The Moral Imperative of Sabbath Rest

After God liberated the Israelites from slavery in Egypt, God gave them the Law through Moses on Mount Sinai. The Law was intended to be a guide for living as free people. It was intended to give the people the ability to avoid falling back into any kind of slavery, either to any human force or to any other divinity that may lay claim to them. Among the laws was: "Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy." They were told not to work on the seventh day of the week. It is hard to imagine what that commandment meant to a people who had recently been enslaved. A day off! Every week! By commandment! They were used to being told what to do. They were told when to work, and I assume they were rarely told not to work. Now they had this commandment from their God, the God who had liberated them with a mighty hand, that they were to rest on the seventh day, every week.

We are inheritors of the Law. Jesus said he came not to abolish the Law, but to fulfill it. In many ways we are free from the many laws of the Old Testament, but the Ten Commandments are still upheld by the Christian tradition. The moral imperatives we find there still have bearing on us. We may not strictly observe the sabbath, as in we don't necessarily rest on Saturdays, but the concept of sabbath is something we should take seriously. During the summer, we often take time off from work. We rest, we travel, we have fun, we do things we would not normally have time to do while we are working. This is a form of sabbath. In fact, when this newsletter comes out, I will be enjoying a vacation.

When we as Christians think about sabbath rest, we often think about the well-known benefits of letting our brains and our bodies rest. Modern science has shown the wisdom of this ancient custom. We know that if all we do is work, we will burn out. The effects of burn out can be devastating on the individual, the family, and even on the organization you work for. So, we take our cue from God's commandment, and we take a day off from work, we take our vacations, we try not to be a workaholic. But we don't often focus on the moral aspect of this commandment.

To get to the moral sense of taking sabbath rest, I would mention another of the commandments: You shall have no other gods before me, and you shall not bow down to them to worship them. To make this connection, I will ask a simple question. Why do we work? I know, we have to work in order to support ourselves and our families. There is, however, a question of degrees. Working to survive, and even to thrive, is good. Working to the extreme either to earn more and more money, or to achieve some kind of personal fulfillment, can take us into dangerous territory. Which god are we serving? Is it the one, true God who cares about our well-being, or is it the god of greed, status, and power who is never satisfied. Jesus says that we cannot serve God and mammon. This is sometimes translated as "wealth," but it is presented in that context as a false god, a god with an insatiable appetite. It will take everything from us, this god of avarice, our time, our energy, our creativity. The sabbath commandment is a guardrail against falling into the worship of this god. More than the temptation

and the danger to the individual of worshipping the god of mammon, the commandment for sabbath rest is extended to those over whom the Israelites had power and control. In other words, they were commanded to give a day of rest to those who worked for them, even if they were not Israelites. God reminded them that they were once slaves and subject to merciless task masters. Therefore, they should show the same kind of mercy as God had shown them.

So, as Christians who do not keep many of the Old Testament commandments, particularly related to food and old cultural practices, and yet we should take seriously the commandment for sabbath rest. People are more than commodities. They are the beloved children of God. Enjoying sabbath rest and extending it to those over whom we have any influence helps us to remember that there are more important things than productivity. I hope you take the time this summer to enjoy a pleasant sabbath, AKA a vacation.

EDUCATION

Education for Ministry (EFM) Opportunities

Are you looking to deepen your faith?

Are you hoping to understand how your personal experiences and beliefs bring you closer to God and God's people? Do you want to know more about the Bible, Christian Tradition, and Church History and what they mean to you here and now?



If "yes," EfM (Education for Ministry) may be for you.

EfM is a highly regarded Christian Formation program founded and administered by the School of Theology, University of the South, and designed for lay people. Through study, prayer, worship, and reflection, EfM seminar groups journey together through scripture, church history, and theology. While the offerings span four years, participants commit to the program one year at a time.

A seminar group consists of one or two mentors and up to twelve participants. The group meets up to 36 times during the course of a year. Years 1 & 2 study the Hebrew Scriptures, the Gospels, and the New Testament. Year 3 looks at Church History. Year 4 reads systematic theology, developing and enhancing their own practice.

During a weekly seminar, the group builds an intentional, faith-seeking small group by:

- Checking-in how have group members encountered and responded to God since the last meeting?
- Worshiping participants lead worship
- Reflecting theologically after agreeing upon a shared focus, the group examines tradition and culture, paired with experiences and beliefs, concluding with implications for action
- Studying coursework participants discuss insights, challenges, "aha" moments of assigned readings
- Offering and receiving hospitality the group spends time in fellowship.

The goal is for members to understand their faith more deeply and put that faith into action.

Enrollment fee for 2024-25: \$350 (includes a \$10 processing fee). The *Reading and Reflection Guide (RRG)* workbook is included in the price.

Groups meet on-site and/or online. Either way, we are in-person.


