# The Work of Advent: Preparing for Joy!

I love the end of Daylight Savings Time. I wish we could "fall back" every Saturday night and give me that extra hour of sleep. However, I am not a big fan of going home at the end of the workday in the dark. I find it makes me tired. I feel draggy and sluggish, and don't have any energy for evening activities. All I want to do is vegetate after dinner. That is the power of the shorter days this time of year. As we approach Christmas, the days just get shorter and if you are at all susceptible to Seasonal Affective Disorder—aptly known as SAD—you start to feel its effects about now. We counter that natural darkness with the bright, decorative lights which put us in that festive mood for the upcoming holiday season. All the other activities of the season, from sending Christmas cards, to shopping, planning meals, traveling, hosting, baking, and so on, are intended to lift our spirits as we prepare to welcome the incarnate God who was born in a stable in Bethlehem. This time of year, it begins to look a lot like Christmas. Advent, we may forget, is a penitential season.

Purple is the color of penitence. It is the same color we use during Lent, though some churches use blue in Advent to create a distinction between the two seasons. Now, I don't want to create a false equivalency between Advent and Lent. Yes, they are both penitential seasons, but there are differences. Whereas during Lent we tend to focus on our own personal penitence, and therefore personal acts of piety, Advent has a more outward focus. We talk a lot about preparing the way and announcing the coming of the King. During Advent we get apocalyptic readings in church on Sundays. We are called to consider how the first coming of Our Lord fits into the overall history of the world, and how we might prepare ourselves and the world to receive the second coming.

If we take the penitential nature of Advent seriously, how would it make a difference in the way we keep it? I'm not suggesting that we throw a pall over the festive mood we all enjoy this time of year. But I wonder if we can focus on preparation, both personally and communally, and see this as a special, holy time of year. We always talk about spiritual practices during Lent. Is there a spiritual practice you might take on during Advent? How about special reading, or adding a prayer practice? An extra thought about how you spend/donate money during this holiday season might be in order. Can you find a practice that enhances your experience of the season and your joy when Christmas finally arrives, rather than creating any extra guilt or cognitive dissonance?

How about this? Let's start with Christmas and work backwards. What is the most important religious meaning about Christmas? Now, think about yourself and your own spiritual needs, and consider how you can get to Christmas with the right frame of mind, the right spiritual attitude, the right focus in your life, your family, and your community. Plan now how you will make that journey. Be realistic. What can you fit into your daily routine? Don't be grandiose. We're all busy this time of year. What will work for you and your lifestyle? No one knows you better than yourself. Most importantly, don't miss this opportunity to walk into Christmas Eve service with your heart filled with joy, thankfulness, love, peace, hope, and goodwill. If that is your destination, how will you get there? That is the work of Advent.

It is wonderful and significant that both Bishop Audrey and Father Jeff support an on-campus ordination. It is an indication of the commitment our church has to student formation, to campus ministry, and to being present where the students are – surely a hallmark of mission and evangelism that our church must embody and enact.

Your presence will be so important to show the Penn State community how committed we are to that mission. Thanks for coming – and be sure to let Allison in the office know, so that we can plan the wonderful reception that will follow, hosted by both St. Andrew's and Episcopal at Penn State.

# VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry

#### November 2022

The vestry met on Tuesday, November 8, in the Parish Life Center. An ad hoc budget committee has been formed and will begin meeting soon. The nominations committee is also seeking individuals interested in running for a seat on the vestry or for a position as a parish representative to Diocesan Convention. Please consider whether you might be called to one of these important ministries!

In other business, the vestry heard updates from Property Committee on repairs to the Parish Life Center plumbing as well as the Trinity House front steps. Steven Smith and Pam Ferguson were appointed to terms as Parishioners' Ministry stewards. Two vestry members recently attended an introductory meeting of representatives from our fellow parishes in the Altoona Convocation; there is interest in forming a Convocation Council to coordinate activities and ministry efforts across the convocation. Finally, vestry did a first read of a draft 2023 budget shared by Finance Committee. There still remains a considerable shortfall in the proposed budget. The budget is still being revised and will be presented to vestry at the December meeting.

