Ordinary Pilgrimage

I recently preached about the pilgrimage with our Journey to Adulthood youth. The pilgrimage is an integral part of this program that seeks to incorporate elements of ancient societies' rites of passage. It is intentionally a pilgrimage, not a fun trip, not a mission trip, not an educational trip *per se*. It mimics the ordeal, or separation from one's family, that facilitates growing up and transitioning into adulthood from childhood. The program itself describes the experience like this: "They go in search of their own encounter with the divine, with Jesus Christ. And because God is good and loving, He is easily found on pilgrimage. The ancient Irish pilgrims say it is not how many miles we travel that makes the pilgrimage, it is the distance traveled by the heart." We take the kids on a pilgrimage so they can have their own experience of the divine.

In the spirit of pilgrimage and because it is summer, the season of travel, I wanted to reflect on the idea of finding God as we travel, alone or with our family, for recreation or even for business.

Something happens when we travel, when we venture forth away from our home, away from all that is familiar, when we break our normal routines and embrace a spirit of adventure. Being removed from all that is familiar, we find that the normal context of our life is stripped away, and the things that help us know who we are, the places, the habits, the foods, the familiar people, are not present. Therefore, two things happen. First, we become more aware of our surroundings. We are all familiar with the effect of becoming blind to the wallpaper. Away from home, we tune in to what's going on around us, both because we have to—to get to where we want to go, or to make sure we are safe—and because we don't want to miss anything. This sensory hypersensitivity makes us open to our surroundings. It creates a unique spontaneity as we react to those new surroundings, and we are willing to try new things. Call this the vacation effect. It's why people end up going on zip lines or parasailing when they would normally never something like that. It's why "what happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas."

Second, being in unfamiliar surroundings makes us more vulnerable as well. It makes us more dependent either on a guide, an informational brochure or app, or a map or GPS. We literally don't know what is around the next corner. This unpredictability is actually always true in life, but as long as we are steeped in the routine and the familiar, we are shielded from this fact. Traveling underscores the randomness and fragility of life. This vulnerability combined with our openness to new situations can put us in a state of spiritual openness as well. It can help us discover the divine in the world around us, in nature, in a holy place, or in the most ordinary, unexpected places.

If we intentionally seek the holy, any trip can become a pilgrimage. It is often the people we meet while on a journey, the ones we didn't expect to meet, whom we will never see again, who reveal something about God to us. In brief, intense interactions we may find some surprising insight, some new perspective that opens our eyes and our hearts. When you travel this summer, pay attention. Expect to meet God while on the road, and you will. Sometimes it is the most simple and unexpected experiences, something we could never plan, that end up changing our lives.

The vestry met on June 13. Fr. Jeff announced that St. Andrew's has acquired two doses of Narcan, the antiopiate overdose drug. The doses are in each of the AED device cabinets.

Parish donations were a little low in May, not totally unexpected for summer months. The painting of the stained-glass window frames is complete. The stonework at Trinity House is also complete.

Fr. Jeff led a free-flowing, productive discussion around welcoming newcomers to St. Andrew's and making them comfortable with our parish family. Post-pandemic, many families with children are looking for churches.

All the video equipment and sound system for Canterbury Hall has been installed and the first movie debuted on Friday, June 30.
