Order Out of Chaos

How do we find meaning in the world? How do we decide that the universe is not simply a random series of events with no overall purpose or goal? I suppose that one could conclude that there is no true order, and therefore no true value, no true justice, but that seems to me cynical and faithless. As soon as we entertain the idea of God, a divine creator and one who cares for creation and its creatures, then we are obligated to seek meaning and seek to serve the divine purpose.

Chapter one of Genesis tells a story of creation in which order is brought out of chaos. In this case, the story seeks to explain how the universe came to be, but we can read it as a metaphor for the story of our search for meaning, how we look for God's hand and God's purposes in the randomness that surrounds us is our own way of bringing order out of chaos. If we live in a totally random world, we are born, we live, we die, end of story. If we live in God's created order, the story goes on. Jesus' resurrection stands as a capital "T" Truth that we choose to believe, one that shapes our experience of the rest of life. Human suffering suddenly has meaning. Each human life, no matter how seemingly insignificant, has value. Death is no longer the end, but a new beginning, a doorway to a new and more abundant life. Resurrection gives us a new magnitude of order within the chaos we know in our daily lives. On the first day of a new week—the eighth day, if you will—there is a new creation, one that subsumes and supersedes all that came before.

Living in this new creation is a choice we make daily. Watching a war of aggression by Russia against Ukraine could send one to the depths of despair. But in this new creation we find ourselves looking for God's invisible hand in this horrible history unfolding before us. We find ourselves asking: how can I help? We feel a connection to those who are suffering not because we know them but because Our Lord suffered for us, and for them too. We pray for the ones under attack, and we also pray for the attackers, not because we want to, just because the crucified one told us to. After all, he prayed for the ones who crucified him. Praying for our enemies may not be the kind of order we want to find in the universe. It would be more satisfying to see our enemies dead before us like the Egyptians on the shore of the Red Sea at the exodus, but having chosen to believe in a God-creator whose essence is love and who implanted love in the creation as its natural end, what else can we do?

Discovering meaning in life is hard work. It is a communal activity. We engage in it through our shared prayer and worship. There are other ways too. Our poetry contest is an experiment in public theology. We hope to invite people into a conversation. This year the conversation is about how we care for the creation in which we live, the one given to us by the creator who gave us responsibility for its upkeep. It was not a coincidence that Mary Magdalene mistook the risen Jesus for a gardener. The first Adam was a gardener by vocation. Jesus came to be the second Adam to teach us about the new creation. Let us know what you think about our calling to care for creation. Submit a poem, or two or three, to the contest. Have fun uncovering meaning and creating art. Being creative is part of the image of God in which we were created. We honor God in our creativity.

If you are reading this, you have probably already decided to live in a universe that is filled with meaning and purpose. During this Easter season may we remember that the meaning and the purpose we find in the resurrection of Jesus is love, life, hope, and light.

WORSHIP



Choral Evensons at 5pm

Sunday May 1, 5 p.m. Church Reception, 6 p.m., Room 325

On Sunday, May 1, the Adult Choir will present a service of choral evensong. Music will include the evening canticles in C by Ralph Vaughan Williams, Preces and Responses by Richard Shephard, and the anthems ALL PEOPLE THAT ON EARTH DO DWELL by Thomas Tallis, and AN EVENING HYMN by Simon Lole. Keith Diehl will be our guest organist, and the Rev. Gene Tucker, rector of St John's in Huntingdon, will be the officiant.

As part of our continuing safeguards during the pandemic, the choir will sing while wearing masks. Masks are now optional at St. Andrew's for the congregation. A reception will be held in Room 325 after the service.

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy scripture, and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

The next evensong will be October 1 at 5 p.m.


