, are part-time but in our humble opinion, necessary for the function of our parish as we know and love it. The total for staff must go up, as the Diocese mandates a small cost-of-living adjustment. On the other hand, do we go on spending our precious endowment? All conventional wisdom suggests that is a bad idea, at least as a continuing plan, year after year.

There's only one happy way out of this cul-de-sac. That, my dear friends, is for us to dig deep and come up with a significant increase in our contributions. If we are complacent, we'll be faced with deep, possibly debilitating cuts. But ah, on the other hand! If we all come up with a five, or possibly ten percent pledge boost, we could avoid the trap and fund St Andrew's to the full extent we expect.

Let's plan to talk this over. There will be a plain presentation in church at all services December 8 (Advent 2) and a communal roundtable during the adult education hour at 9:00 a.m. December 15. I hope we can reach a plan to move us forward....as I complete my own year as your senior warden.





Come start your Advent with a dose of good cheer as we craft and snack together after the 10:00 service on the first Sunday of Advent. We'll make Christmas cards for inmates, decorate the Angel Tree, and color some Christmas stars for church decoration. Also pick up an advent wreath and candles (for a small donation), as well as a liturgy to use with them at home!

A FESTIVAL OF LESSONS AND CAROLS

The annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols will be presented on Sunday, December 16th, at 5 p.m. It is patterned after the Christmas Eve service held in King's College Chapel. The Festival was introduced in 1918 to bring a more imaginative approach to worship. It was first broadcast in 1928 and is now broadcast to millions of people around the world. The service has become of staple of Episcopal churches in the United States and has even spread to other denominations. Readings are followed by carols and anthems from the choirs and carols sung by the congregation. Both the Youth and Adult choirs will sing for this service. Music includes works by Mark Burrowes, J. S. Bach, Jean-Philippe Rameau, Walter Wells, Elizabeth Poston, John Rutter, Franz Biebl, Nicholas White and Mark Schweizer.


VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry November 2019

The November vestry meeting was held on Tuesday, November 12. The parish's net operating income for October was again exceeded by monthly expenses, and our year-to-date financial status is significantly in the red. We are currently operating at a deficit for the year of almost \$47,000. Financial support through regular pledging and contributions is essential to the sustainability of St. Andrew's. If you have not yet returned your pledge commitment for 2020, we encourage you to do so soon!

The vestry heard reports from various St. Andrew's committees and ministries. Out of the Cold begins at St. Andrew's on November 18 and will require a large number of volunteers. Property Committee submitted a list of priority maintenance projects for 2020. Most of the meeting was spent discussing the draft 2020 budget submitted by Finance Committee, about which more will be shared soon. Subsequent to the meeting, the vestry met with the Rev. Canon Dan Morrow, from the diocesan office, for the first stage of a Mutual Ministry Review. The vestry will be working with Canon Morrow over the next few months to examine the prayerfulness of our ministry. Vestry is also looking forward to its strategic planning retreat in January to continue these discussions.

A reminder that the date for the annual parish meeting is Sunday, January 26, 2020, at 6:00pm. Nominations for candidates for seats on the vestry or as convention delegates are now open. We invite all members to consider







whether they feel called to serve in these important ways. Anyone interested in running for a seat should speak with Kathryn Yahner, junior warden and nomination committee chair.







<u>Stormbreak Girls Group Home</u> provides up to nine dependent and delinquent girls ages 12-19 with a safe, structured, and nurturing environment to learn and grow. Through real-life experiences in the home and in the community girls gain skills that help them work towards permanency with family, foster care, or other permanent living. A focus on individualized treatment is the basis of the program's success. Positive change for the individual and family is our goal.

<u>Burrowes Street Youth Haven</u> is a voluntary shelter housing homeless, runaways or at-risk youth (ages 12-17) for a maximum of 15 days. Services include 24-hour hotline assistance for youth and their families; assistance with immediate crisis needs such as food, shelter and clothing; therapeutic shelter care for youth; drop-in care, including counseling, snacks and activities; and individual, family and group counseling.

OUT OF THE COLD CENTRE COUNTY

For the last two weeks, St. Andrew's has hosted over 20 guests each night as part of Out of the Cold Centre County. Thanks to all our volunteers plus everyone who held our guests and the OOTC problem in their prayers.
