Preparing to Celebrate: The Purpose of Lent

Odd that this year Lent begins on St. Valentine's Day. It seems quite a contrast to think of heart-shaped boxes of chocolates and bouquets of flowers on the same day as crude crosses of ash on our foreheads reminding us of our mortality and dependence on the grace of God. Yet Valentine himself would have appreciated the overlap, I believe. He was a bishop of the early church about whom not a lot of detail is known, but that he was martyred is a detail we hold up in the church. He surely knew something of his own mortality and his dependence on God's grace. I suppose the strange juxtaposition of holiday traditions is no stranger than the bunnies and colored eggs we associate with Easter. The stores have had Valentine's Day treats on display since the week after Christmas. Now those heart-shaped boxes are right next to the chocolate eggs, jellybeans, and marshmallow peeps in the store. The world doesn't understand Lent any more than it understands Advent.

In December, when the church was preparing to celebrate our Savior's birth, the world was celebrating the annual festival of paying tribute to the retail gods. By the time the 25th arrives, most of us are sick of Christmas. I find it jarring how every year as soon as New Year's Day is over, most of the Christmas lights go dark. Indeed, one often sees sad, spent Christmas trees on the curb as early as December 26. After spending four weeks preparing, I prefer to celebrate for the whole 12 days of the season. It is much the same with Easter. The world wants to skip the 40 days of Lent and go straight to the baskets full of candy. Then, once we pass Easter Day, it is on to the next thing without any understanding of the Great 50 Days of Easter. The church in her wisdom set these seasons of preparation before the biggest holy days of the year. They give us the time and spiritual space to focus on the story of Jesus' birth or his death and resurrection. Without that preparation we would wake up one morning, shout "Merry Christmas," or "The Lord is risen indeed," and then we would be on to the next thing. Instead, our whole liturgical year is shaped by the story of Jesus' life. Annually we walk through the events surrounding his birth—the annunciation by the Angel Gabriel, Mary's visitation with Elizabeth who was pregnant with John the Baptist, the holy family's difficult trip to Bethlehem—and all the dramatic events surrounding his crucifixion—the Last Supper, the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus' arrest and trial, his crucifixion, death and burial, and finally the empty tomb. These narratives invite us to experience again the emotional impact of Jesus' life and ministry. They put us in the scene, so to speak, and help us feel close to our Lord. Basically, Advent and Lent are a witness to us all of how important Christmas and Easter are.

So, again we begin those 40 days when we focus on repentance, mortification of the flesh, and the depth of God's love. The point being, as it always is, not to make us feel bad or guilty, but to help us be totally present at the tomb on Easter morning, to hold before us just how powerful God's love is, to help us appreciate the gift of salvation. Lent is about Good News. Its austerity intensifies the joy of Easter. It's inward focus on discipline and spiritual practice forms us more perfectly into the image of God. It's fasting merely a prelude to the exuberant feasting of the season of resurrection. Don't miss it. Don't allow yourself to be seduced by the world's fascination with consumption and self-indulgence. Keep this season with intentionality and devotion. Open yourself to the amazing grace of God. Allow it to shape you. Allow it to prepare you for citizenship in the kingdom of God. Don't skip the difficult or unpleasant part but embrace it. Do during Lent whatever you need to do to be prepared to truly celebrate Easter when it comes at long last. Then celebrate all 50 days!

A \$5,000 payment was made to the Vandersall group and another payment will be made in three months. The consultation fees are paid primarily from the O'Connor Extraordinary Fund, although each member of the vestry also contributed.

The vestry unanimously approved the plan to continue renting Trinity House to students for the years 2024-2027.



Theme: "And who is my neighbor? Exploring storytelling in faith and morality"

Jesus summarized the Law: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." Then to justify himself a man asked, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus' answer was a story, the story of the Good Samaritan.

Stories are how we make sense of the world. We learn about our faith from stories. Much of the Old Testament is narrative. Jesus told stories. The story of Jesus himself—his life, death, resurrection, and ascension—is at the heart of the Christian faith.

Join us for this series which will explore how we use stories to engage and express our faith, how we tell our own story within the framework of our faith, and how we can learn to listen to and support each other in this process.

Presenters will approach the subject from the perspectives of the Bible, oral storytelling, poetry, and improvisational theater. This will be an interactive program, so come and be ready to tell your story (and listen to stories too).
