# **Bear Witness to the Light**

Imagine if you came into conscious being just as the sun rose over the horizon. All day you enjoy the glorious sunshine. Then, as the sun sinks to touch the horizon and in a few short minutes disappears, you panic wondering if you will ever feel its warmth again. How would you know that our local star makes the same journey every day? Ancient peoples paid attention to the sun and the moon and the ways these celestial bodies changed over time. They certainly had enough wisdom to know that the sun comes back every morning, even though they had no understanding of the mechanics of our solar system. It would have seemed like magic or divine action. The same was true for the sun's annual journey with the steadily shortening days of autumn (in the northern hemisphere anyway) and the turning point of the winter solstice when those days gradually began to grow longer.

It's no wonder that ceremonies and celebrations evolved to mark the solstice. It must have seemed miraculous to see that shift from darkness towards light. It is also no wonder that Christians found it appropriate to celebrate Christmas and Epiphany around the same time as those ancient pagan festivals of light. Jesus' birth was anticipated in Luke's Gospel by Zechariah as he sang, "By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace." And Simeon proclaimed upon meeting the baby Jesus in the Temple, "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

Light and seasons may not seem all that miraculous to us anymore as our days are extended effortlessly by flipping a switch and the cell phone in our pocket has a handy flashlight. However, with a little effort we can appreciate the power of enlightenment. There are several stories about Jesus healing blind people in the Gospels. The entire ninth chapter of John is devoted to the healing of a man who was blind from birth and the events that followed. In that chapter we hear Jesus refer to himself as the "light of the world." We may read these stories as actual healing stories or as metaphors for spiritual enlightenment. Either way they are impressive and have implications for our personal faith.

Now imagine that you are a being who came into existence during the dark of night. How would you react to your first sunrise? Fear, joy, confusion, fascination, excitement? The Gospel story, from the birth of Jesus through his life and ministry and his death and resurrection, is the story of enlightenment. It is a movement from darkness into light. Jesus invites us to walk in the light. This is our calling as his followers. We constantly seek him, his wisdom, love, and guidance. We also seek to be enlighteners, those who bear the light of Christ into the world. In this dark time of year, it is good for us to remember this invitation and calling. Bear witness to God's light. The darker the time, the more important this ministry of witness is.

# **VESTRY UPDATE**, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry

# December 2021

The vestry met on Tuesday, December 14, remotely, using Zoom. Financially the church continued to run a deficit in the month of November and crossed into the red for the year to date; however we are approximately where we had budgeted to be at this point in the year. The vestry continues to invite all parishioners to prayerfully discern their financial stewardship for the coming year and return their 2022 pledge if they have not done so already.

At the meeting, the vestry adopted the 2022 parish budget as presented by Finance Committee. In addition, vestry appointed Pam Ferguson, Anthony Grillo, and Beth Jones to positions as stewards of Parishioners' Ministry, and appointed Amy Pritchett to a seat on the Community Cafe Board of Directors.

The vestry also discussed plans for Christmas Eve services and the continued challenges of engaging the parish community and parish life under pandemic conditions. Although the possibility of a Zoom Annual Meeting was discussed (as was held last year), the vestry decided to hold the parish Annual Meeting in person, in the nave of the church, immediately after the 10am service on January 30.

Vestry meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month and are always open to all parishioners. # Vestry Election Update



There will be a short break between the 10 a.m. service and the Annual Meeting.








## From the Financial Secretary Online Giving for 2022

# **IHS WISHING WELL AT MEYER DAIRY**



Thank you to all parishioners who helped Interfaith Human Services by ringing the bells for the Wishing Well at Meyer Dairy and to everyone who made a donation. IHS recently announced, "It is with the utmost gratitude we can announce that the IHS Wishing Well Campaign raised over \$41,000 this year. This is about \$1,000 more than last year. As these trying times continue to challenge us all, our donors, volunteer ringers, and sponsors have once again blessed us."

## PARISHIONERS' MINISTRY

Our Parishioners' Ministry has been going here at St. Andrew's since the 1950s. Six stewards serve to administer funds that are allocated to assist anyone with financial needs—parishioners and non-parishioner members of our community. When we went to the austerity budget in 2020, we stopped funding this ministry through the parish budget. It now depends solely on your donations given directly to support Parishioners' Ministry. You have been generous in giving to keep this ministry viable. They had a busy fall and early winter due to the expiration of the moratorium on evictions and the lag in government money to help tenants and landlords. So, we are asking once again if you would donate to help us respond to needs in our community. Please mark your gift specifically for "Parishioners' Ministry."

We would also like to acknowledge the two stewards who have just stepped down and the new stewards who are taking their place. Marion Schwartz steps down after having served for several three-year terms, the last five years as chief steward. Don Hopkins also decided that 18 years was enough to serve as both a PM steward and the treasurer of the group. Both Marion and Don have done a wonderful and faithful job in this quiet but important ministry. Starting new three-year terms on the first of the year we welcome new stewards Anthony Grillo and Beth Jones and welcome back Pam Ferguson who just finished serving the final year of an unexpired term.

## Kate Freeman to Receive Honorary Degree from University of Chicago



The University of Chicago will present honorary degrees to four distinguished scholars at its Convocation ceremony in June 2022, in recognition of their significant contributions to their fields of study.

Katherine H. Freeman, a world-renowned organic biogeochemist, will receive the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Science. Freeman studies ancient organic molecules and their stable isotopes—work that has given fundamental insights into the study of climate change over millions of years

The Evan Pugh University Professor of Geosciences and Chemistry at Pennsylvania State University, Freeman's development of the paleo-carbon dioxide proxy record has had wide-ranging implications for the study of climate change. She also contributed to the invention of compound-specific stable isotope analysis and continues to develop new measurement techniques that will allow deeper understanding of ancient molecular structure than ever before. As a leader in molecular isotope paleontology, she has studied areas ranging from the earliest recognized life on Earth to modern biological processes.

Freeman is a member of the National Academy of Sciences, and a fellow of the Geological Society of America, the Geochemical Society, the American Academy of Microbiology and the American Geophysical Union. She is also a recipient of the Alfred Treibs Award from the Geochemical Society, the highest honor in organic geochemistry; the Arthur L. Day Medal from the Geological Society of America; and the 2020 Nemmers Prize in Earth Sciences from Northwestern University.
