What Is God Bringing Forth?

Last fall my spiritual director asked me a question that made me think. She asked, "What do you think God is bringing forth during this pandemic?" Spiritual directors love to ask questions like that. We had been talking about one of the millions of ways that life in general and parish life in particular had been affected by the pandemic. Since we were about to enter the season of Advent, the wording of her question seemed apt. The image of pregnancy and the invisible growth and development of God's Word incarnate within young Mary, called to mind a God who works silently and mysteriously to bring about his will, and can even work through the chaos we have all experienced in the past year to create something new and good. The question and the concept of looking for God at work around us really stuck with me.

I have put that question to the parish staff for discussion in a staff meeting. I have asked the same question for discussion among the vestry. In each case, it yielded some fascinating conversation. The question has had such an abiding hold on me I finally decided to ask it to everyone. How can you ask everyone a provocative question that invites them to reflect on all the craziness of the past year and endeavor to find God at work amid the events of the world? Answer: Have a poetry contest!

See this issue of our newsletter for more information about the poetry contest, but in a nutshell, submissions will be accepted in March and April, judged in May, and announced in June. We will have a reading of the winners and selected others during the Arts Festival this year.

This poetry contest gives us an opportunity to engage in public theology, pastoral care on a massive scale, and evangelism. It is an exercise in public theology because it gets people thinking and talking about God. Obviously, not everyone will approach the question in the same way, but the process of looking for God at work and then expressing that in an artistic way is the heart of theology. The events of 2020 - disease, economic devastation, social injustice, politics, etc.—have been traumatic. We will all be processing the emotions caused by these events for some time. Asking the question and giving folks an outlet for their response is a kind of pastoral care that kick starts the processing and integration of these complex emotions. Who knows, reading someone else's poetry may be healing as well. And finally, I call it evangelism because the contest is sponsored by a church. It not only invites people to interact with our parish through our web page and social media, but it may lead to deeper engagement with essential questions of faith. It gives us the chance to engage with people who may be open to the message of love, healing, and mercy we share.

I hope you feel inspired by the question. I hope you pause and reflect on your own experiences of the past year and the experiences of our nation and the world. I hope you wrestle with the ways in which God may be bringing forth something new, something exciting, something unexpected. Whether or not you write or submit a poem, I hope that you join me in this powerful reflection process. This question assumes that God is always present and always active. If you accept that premise, it becomes our job to figure out what God is up to and join in the effort.

The vestry met on Tuesday, January 12, remotely, using Zoom. The vestry is grateful for the 2021 pledges that have been received up to this point. The January vestry meeting was the final meeting for our outgoing members who have completed their terms: Christina Ford, Greg Loviscky, Kevin Lowe, and Kathryn Yahner. A very big thank you again to them, and thanks to those parishioners who have stepped up to run for the open seats.

Much of the meeting was spent in a discussion about the pandemic, its effects on the parish, and what God may be bringing forth during this time. Vestry members discussed things they have learned, things they think the parish should continue, and things the parish might want to do differently going forward. Many vestry members expect online offerings and hybrid services and meetings to be a permanent part of our ministry going forward, regardless of pandemic conditions. In addition to the discussion, vestry dealt with some financial matters, particularly relating to surplus funds left over from 2020. Finally, vestry also appointed Grace Pilato and Scott Thomas to the Community Café Board and was pleased to endorse Kevin Barron for his Ordination to the Diaconate.

