Our Common Life

"There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all." (Ephesians 4:4-6) "For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit." (1 Corinthians 12:13)

For two thousand years the church has used the common cup for Communion. Symbolically it represents the one-ness of the church under our One Lord. Just as eating from one loaf binds us together in the body of Christ, drinking of one cup holds us together as members of one another. Until the pandemic hit in 2020, we happily shared this one cup when we received Communion together. For a time then, the congregation received in one kind only, just the bread. Then we acquired the miniature chalices, the ones that resemble shot glasses. They have served us well, but the time is coming when we will go back to the common cup.

Any time I have brought up the prospect of going back to the common cup among a few parishioners at a time, I have gotten one of two responses, and very few in between. Either they respond to the idea by saying, "I can't wait to go back to the common cup!" Or they say, "I'm never going to drink from the common cup again!"

I can certainly understand if people have lingering concerns about their health and the common cup. Especially since the pandemic we are now conditioned to be aware of germs and potential infection sources. However, the common cup has always had several things going for it. First, it is wine, and fortified wine at that. We use port which has extra alcohol added. Second, the chalice is silver. Silver itself is antimicrobial, not allowing germs to live long on its surface. Third, the chalice is wiped with a linen cloth between each communicant. These three things help, but do not eliminate microbial deposits on the chalice. However, the risk of infection appears to be very low.

The National Institute of Health did a survey of scientific literature in October 2020 to assess the risk posed by receiving Communion from a common cup. Here is their conclusion: "In summary, the common communion cup may theoretically serve as a vehicle of transmitting infection, but the potential risk of transmission is very small. Currently, available data do not provide any support for the suggestion that the practice of sharing a common communion cup can contribute to the spread of COVID-19 because SARS-CoV-2 transmission from a patient with COVID-19 or asymptomatic carrier to other people has not been reported." Also, a 1998 study by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that there had never been an outbreak of infection related to the common cup.

At this point, I have not set a date, but I plan to reinstitute the common cup during Communion before the end of the summer. You will always have an option. Either you can drink from the cup, receive by intinction, or receive the bread only which is full Communion. Stay tuned for information about when we will reimplement the common cup for Communion.

Celebration and Picnic Lunch


Sunday, June 11 11:30 (following 10 a.m. service) in Canterbury Hall

By drafting, revising, and discussing poems in a supportive community, we'll consider how one poetic choice leads to another, each contributing to the work's overall effect. In addition, she has published the short story collection *What She Was Saying* (Fomite); four children's and YA books—including *Inside Out: Poems on Writing and Reading Poems with Insider Exercises* (Finalist International Book Awards), *A Crossing of Zebras: Animal Packs in Poetry; I'm Feeling Blue, Too!* (a 2021 NCTE Notable Poetry Book), and *Rules of the Game:*

Baseball Poems —plus the anthology Common Wealth: Contemporary Poets on Pennsylvania (co-editor) and the literary journal Presence: A Journal of Catholic Poetry (assistant editor). In the Museum of My Daughter's Mind, based on her daughter's paintings (www.hafer.work) + works by other artists, is forthcoming in 2023 (Shanti Arts).
