Communion in the Time of COVID

If there is one word that sums up the church's experience during the COVID-19 pandemic, I would say it is Communion. Now, that may sound ironic, or perhaps even cynical, since for most of the pandemic most of us have been prevented from actually receiving Communion. I offer that word, however, as a way of describing both the longing we have experienced during this time and the way the church has been forced to reimagine its ministry, its very existence, and its sense of community.

To the first point, there is always a longing experienced when we celebrate Communion. This sacrament is a comfort for the church, a promise of Christ's presence with us always, until the end of time. Yet it is also an interim sacrament... until the end of time. We partake of the presence of our Lord in the bread and the wine, even as we long for the day when we meet him face to face in his kingdom. We celebrate our ongoing communion with God through Christ while at the same time celebrating continued communion with the faithful who have gone before us. In short, Communion is a *this world* experience. It serves as a foretaste of the heavenly banquet, but just a foretaste. One day we shall partake of that banquet and the foretaste will soon be forgotten, just as the "slight momentary afflictions" of this world will be forgotten in the presence of full joy. So, the inexpressible comfort and joy of receiving Communion is always tempered by the already-but-not-yetness of our faith. During Coronatide, as we have been separated from this sacrament of comfort and from one another, we have certainly experienced the discomfort of that separation. Our longing, therefore, has been intensified and focused. Perhaps when we all get back to church and participate in the sacrament of Holy Communion again, we will do so with a renewed appreciation for the divine presence it imparts. For now, we experience spiritual communion, the presence of Christ given to the church when access to Communion is not possible.

On the positive side, the church has been forced into a season of reimagining itself. We no longer feel the temptation to think of the church as the building. The church is the people. We are the church. Whether we are physically gathered or separated, the church continues. Our building could stand empty, it could even be destroyed, the church would still continue. What a wondrous mystery! Technology has allowed us to keep a virtual sense of community going through all this, but even if that weren't possible, we would still be the church. We would still be God's vehicle for salvation, for blessing, for renewal, and for loving the world. As difficult as this time has been, and continues to be, we have an opportunity in it to reinforce what it has always meant to be the church, and we can keep experimenting with how we will be the church moving into the future.

Being part of a community is about belonging and participating. Both how we belong to and how we participate in the church have changed. Technology has knocked down the walls. Pandemic has opened up new possibilities. We will never be the same church again. None of us would have chosen this process, and I for one would never want to repeat it, but God is able to use this time of separation and fasting to build up the Communion of the Body of Christ. Let us see what the Holy Spirit has in store for us next.

VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry



The vestry met on Tuesday, September 15, remotely, using Zoom. Although our income has dropped to relatively normal summer levels, the parish's financial support is still strong and we remain in a solid position for the year to date. The vestry is grateful for continued financial support from parishioners through contributions, pledges, and gifts. The vestry discussed the upcoming stewardship campaign and how best to adapt stewardship efforts to this time of physical distancing; look for updates on this coming soon.

The vestry also discussed the safety guidelines for in-person gathering for worship. Our gatherings have been safe and so far without incident. The diocesan committee on safety guidelines is revising the diocesan rules to allow for greater flexibility in individual parishes based on their physical size and ability to distance; it may be possible for us at some point to increase the number of worshippers allowed at our in-person service, or to add an additional in-person service time. If the pandemic worsens here in State College, however, it may be necessary to further restrict in-person gatherings. The vestry made no specific changes to our current guidelines, so keep watching for updates if anything changes.

STEWARDSHIP



The year 2020 is one for the history books, both because of the historic events that have marked this year, and because we all can't wait until this year is history. For all the strangeness of this year, we have learned some important lessons. We've learned just how connected we all are, not just in our local community but around the world. We've learned that adversity often brings out the best in people. Unfortunately, it can bring out people's worst too, but even poor behavior seems to call us all to do better. We've learned that we can do without so much that we thought was so important, just as we have learned to appreciate the things that really are important.

In the church, we've learned a whole new way to Be the Church. We are physically separated for safety reasons, but that does not prevent us from being spiritually connected. A whole new virtual world has opened to us. It was no less than a miracle that we were able to switch to online versions of worship, fellowship, Christian formation, and meetings virtually overnight. People have joined us for our Sunday morning Facebook Live service from all over the country and all over the world. Not everybody has been able to take advantage of every opportunity that is offered online, but most people seem to be plugging into one or more options. Our daily Morning Prayer service used to have an average of 2-3 people. Now it regularly has a dozen. It peaked at 20 or more back when everyone was locked down in the spring. We all love our beautiful building, but we have learned that being the church has nothing to do with limestone or stained glass. The church is made up of living stones. We are the glass through which God shines his light into the world. We are the church. We continue to learn new and exciting ways to be the church.

An unusual year demands an unusual stewardship campaign. It is no secret that the parish needs money to operate and that every year we ask you to make a pledge. In addition to pledging your treasure, we ask you to pledge your time and talent too. This year we reinvent the time & talent card. Since the usual card includes so many ministries that are not really happening now, and since we are breaking new ministry ground during this pandemic, we thought it appropriate to invite you to commit to doing something different. So, watch for the mailing in mid-October and be sure to return your pledge cards by November 1. Of course, there will be online options for both. With your help the ministry of St. Andrew's is virtually unstoppable!