Vestry meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month and are always open to all parishioners. The next vestry meeting will be Tuesday, December 13, at 7pm in room 325. Approved vestry minutes are always available on our website ("Clergy, Staff & Vestry" under the "About Us" tab).

Advent means "coming." We will celebrate the weeks of waiting for the birth of baby Jesus.


Each week of Advent we say a prayer and light a candle to remind us to keep **hope, love, joy, and peace** in our hearts.

• The first candle, **hope**, is purple. Purple is the color of our Advent season. Purple is often associated with royalty, Christ the King. We are looking forward with hope for Christmas. - *lit on November 27th. by Anna Rose, Zachariah, and Family*.



- The second candle, **love**, is also purple. When we light this candle, we remember God's love for us and that God lights the way in darkness.
  - lit on December 4th by Josie, Rey, and Family
- The third candle, **joy**, is pink or **rose**. This candle represents the joy we have here on earth. This candle can also be called the Gaudete candle. Gaudete means rejoice. to be lit on December 11th by Theo, Will, Ben and Family
- The fourth candle, **peace**, is purple. This candle reminds us of the lessons Jesus teaches for a peaceful world and to keep peace in our hearts.

   to be lit on December 18th by Dexter, Navy, Townes, and Family
- The fifth candle, **Christ** candle, is white. This candle is lit on Christmas to represent the birth of Jesus. *to be lit on Christmas by Father Jeff*

Sunday mornings at 9 a.m. Room 338



# Changes in the Choir

Like so many ministries in St. Andrew's, the pandemic took its toll on the Adult Choir, especially in the tenor and bass sections. In the spring, Gwen Catchen and I determined to present a proposal to the vestry, with Father Jeff's approval, to fund four trained singers for the choir. A poll was taken of the current members of the choir, and the results were very favourable in support of this proposal. The vestry graciously has funded this program for two years setting aside money from the surplus from previous years, thereby not adding any more to our budget to pay for the singers. One of the things that having paid singers does is really make it easier for the volunteer members of the choir. They no longer feel they need to compensate for lower numbers, and the singing, the sound of the choir, has been strengthened, as many of you in the congregation have noticed. With the help of Ted Christopher, we were able to hire these four people:

Erica Harvey, soprano, a junior voice performance major at Penn State

**Peter Cunningham**, tenor, a Teaching Assistant at Penn State pursuing his Masters in Choral Conducting (An aside: when I came down with covid in late September, Peter was willing to step in and assist Gwen with two big services, including evensong, on the first Sunday in October)

Nic Stark, tenor, a first-year voice performance major at Penn State

Austin Norrid, bass, a PhD student in Music Education at Penn State and a choral conductor

I would like to add something very important here. Not only are these individuals fine singers and musicians, but they are also wonderful people whom the choir has welcomed with love and friendship.

#### December 2022 PM Update: All About Parishioners' Ministry

What is Parishioners' Ministry? Since 1958, the Parishioners' Ministry of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church (PM) has been an ongoing active outreach ministry that provides modest financial assistance to people in the community facing unexpected financial emergencies. St. Andrew's is one of only five local churches with a dedicated financial outreach Ministry, making it an integral member of the local community safety net.

How does it work? Most often the Parishioners' Ministry stewards coordinate with local social service agencies like Centre Helps, Interfaith Human Services, Centre Safe, Centre Volunteers in Medicine, and the St. Vincent de Paul Society to assist with payments towards urgent expenses. Community members can also call the Parishioners' Ministry directly for modest financial support and to receive contacts for the larger local social service agencies.

What types of expenses does the Ministry help with? The most common requests have been for assistance with housing expenses, such as rent, security deposits, and utility payments. Requests for rent payments have continued to increase: in 2013, 45% of requests were for help with rent payments, and in 2020, 64% of requests were for help with rent payments. Parishioners' Ministry also helps with most other expenses such as medical bills, childcare, car repairs, phone bills, and gas vouchers. In October 2022, the Parishioners' Ministry helped 11 households with \$1,020 in unexpected expenses, with 66% going to unexpected housing expenses. Total monthly income from parishioner donations and the Kathy Palmer fund was \$1,350.
