#### **Back to School**

It's back to school time, for the school district and of course for the university. Soon it will be time for us to restart our Sunday School and youth programs, September 10 to be exact. We are bringing back the Sunday adult forum too which we haven't seen since before the early days of the pandemic. We start with a program on the Psalms by Philip Jenkins. He sang in the youth choir back in the day. When I first came back to St. Andrew's, Joe was one of the people I most depended on, especially on Sundays. He's been a loving minister among us for a long time, and now family responsibilities have forced him to make the difficult decision to retire from active ministry. He's not going anywhere though. Joe and his wife Sandy moved into the Village at Penn State. As time and circumstances allow, he will be back to serve as our deacon in the future. #### **Energy Up**

Last September I wrote my newsletter article on the challenges of getting parish programs back up to speed post COVID. I noted that our average Sunday attendance at that time was 114. Though we are not back to the prepandemic number of 184, we are doing much better with an average attendance of 132 so far this year. More than the numbers show, it seems to me there is a different feeling this year. More is happening, and with more involvement by more people. I wonder if you feel it too. Do you sense a little more energy in our parish this year over last fall?

#### **Final Thoughts**

As summer comes to an end and we say goodbye to the warm weather, and as we begin our transition to fall with its cooler, shorter days, changing leaves, and increase of activity, let us remember that God is with us always, even, and perhaps especially, during times of transition. Starting something new, leaving behind something familiar, facing the unknown, these have always been times that cause us stress and confront us with dread of the unknowable future. During these transition times of our life, God walks with us and gives us comfort. I pray that any transition you may be facing, now or in the near future, goes as smoothly as possible, and that you sense the divine presence as a constant in your life giving you an anchor in the storm, a foundation from which to move confidently, a constant companion on life's journeys.

Episcopal at Penn State Retreat

Episcopal at Penn State is off and running for the semester. We continue to meet on Sundays at 6 p.m. in Canterbury Hall for food, fun, fellowship, and Compline. In addition, weekday service of Holy Eucharist followed by Bible Study resumes Wednesday September 13, at 12:15 p.m. in Eisenhower Chapel on campus. All are welcome!





The group is planning an overnight retreat - Saturday September 30 to Sunday October 1 – at the Church of the Good Shepherd in Rosemont, PA, a prominent Anglo-Catholic Episcopal Church in the Philadelphia area which runs a retreat house with seven rooms. The retreat will be an opportunity to unplug a bit from work/Happy Valley stress and to focus on contemplation and prayer. There is a shared kitchen which we can use to make our community dinner, and on Sunday morning we will attend service together in the beautiful church. There might, depending on people's schedules, be an opportunity for some time in Center City Sunday afternoon, before returning to State College. The cost of attending is \$86 per person, but Episcopal at Penn State is willing to subsidize the cost, reducing it to \$43 per person, assuming there are at least four people signed up to go.

#### **Deacon Joe Announces Retirement**

#### A message from Joe follows:

Let me start with how much a pleasure it has been serving the St. Andrews parish for these past 18 Years.

My journey started with a call and interest in serving the church while I was working in Washington, DC in 1998. Fr. Larry Hofer was the rector at St. Andrews at the time. We talked and discussed the requirements, and I elected to move forward. The process for ordination to the diaconate at the time with the School of Christian Studies, was a 3-year program. Unfortunately, due to my work assignments in Washington, DC, it took a year longer.

I have been very fortunate to have been able to serve and assist Father Larry, then Father Richard, and now Father Jeff, as well as the interim priests here at St. Andrews. During this time, I have been blessed to serve under Bishops Creighton, Baxter, and now Bishop Scanlon. It has been a blessing to have been able to serve this church and our diocese for this period.

The members of this congregation have been wonderful. While I have been a member of St. Andrews my entire life, the time from when I began this journey has been very special for me and my family.

The people of the congregation that make up the committees, the volunteers that put in so much of themselves for this parish, all that do the little things behind the scenes, you are so amazing and wonderful. Thank you for letting me be a part of your ministry and service.

