Start 2023 With a Clean Slate

It's a new year! New calendar. New beginnings. New chances to get things right. If only there was some way we could truly wipe our slate clean, to have a new beginning that makes us fresh. Of course, there is!

Every Sunday before we celebrate Holy Eucharist, we confess our sins. And every Sunday the priest (or bishop when present) stands up and pronounces God's forgiveness and absolution of our sins. This is a necessary component of our preparation to receive Holy Communion. If you come from a Roman Catholic background, you remember this as an individual obligation, confessing before a priest perhaps in a confessional before attending the Mass. In the Episcopal Church we keep this practice as a general confession. We all say the same words at the same time. No one is required to make private confession. However, we do offer private confession to anyone who wishes to avail themselves of its grace. We call it *Reconciliation of a Penitent* and it can be found in the Book of Common Prayer on page 447 and following.

Why am I talking about confession? It's not Lent, the time when we usually talk about such things. I just wanted to take this occasion of new beginnings as an opportunity to talk about the amazing grace that we are given every week and probably never thought that much about. In our understanding of who God is and how God operates, when our sins are absolved, they are gone. It is as if they never happened. Our slate is wiped clean. We start completely new and afresh. That is a truly remarkable thing, to have one's sins removed from us as far as the east is from the west. Now, along with this divine grace of forgiveness is our obligation to amendment of life, meaning that we need to resolve to do better. When it is appropriate, and when it will not create more pain, we should try to make amends to those who have been affected by our sinful acts. God's forgiveness is not dependent on our good works, but a little contrition can go a long way in reconciling with someone we may have wronged.

As much as I want you to contemplate the pure joy of having your sins forgiven, we can't talk about that without talking about its complement. That is, as we pray, "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." Once we receive the beautiful gift of forgiveness, we are immediately challenged to offer the same to those who may have wronged us. Wait, now you just stopped preaching and started meddling! I'm not making this stuff up, folks. Jesus tells a wonderful parable about a slave who was forgiven a debt he could not repay with a lifetime's wages, but who failed to forgive a fellow slave a small loan he could not repay. In the story, the master throws the slave who was forgiven but failed to forgive into prison until his own debt was paid. Read: for the rest of his life. (Matthew 18:21-35).

We may be tempted to think of the obligation to forgive as a burden. I tell you it is the opposite. It may in fact be more freeing to let go of an old hurt with its anger, resentment, and hate than it is to be forgiven for our own sins. Holding onto our rage, no matter how righteous it may be, can slowly kill us. And it doesn't hurt the person with whom we are angry. I'm not talking about forgiving lightly, nor am I talking about not holding people accountable for their misdeeds. Justice is something we should all be working towards. However, there comes a point when it is just time for us to forgive another. Maybe the new year is a good time to think about forgiveness, both receiving it thankfully and offering it to others.

VESTRY UPDATE, Kevin Lowe, Clerk of the Vestry



December 2022

The vestry met on Tuesday, December 13, in the Parish Life Center. The vestry approved the 2023 parish budget, with some revisions from Finance Committee based on recently received pledges. The vestry is grateful for everyone's financial stewardship of the parish. The recently formed ad hoc budget committee has begun its work and will be exploring possible long-term ways to reduce church expenses and/or increase revenue and expects to deliver a report to the vestry by the end of March.

Vestry also discussed a funding plan submitted by the Parishioners' Ministry stewards. Because Parishioners' Ministry is no longer a funded line item in the parish budget, its income is unpredictable, and the stewards are exploring ways to increase the visibility of the ministry and regularize appeals for donations. In other business, Fr. Jeff's 2023 housing allowance resolution was passed, and Michele Marini was appointed chair of the Parish Life Committee.

Vestry meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month and are always open to all parishioners. The next vestry meeting will be Tuesday, January 10, at 7pm in room 324. Approved vestry minutes are always available on our website ("Clergy, Staff & Vestry" under the "About Us" tab).

2023 Annual Meeting

Sunday, January 29

11:20 a.m. (approx.), Church

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held after the 10:00 a.m. service on Sunday, January 29. As we did last year, we will meet in the church after the worship service is over and after people have a brief break, approximately 11:20. We will not have a potluck, just some snacks and drinks available immediately after the service. With no competitive elections this year for vestry members or diocesan convention delegates, these nominees will be elected by acclamation during the meeting. (See profiles in this issue of the Net.) Below is a brief review of the qualifications of electors.

Electors in the parish are adult communicants in good standing. (Parish Bylaws: Article II, Section 1) Adult = 16 years old or older

Communicant in good standing = All communicants of this Church who for the previous year have been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and have been faithful in working,

praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God, are to be considered communicants in good standing.

The meeting will be live streamed on Facebook. If those viewing at home have a question or a comment, they can type it into the comments or call during the meeting.




Online Giving for 2023





An Interview with Centre Helps



The Parishioners' Ministry stewards coordinate with local agencies like Centre Helps, Interfaith Human Services, Centre Safe, Centre Volunteers in Medicine, and the St. Vincent de Paul Society to assist with payments towards urgent expenses. For this January 2023 PM Update, we asked Elaina Seto, Basic Needs Case Manager at Centre Helps, for her perspective on St. Andrew's contributions to the community safety net.

How has St. Andrew's impacted the work you are able to do?

ES: St. Andrew's is a wonderful resource that we can access for our clients experiencing financial crises, which allows us to better support them. We provide our clients with information about the Thursday community dinners, and when the situation is appropriate, request funds from Parishioners' Ministries to prevent evictions, utility terminations, and other crises for our clients.

How many other churches in the area contribute as we do?

ES: The only other churches that also provide financial assistance to our clients include Good Shepherd Catholic Church via their Matthew 25 Committee, St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Calvary Church, and University Baptist and Brethren.

Does St. Andrew's provide support for any niche area that other churches or organizations may not?

ES: St. Andrew's is flexible when our clients have needs beyond rent and utilities, such as childcare, bus tickets to shelters for the homeless, and car repairs. This flexibility has been instrumental in helping our clients avoid crises and reach goals such as gaining employment.

During the month of November, the Parishioners' Ministry fulfilled 6 requests -5 for housing assistance and one for car repair assistance. Income to the fund was \$750 including \$500 from the Kathy Palmer Fund.


BOOK CLUB
