## The Paradox of Hope

Advent begins with a paradox. It is about the beginning, but it begins with the end. Our lectionary readings speak of 'wars and rumors of wars' as we approach this season. It all puts us in mind of the world's end. It all makes us feel frightened, and vulnerable, and dependent on God's grace. Then we move into predictions of Jesus' coming. His birth is announced by an angel, this great and terrible Son of God and Son of Man. When he finally arrives, his birth may seem a little anticlimactic. Born of poor parents on a dark and cold night in the most humble of surroundings, can this really be our King? Is this really the one on whom we place all our hopes?

That paradox, of course, follows through Jesus' life and ministry, his passion and death too. The crucified one is our savior. How crazy is that? He came to give us life abundant, but he suffers and dies on the cross. We know the rest of the story. We know that death is not the end. In fact, Jesus' resurrection is the basis of our hope for eternal life. Following him can create some paradoxes as well. We serve our God by serving others. We are blessed when we let go of concern for ourselves. To become rich when we give away our wealth. Dying we live.

Our faith is full of head scratchers.

One of the most confounding things, and one of the strong themes of Advent, is hope. Hope is the expectation of good things even in the face of facts that would indicate the opposite. Hope gives us a sense of well-being and peace, even as we feel the negative effects of life's assaults. Far from being a denial of reality, hope keeps us grounded in this life, but it frees us from relying on the visible or the material for our comfort or our happiness. Hope sees beyond the present moment. It sees a greater arc of human history, one where God is in charge, present, and directing our story towards a good end.

As Christians, we are people of hope, called to live in hope. Living in hope does not free us from being sad, depressed, disappointed, afraid, or even despondent. However, hope can be our companion along with these emotions. If it is, it protects us from the worst of our negative internal states. Needless to say, there is nothing particularly logical about hope. It is something we choose and cling to tenaciously. It can only be born of faith in a God who loves us and wills the best for us, both as individuals and as a whole people. Hope's foundation is in the belief that God created the creation good, and that goodness is still God's wish, God's dream for this creation. It cannot be sustained by a belief in our own goodness or capacity to do good, nor in the expectation of other fallible people to be or do good. But hope does move us toward goodness. It encourages us to put goodness into the world. By doing this, we may spark goodness in someone else, even in some small way. Hope can, does, and should beget hope.

As we enter Advent and the sun's light fades away, we see the light of Christ just on the horizon, just about to dawn. Let that light be your comfort, your joy, and your hope. Let that light shine in and through you.

## **VESTRY UPDATE**, Beth Jones, Clerk of the Vestry

## November 2024

The vestry met on November 12 in room 324. Two items were approved quickly: 1) Karen Earl was approved to serve on the Community Café's Board of Directors. 2) The vestry approved our commitment to the Diocesan Fair Share budget for 2025.

The Sabbatical Committee (overseeing arrangements for Fr. Jeff's sabbatical) presented their report at the October meeting for the vestry members to read and ask questions. The recommendations and plan were approved unanimously by the vestry at this meeting.

A preliminary budget estimate for St. Andrew's was drawn up by the Finance Committee and presented to the vestry in October for their consideration. There was much discussion about which ministries should be added back into the budget and how to fund them: ministries which reflect St Amdrew's core values. A list of ministries and dollar amounts were approved.

The next vestry meeting is on Dec.10 at 7 p.m. in room 324. All are welcome.

The annual Festival of Lessons and Carols will be held on Sunday, December 15, at 5 p.m. It is patterned after the Christmas Eve service held in King's College Chapel. The Festival was introduced in 1918 to bring a more imaginative approach to worship. First broadcast in 1928, it is now broadcast to millions of people around the world. The service has become a staple of Episcopal churches in the United States and has even spread to other denominations. Readings by members of St. Andrew's and invited guests from the State College community are followed by carols and anthems from the choirs and carols sung by the congregation.

Our own St. Andrew's tradition, a festive reception hosted by Parish Life, will be held in Canterbury Hall following the service. Here are three ways you can help:

St. Nicholas will be here to visit with our children and help us to take out gifts to the altar to be blessed.






# 'We will be celebrating Advent in Narnia! December 1 - December 24