I am sorry to have to be retiring from ordained ministry, but several things have happened that have led to this decision. While it is a sad time for me to retire, it is a blessing that we will continue to be members of St. Andrews.

## Is God Calling You to Ministry?



Acolytes play an essential role in the Sunday worship service, but if all is going well, their work may go unnoticed. Acolytes lead the procession and recession, light and extinguish the altar candles, hold the scriptures for the reading of the Gospel, assist the clergy with communion, and more.

Acolyting fosters in children and youth an appreciation for the sacred and a sense of belonging and ownership of the worship experience at St. Andrew's. It helps familiarize them with the liturgy and rituals of the church and teaches them about our traditions. Acolytes usually work in groups of twos or threes, and they get to meet new people and spend time with friends during the worship service. Adults can also find this ministry rewarding!

We are looking for new **lectors** and new **Lay Eucharistic Ministers**. Lectors are those who read the lesson in church on Sunday. If you like to read and don't mind being in front of a crowd, this may be a ministry for you. Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) are people, licensed by the diocese, who assist with the worship on Sundays, or other days.



They also read a lesson but may read the Prayers of the People and assist with serving Communion. In order to be a LEM, there is some training required. Both opportunities to serve are fun and rewarding.




## The Psalms

Presented by Philip Jenkins

On Sunday, September 10, we will "kick off" a new season of Adult Forum offerings as Philip Jenkins introduces the Psalms, in the first of what will be an occasional series of forums and conversations over the coming year.

In all the liturgically oriented churches (like our own St Andrew's) every service includes at least some portion of the Psalms. Jesus often quoted the Psalms, and in turn the Psalms shaped the most basic Christian theology. Throughout Christian (and Jewish) history, Psalms have been very frequently used for prayer and devotion, and they have influenced mainstream culture. Although the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm is perhaps the most famous today, others have been just as popular in bygone years. But what are the Psalms? Where did they come from? Why have they been so completely indispensable to Christian life and thought? Did you know that in their origins, they were divided into five different

books, each with their own focus and theme?



Some of this work grows out of his most recent book *He Will Save You from the Deadly Pestilence: The Many Lives of Psalm 91.* That book, incidentally, traces the many uses of one particular psalm, through the many leading cultural figures who so venerated it. That would include, for example, St. Jerome, St Benedict, St. Augustine, Martin Luther, John Calvin, and, more recently, Jerry Garcia, Chuck Norris, and Sinéad O'Connor. No, really.

By drafting, revising, and discussing poems in a supportive community, we'll consider how one poetic choice leads to another, each contributing to the work's overall effect. In addition, she has published the short story collection *What She Was Saying* (Fomite); four children's and YA books—including *Inside Out: Poems on Writing and Reading Poems with Insider Exercises* (Finalist International Book Awards), *A Crossing of Zebras: Animal Packs in Poetry; I'm Feeling Blue, Too!* (a 2021 NCTE Notable Poetry Book), and *Rules of the Game:* 

Baseball Poems —plus the anthology Common Wealth: Contemporary Poets on Pennsylvania (co-editor) and the literary journal Presence: A Journal of Catholic Poetry (assistant editor). In the Museum of My Daughter's Mind, based on her daughter's paintings (www.hafer.work) + works by other artists, is forthcoming in 2023 (Shanti Arts).

The St. Andrew's Book Group will meet on Tuesday, September 26, to discuss Stephen King's novel, *The Stand*.

The book is described by the publisher as "an apocalyptic vision of a world blasted by plague and tangled in an elemental struggle between good and evil remains as riveting—and eerily plausible—as when it was first published." A patient escapes

from a biological testing facility, unknowingly carrying a deadly weapon: a mutated strain of super-flu that will wipe out 99 percent of the world's population within a few weeks. Those who remain are scared, bewildered, and in need of a leader. Two emerge—Mother Abagail, the benevolent 108-year-old woman who urges them to build a peaceful community in Boulder, Colorado; and Randall Flagg, the nefarious "Dark Man," who delights in chaos and violence.