The Signs of Jesus in the Gospel according to John

One can conceive of a sign in a variety of ways – that thing which provides information to a traveler along the way (a sign on the road), those things which portend or predict or reflect in a cultural or societal context (the sign of the times). It is possible even to imagine the concept of a seed sown in the Earth just beginning to emerge as a sign of new life.

Unlike the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke (the synoptics), the Gospel of John does not present Jesus as working miracles, pe se. In this Gospel, we have signs (Greek; sémeion, σημεῖον), which properly understood point towards a deeper truth about both the action and the actor.

All Saints/Souls

This is a time for us to think about how to bring our church life home in new ways! If you haven't set up your own display for All Souls and All Saints Day before, think about doing it this year!

Your display doesn't have to be complicated - just gather pictures of family members who have died and set them up in a central part of your home (at your kitchen table, or a coffee table in your living room). Add whatever things you have that show the significance of the memorial: flowers, candles, a nice piece of cloth to go underneath. If you really get into this, you could also hunt for objects that remind you of these family members' stories or personalities! And don't forget the "official" saints! Print out pictures of your favorites and add them to the collection.



While technically in November, I like to connect this practice to Halloween! You can get it together the week before Halloween and leave it up for a week.



If you have kids, this is a nice way to point to your faith without doing a lot of talking. And it is a chance to tell your kids stories about extended family who they might not have had a chance to experience in their lives.

This is a wonderful practice in so many ways, one of which is the experience of connecting (at least visually) to people who have gone before extraordinary people and ordinary people alike. The people who have gone before - the ones we knew personally and also the great figures - lived out their lives in good and bad times and often responded to those times in inspiring ways. This is a really helpful thing for me to hold onto right now!

OUTREACH

State College Virtual CROP Hunger Walk October 11 - 17



Each year, the parishioners of St. Andrew's join with others in our community to raise money and awareness for hunger relief locally and around the world through the CROP Hunger Walk. On Sunday, October 11 at 2:00 pm, State College will kick off the first-ever Virtual CROP Hunger Walk, live on the **State College CROP Hunger Walk Facebook page.** Hunger fighters are invited to walk any time that week, any route they like!

The money we raise will be used to help the 820 million people in the world who don't have enough to eat. Twenty-five percent of the funds raised in the State College CROP Hunger Walk goes directly to the State College Food Bank. The rest is used by Church World Service globally to provide food and water, seeds and tools, wells and water systems, technical training, micro-enterprise loans, disaster relief and more.

Although we won't be able to gather for lunch beforehand, or get close to each other when we walk, the St. Andrew's Purple People Feeders still plan to join together wearing purple on October 11 to walk as a socially-distanced team. All parishioners, family members, friends, and pets are encouraged to put on a purple mask and join us! We'll gather on the front lawn at 1:45 pm and be ready to step off on our usual 5K route through downtown just after the Facebook Live kick-off.

COMMUNITY CAFÉ

The Community Café continues to operate while we navigate the virus into the autumn. We serve about 160 meals a week and have received many messages of thanks from people in the State College community. One patron told us that he never had to receive free meals before, but he and his family are very grateful for our service.

We are very appreciative for Frank and his crew at Weis Markets as we now pick up on Saturday mornings. They are very friendly, helpful, and always eager to assist with donations. We also are grateful to Trader Joe's and Wegman's for their continuing support, and HoneyBaked Ham who recently provided us with a hundred hambones that went toward making a delicious soup.

Finally, during the pandemic, patrons don't always get to see all the teams that are currently operating to keep the Café functioning. There are three teams of cooks who rotate days during the week so they can remain separated: soup makers; prep cooks; teams who pick up from Wegman's, Trader Joe's (twice a week), and Weis Markets; serving teams who pack up the meals in take-out containers; the folks that work outside to deliver the meals; the outdoor dinner service team; and the laundry crew. And don't forget the Cramers who are raising The Café pigs. As you can see, it takes many hands to keep the Café operating. We are all waiting for when we can all be together again.

TIME FOR FLU SHOTS!

This year with the additional threat of COVID 19, it is more important than usual to get your flu shot. If your mom hasn't already done it, we are giving you a reminder.

The CDC recommends getting the vaccine before seasonal influenza activity increases beginning in October. It takes about two weeks after getting your shot for your body to produce flufighting antibodies.

If you don't get your flu shot from your primary care provider, there are several choices in Centre County:




Mount Nittany Health on Blue Course Drive will begin operating a flu shot clinic where vaccines will be available to anyone at least 6 years old. Appointments can be made for Oct. 3, 17 and 24 for time slots between 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. All vaccinations will be given in patient vehicles.


Mount Nittany Health in Boalsburg will provide flu shots by appointment on Monday-Friday between 7-8 a.m. These vaccines will be given at a "walk-up" patient tent and are available to anyone 6 months to 18 years old.

Most local pharmacies offer flu vaccines, including those located at Target, CVS, Giant, Weis Markets, Walmart, Wegmans and Sam's Club.


BOOK CLUB
