Faith In Action

As I write this, the images of devastation that was caused by Hurricane Ian in Florida are fresh in my mind. So far, the loss of life has not been overwhelming—thank God—but the loss and damage to property is staggering. Looking at the pictures, it is hard to imagine how they will recover. Our media has been bringing us lots of images of destruction lately. Putin's war in Ukraine that started last winter is ongoing, indeed appears to be reaching a new level of commitment from the Russian ruler. I have a similar reaction to the pictures of bombed out buildings, the physical manifestation of people's lives being disrupted in such a personal and total way. I try to imagine my home being destroyed. I try to put myself in the place of those who have been injured, suffered the loss of loved ones, and have been displaced by the violence so far beyond their control. Honestly, it seems too much. I don't know how I would find the strength to go on. I can't imagine that they feel much hope in those circumstances.

We Christians are people of hope. It is in our DNA. The message of the cross is the assurance of God's presence and help even in the worst possible situations. All through the Scriptures, we see God making a way where there is no way, the resurrection being the ultimate example. However, in the moment it can be hard to see this. While one is in the valley of the shadow of death, it can be hard to imagine that there is a light shining anywhere or that it will ever shine in your life again. We've all had dark times in our lives. The past two and a half years of the pandemic certainly have taught us that our circumstances can change quickly and unexpectedly with horrible results, and that life itself is so unbelievably fragile. We may still be carrying the effects of pandemic life. It may have us primed to react to the trauma we witness on the news with a greater than expected emotional response. These things have a

way of accumulating.

Looking to the Psalms as a deep well of human experience and emotion in the context of faith, we may turn to Psalm 130 that begins, "Out of the depths have I called to you, O Lord; Lord, hear my voice; let your ears consider well the voice of my supplication." Here the psalmist's expression may resonate well with us in a moment of fear and desperation. Even in that moment there is a faith and a looking to God for help and comfort. It goes on, "I wait for the Lord; my soul waits for him; in his word is my hope. My soul waits for the Lord, more than watchmen for the morning, more than watchmen for the

morning." Simultaneous longing and faith come across; hope in the midst of darkness. I don't know if these words alone would comfort those who have lost their homes and all their possessions either to natural disaster or senseless war, but they speak of a bottom that holds, a baseline of belief that colors all our experience. Perhaps these words and our faithful response to the destruction we see on our screens will be a comfort and an inspiration to those currently experiencing the darkness. The losses are overwhelming and if we think we have to face them ourselves, we will see nothing but darkness. But God calls us together in tragedy. We support one another, even those we don't know on the other side of the world. Our denomination's public expression of God's love is embodied in Episcopal Relief and Development. A donation of any size will go to help people suffering wherever they may be. It may feel like a drop in the ocean, but many drops make a wave and a tide. ERD partners with other organizations and local people to bring relief to those suffering and help with recovery. Along with our prayers, ERD is our church's faith in action.

VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry

September 2022



The vestry met on Tuesday, September 13, in the Parish Life Center, for the first time in-person since before the beginning of the pandemic. Vestry checked in on the general state of ministries and activities across the parish and discussed ways to encourage participation amid the complications of pandemic fatigue. The vestry unanimously endorsed Assistant Rector Ted Christopher for ordination to the priesthood, and appointed Kelley Paulsen as a replacement alternate delegate for Diocesan Convention which is taking place this month. In addition, vestry appointed Julie and Jamie Breuninger as our parish representatives to the board of Out of the Cold Centre County.

EVENSONG

On Sunday, November 6, the choir of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church will present the service of choral evensong. The Rev. Gene Tucker, rector of St. John's, Huntingdon, will be the officiant.


Prior to the Reformation, prayer in the early evening or late afternoon was known as the Office of Vespers, one of the eight Canonical Hours of the divine office of the Western church. However, in 1549, a prayer book known as the Book of Common Prayer was adopted in the context of the English Reformation. Bishop Thomas Cranmer established the office of Evensong using elements taken from both Vespers and Compline, generally to be conducted in the English language, as was the case with the entire liturgy.

After a series of slight modifications, the office of Evensong took its modern form in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, a form that is followed very closely throughout the whole of the Anglican and Episcopal Church throughout the world. This is the form used at St. Andrew's

Evensong, like all forms of liturgical worship, has elements of drama and ritual that nourish the spiritual life of all of us. It is based entirely on elements of Holy Scripture and it is scripted according to a long history, originating in Judaic and early Christian evening worship. Evensong is traditionally mostly sung by a choir, with the full congregation participating throughout in thoughtful prayer, allowing the music to touch us and to draw us closer to the presence of God.

Please join us for this service. Bring some friends! A reception will follow in Room 325. The next evensong will be Sunday, February 5, 2023.


The St. Andrew's Prayer Quilt Ministry will meet on Saturday, October 30, at 12:30 in Room 119 in the Trost Wing.