IX. Budget Report (Linda Mace)

- We ended 2020 with a significant surplus; vestry set \$20,000 aside as a surplus fund for 2021.
- We are not yet at our projected 2021 pledge amount; as of last Sunday our pledge amount was at \$385,448.
- Receipts from 2020 actually exceeded pledge amounts, so we remain optimistic.
- We continue to meet our Fair Share commitment to the diocese.
- For 2021, not many changes to the 2020 budget have been made.
 - Worship: altar care budget removed (surplus for last year); flower budget reduced
 - Utilities: Costs have remained essentially static; insurance and safety monitoring are slightly more expensive
 - Administrative: E-giving costs; staff costs increase, but outside staff costs reduced
 - PPP loan funds continue to be held as a surplus2021 budget is constructed with a \$16,000 deficit which we will continue to monitor

X. Rector's Report

- Vestry placed the strategic planning process on hold in early summer, but hopefully will resume again in the near future
- Keeping up the community of St. Andrew's continues to be challenging under the pandemic
- But there have been positive aspects as well: budget contributions, stewardship of PM and Café, prayer, parishioners keeping in touch with each other
- Flexibility of the staff has been very impressive: learning how to use digital tools, video editing, adapting educational programs, going with the flow
- Major questions to consider:
 - What will we want to keep from this time?
 - What will we want to let go of?
 - What is God bringing forth during this time?
 - Is God bringing forth something new for us as a parish?
 - Doing public theology: Upcoming poetry contest (chapbook and Arts Fest), inviting others outside of St. Andrew's to contribute



CLIMATE, CATASTROPHE, AND FAITH

A three-part series from Philip Jenkins

Climate is the missing dimension in understanding religion, past, present and future. Repeatedly through history, the world has been subject to severe climate-driven shocks, which have resulted in famine, disease, violence, social upheaval, and mass migration. Commonly, such episodes have been understood in religious terms, through the language of apocalypse, millennium, and Judgment. In response, different societies have often responded through religious forms, for instance by



spawning new religious movements and revivals, or persecuting and expelling religious minorities. Such eras have redrawn the world's religious maps and created the global concentrations of believers as we know them today. Philip Jenkins will tell the story of how climate change has reshaped faith and faiths, and what that portends for the near future.

We will once again make take-home Communion available for Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Bread and wine will be consecrated on the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, February 14, and reserved for distribution. Deliveries will be made between Sunday afternoon and Tuesday. In person pick up of home Communion kits will take place on Shrove Tuesday, February 16, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. just as we did on Christmas Eve. Along with your consecrated Communion elements you may also receive ashes that will have been blessed for imposition on Ash Wednesday. Written instructions will be included for both Communion and ashes to be used at home.

ASH WEDNESDAY WORSHIP

Facebook Live Service: Wednesday February 17, Noon Drive-by Ashes: Wednesday, February 17, 1 - 2 p.m. and 5 - 6 p.m.

On Ash Wednesday, at noon we will have a livestreamed service on Facebook during which you can consume your take-home Communion and use the ashes if you wish. As an alternative, if you are able, you can drive by in front of the church on Fraser Street to receive ashes from the priest. Ashes will be available 1-2 and 5-6 that afternoon. Disposable swabs will be used to impose the ashes. There will **NOT** be drive-by Communion, only ashes. You must pick up your Communion kit on Tuesday or sign up to have them delivered.



This is a very fitting year to focus on going deeper into God's presence during Lent! With that in mind, we are providing Lenten Micropractices from Vibrant Church Communications and a Lent Bag. Here is a description from the website:

"Lent is a 40 day season of preparation for the resurrection of Jesus. In our Lenten Micropractices, you'll find a new practice to guide you each day on your journey of preparation. Some practices can be done on the spot, some during the day, and others will take some time and/or prep work.

Traditionally, there are three pillars of Lent: praying, fasting, and alms giving, which come to us from Matthew 6:1-18. Our micropractices rotate through these themes, along with additional practices that don't fit neatly in one of those categories ("more").

A micropractice is a small spiritual practice. Instead of engaging the same spiritual practice throughout Lent, the micropractices are meant to give a sample across many different styles of practices. Some are active, some are reflective. They will make you think, take action, connect with God and others, and live into your Christian life."

Each practice is printed on a beautiful card to display in your home. We will print cards for you, provide stand up clips, and collect various objects that are called for in the practices in a Lent bag!


