# Who Wants to Live in an Institution?

A priest friend of mine recently performed a wedding with no overt mention of God, no prayers, and no blessing. He was asked by a family friend and actually enjoyed being part of this couple's big day. The bride and groom are not believers. Neither of their families have a tradition of religious affiliation or practice. So, my friend agreed to create a ceremony that respected their wishes. He worked with them to put together a lovely service that was based on the shape of our liturgy but completely devoid of divinity. It included readings from poetry and literature, beautiful and meaningful music, and ceremonial actions that represented the binding together of the couple. And of course, they wrote their own vows.

My friend shared the liturgy with me. I was struck most by those vows. They were intelligent and coherent. They were romantic and practical. They were poetic, even inspiring. Yet there was something missing. Though one could argue that it was implied, there was no mention of being faithful. I'm sure neither of these people intended that omission. I doubt they even noticed it. They were lovely vows, full of the promise to affirm each other's individuality. There was just nothing in them calling for monogamy.

Couples preparing for marriage often ask if they can write their own vows. Our prayer book gives tremendous flexibility in the celebration and blessing of a marriage, but the one non-negotiable thing is the vows. The exercise of writing one's own vows can be a powerful experience of putting into words what your spouse-to-be means to you and how you envision your life together. I'm sure it is very meaningful to those who take on the task. It is a way to make your wedding your own, to put your own mark on the institution of marriage, in a word, to individualize your wedding. Our traditional vows, on the other hand, accomplish the exact opposite. They show no concern for who the individuals are who exchange those vows in front of God and everyone. They, in fact, call each individual to conform his or her life to a manner of living that is pre-defined, given, set. The vows themselves define what the marriage will be.

The Christian Church obviously did not invent marriage. We have, however, imposed a great deal of meaning upon it. We even say that "it signifies to us the mystery of the union between Christ and his Church." (BCP 423) Marriage became a metaphor in the New Testament. Heaven is envisioned as a great marriage feast. The Church waiting for the return of Jesus is as a bride awaiting her bridegroom. The love of a married couple is seen as a living symbol of, "Christ's love to this sinful and broken world, that unity may overcome estrangement, forgiveness heal guilt, and joy conquer despair." (BCP 429) All of this suggests something way beyond ourselves who live according to these vows.

At the heart of our understanding of marriage is a one flesh union between two people. That doesn't mean that each partner ceases to be an individual, but it does imply some loss of individuality with a greater gain of unity, love, strength, comfort, and common purpose. The couple becomes greater than the sum of their two parts with God's blessing and presence in their lives. Of course, no two couples will live out their vows exactly the same, but they will live within the same framework of commitment with a shared understanding of what is expected of each of them. Our liturgy makes clear the nature and purpose of marriage within the Christian context. In it two people are called to live beyond themselves, for one another with sacrificial love, mutual respect and the willingness to forgive. There isn't much individual expression in the vows, but by submitting to them we become something so much greater than an individual.

# **VESTRY UPDATE**, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry



The vestry met on Tuesday, October 13, remotely, using Zoom. Despite the ongoing pandemic, our monthly income has remained strong and on track with normal conditions. We are very grateful for the continued stewardship of our parish by all parishioners. As we enter our traditional season of budget-making, you should have received a pledge card in the mail. We invite all parishioners to prayerfully discern their financial gifts to the parish and to fill out and return that card as soon as possible. If you did not receive a pledge card and would like to pledge your support for the parish, please contact the office.

Much of the vestry meeting was devoted to a presentation by Sarah Klinetob Lowe, chair of the property committee, concerning Trinity House and the potential possibilities and challenges for its renovation and repurposing. There has been some discussion over the possibility of using Trinity House as an incomegenerating rental. Sarah walked the vestry through the potential building use restrictions that impact the property, due to its historic neighborhood zoning status and current use as church property. She invited the vestry to first decide what its overall goals for Trinity House are, in the context of the parish's strategic planning process, and only then to decide whether or how to repurpose or rent Trinity House.

In addition to hearing Sarah's presentation, the vestry set the date for the annual parish meeting (January 31, 2021), voted to accept a set of Procedures in Case of Rector Infection with Coronavirus, and voted to support the intended sale of a State College property owned in part by a trust to which St. Andrew's is a party, a sale which will bring the parish some financial benefit.

As always, vestry meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month and are open to all parishioners, especially those who may have some interest in running for a seat on the vestry. 

# Labyrinth at St. Andrew's

A group of St. Andrew's parishioners led by Candace Davison and Christina Ford has been exploring the possibility of creating a permanent outdoor labyrinth on St. Andrew's property. Many of you may be familiar with labyrinths. They are an old Christian tool for meditative walking prayer. We determined the first step would be to paint two temporary options into the grass and give people a chance to try them out and give feedback. There will be one design painted in the front lawn on Fraser St., and one painted in the backyard of Trinity house. These temporary labyrinths should be ready for your feet by Monday and you may find them an especially helpful tool in these times to calm nerves and over-busy minds! Remember to wear your mask and keep as distant as possible when walking the labyrinths. We will follow up in coming weeks with a way to give feedback on your experience walking the labyrinths.

November 8: In Prayer": Ways that Music Inspires our Faith, Creativity, Work, and Being Steve and Lisa Hopkins

Steve and Lisa Hopkins are musicians, educators, and leaders of the service music at our Sunday afternoon services. They have also been married now for 38 years. Their life together is a journey in faith, and their faith has found meaningful expression through words and music in song. Karl Zimmerer is a geographer and environmental scientist—and is also in the rural sociology and ecology programs at Penn State—who studies sustainable land use and food systems through the use of agrobiodiversity and seed and knowledge networks. In this forum, Karl will describe the current paradox of chocolate. The many forms of chocolate that we love and cherish have evolved through worldwide production of the cacao tree. Cacao is increasingly valued and championed even as the roots of its cultural and ecological well-being are imperiled. Karl will share his theological reflections to describe and discuss the promise and peril of chocolate and cacao.

November 22: Neighbors Helping Neighbors Stay Warm: The Centre County Fuel Bank Cricket Hunter and Sarah Klinetob Lowe

Interfaith Human Services (IHS) is a local collaborative nonprofit, supported by 27 local faith communities (including St. Andrew's), that works to meet the social and economic needs of Centre County residents. In this forum, Cricket Hunter of Grace Lutheran Church and Sarah Klinetob Lowe will speak about the Centre County Fuel Bank program administered by IHS. The Fuel Bank helps qualified low-income Centre County residents avoid heating emergencies by providing them with free heating oil, wood, coal, and propane. Cricket and Sarah will discuss their personal experiences teaching energy conservation classes for the Fuel Bank and share how they bring their faith into this energy-based service.



**My Neighbor Totoro** is set in post-war Japan, in a rural village where a man and his two daughters move into a small house so they can be closer to their ailing mother. It's here that the girls discover the magic of the natural world that is all



around them; tiny dust balls in the empty house are actually creatures, and the woods are filled with pointy-eared spirits, the most cuddly of which one of the girls dubs Totoro. There are a number of moments in 'Totoro' where Miyazaki just allows the wind to rustle the grass and the sunlight to drape over the girls, emphasizing the magic of everyday life and the importance of slowing down long enough to recognize it, a gift that we can all appreciate today.




In October, members of the St. Andrew's Book Club met and had a very entertaining discussion concerning The Amityville Horror, whether the story was true or whether it was a hoax.


